## My Visit to Sunnydale Academy

I am writing these few lines, unsolicited, to extend my congratulations to our good people of the Missouri Conference, officials and layman, for their youth-saving work in which they are now engaged the establishment of a splendid school near Centralia for the education and Christian training of the army of Missouri youth.

It was my privilege and pleasure recently to visit the school site in company with Elder Hutches, the conference president, and Professor Hartman, the academy principal. I had expected to see some farm buildings and land which, after much planning and work, could be made profitable for school purposes, but what I did see amazed me. There were broad acres of well-kept farm land and building after building, all in splendid repair. I believe I am safe in saying that I never before saw such an imposing farm layout privately owned. I have at times visited every one of our junior and senior colleges in the United States, and I know there is not one of them that has anything like the farm equipment and farm buildings, barns, sheds, dairy

buildings, etc., as I saw at the Centralia site. It is all so marvelous. Certainly the Lord worked for the Missouri Conference, making it possible to purchase such desirable property at only a fraction of the money that had orginally been put into it.

Every member of the Missouri Conference may well be proud of what has already been accomplished. But it takes more than broad acres and copious barns to make an academy. There must be school buildings; there must be an administration building with offices, classrooms and chapel; there must be dormitories, one for the boys and one for the girls; and there must be homes for the teachers. All of these buildings must conform to modern school architecture. They must rightly represent the conference in the essential cause of Christian education. They must be large enough to take care of all the youth of the Missouri Conference who may now attend the school and who will attend it in the vears to come.

And this is not all. When the buildings are erected they must be furnished and

equipped. There must be seats for the chapel, furnishings for the dormitories, equipment for the kitchen and dining room; and a good working library of hundreds of volumes.

Now all of this will take money. Many thousands of dollars will be required to complete the plant. Are the Adventists of Missouri equal to the task? I believe they are. The souls of the youth of Missouri more than tip the scales in their favor. In putting money in the academy no one should think that he is merely putting money into brick and mortar and lumber. Far from it! He is investing money in the boys and girls of the Missouri Conference, and they will pay big dividends. Without a Christian education they would be practically useless to the great advent movement, but properly educated and trained they soon will be bearing the burden and heavy responsibilities in the promulgation of the message. When the call for money is made no thought should be entertained in the terms of buildings and grounds, but in terms of the value of the souls of the boys and girls in the conference. What is the value of a souljust one soul? Think of that when giving to the cause of Christian education.

I have spent the greater part of my life in our school work, in academies, in colleges, and as conference superintendent and union conference educational secretary, and I have always regarded our academy work the most important link in our educational chain. Each and every branch is important-vitally important- but the work of the academy is peculiarly vital. Our children in the elementary grades have not been influenced and enticed by the ways of the world. They are still home children, safe in the care and influence of parents and teachers. Our youth in the colleges are mature, capable of thinking and planning for themselves. but our boys and girls of academy age are more especially in the formative period of life, at the very time when they may go one way or another. They must be carefully guarded and influenced and trained during these critical years if they are to become conscientious, sincere Christians and valuable to the cause we all love.

For many years I have deplored the fact that we had no academy in Missouri. It seemed a tragedy that such a fine conference had no training school for its youth. Consequently, I am happy for the beginning that has been made. I feel that every man and women in the conference will take hold and lift. Elder Hutches, the president of the conference, is a former teacher and principal and knows that Christian education is the salvation of our youth. Professor Hartman, the principal, is a former teacher and principal and well experienced in management. With these two capable and energetic leaders Missouri should establish one of the finest academies in the denomination.

#### Junior Colporteurs Earn Schorlarships

In the past there was a conviction that only adults were capable of selling our books. In fact, it has only been in recent years that we have given serious effort to academy students. But the records of the past summer reveal some very fine salesmen among the church school grades.

Last July, twelve of the Omaha Junior Academy students were organized into a colporteur class, and Elders Cross and Loomer conducted a short, simplified course of instruction. The plan was to sell Bedtime Story sets which retail at \$10 a set. The student selling 10 sets, or \$100 worth, and turning in to the Bible House all the money, would receive full credit for his school expenses, including tuition, library and registration fees, etc., which amounts to approximately \$70.

To strengthen and encourage the plan, the conference appointed three ladies of the Omaha church to act as sponsors. This proved to be the greatest asset, as each sister became responsible for four students, helping them to organize and plan their territory and hours. The ladies of the Dorcas made neat carrying cases to display their sets, and all started out in excellent spirits. Naturally, some "fell by the wayside," but it was most gratifying at the close of the summer to issue ten full and part scholarships to the Omaha Junior Academy. The benefits were more than financial, as those earning their own way regard school with a different attitude than when someone else pays the bill. It also has brought confidence to some. As one boy expressed it, "Now I see how I can go to Shelton Academy and Union College." What was done in Omaha can be duplicated in any place where we have junior academies or church schools. It takes close supervision, but pays good dividends.

It is always of interest to hear from our boys who are yet overseas. The following excerpts are from a letter sent to the brothers and sisters of the Lynch church by Donald Rohde, one of their members, who at present is in Rheims, France.

"I was very happy to hear from all of you and am taking this opportunity to answer your letter.

"I want to tell you about our churches here in Europe. France is so strongly Catholic that we have fewer Adventists here than in any other country in Europe. I have met several boys in the German Army that were lucky enough to get in the medical corps. The rest either gave up their lives or their faith. There is a story of how on one Sabbath in a certain

small church in Italy, the German Adventists took care of the services. The next Sabbath they were gone and the S. D. A. men in the American army took care of the services.

"It seems that the Germans did not molest our churches so much in the occupied countries, but the work was virtually at a standstill because of difficulty of communication and the impossibility of printing due to restrictions and shortages.

"I have here the personal testimony of one of the first church members here in Rheims, which is a city of about 120,000. He asked me to send it to you just as he has written it. He is a very intelligent individual, and speaks and writes six languages: French, English, German, Russian, Italian, and Chinese. This is the testimony:

'Thanks be given unto the Lord for what He has done for us during the period between 1940 - 1944. He preserved His people during the occupation, and we do not know how to express our gratitude. For the first two years of the war, our church had no pastor. The former, being a Swiss, had to leave and go back to Switzerland. For a long time we feared for the requisition of our church. We are pleased to say that this never happened. The liberation was for us a great day. So much the more, it brought to us our American brethren. We have enjoyed their presence among us and thank the Lord for giving us this opportunity. They did us much good morally and especially in a material way. We should like them to bring home to you the fact that we feel ourselves greatly indebted to them for their goodness to us. We pray God to bless them abundantly and thank them in advance for the greetings they will

carry to you. Our love to you American brethren and sisters.'-N. Galy, church interpreter, S. D. A. church, Rheims, France.

"I will close by saying that I have greatly enjoyed my association with our French brethren. They treated us with the greatest kindness, and I look forward to seeing them in the earth made new."

Strange as it may seem, there are still some people within the ranks of the Seventh-day Adventist church who imply by word or innuendo that because a few examples exist here and there of great consecration and effective Christian ministry among the unlettered, education is not essential, and that the intellect is of minor importance.

Mrs. White wrote: "Ignorance will not increase the humility or spirituality of any professed follower of Christ. The truths of the divine word can be best appreciated by an intellectual Christian. Christ can be best glorified by those who serve Him intellectually."-FE, p. 45. And again in the same book she wrote, "Jesus did not despise education. The highest culture of the mind, if sanctified through the love and the fear of God, receives His fullest approval."

Education in its true sense tends to make an individual humble, for he then

recognizes the vast storehouse of untouched intellectual knowledge. It is said of Moses, "His intellectual greatness distinguishes him above the great men of all ages. As historian, poet, philosopher, general of armies, and legislator, he stands without peer."-PP, p. 246. Yet in spite of his exalted educational attainments, the Bible says he "was very meek, above all the men which were upon the face of the earth."

Dear parents, are your children receiving their formal training in a system of education which prides itself on ridiculing the teachings of the Bible or from teachers who love God and believe His word? "To parents He sends the warning cry, Gather your children into your own houses; gather them away from those who are disregarding the commandments of God, who are teaching and practicing evil. . . . . Establish church schools. Give your children the word of God as the foundation of all their education."-Vol. 6, p. 195.

#### Evangelism in Missouri

Our membership statistics have just been compiled, and we find that a total of 219 members have been added by baptism and profession of faith. This is a good gain indeed over 1944, as the total for that year was 156. But we should be doing much more to bring the people in this great field to a knowledge of the truth and into the fold.

There is an outstanding experience in soul winning that I feel is worthy of publication. The evangelistic meetings held in Kansas City in 1945, combined with some special Wednesday night services following the effort proper, resulted in a total of 56 converts. There is still a sizable group studying and preparing for baptism.

These evangelistic meetings were held in the Central Seventh-day Adventist church. They were advertised proudly and prominently as Seventh-day Adventist lectures. Sunday night attendance varied from 350 to 700 and week night attendance from 75 to 200. The 57 baptisms were composed of 19 men and 38 women. The age groups are as follows:

of age; five were between the ages of 16 and 19; seven were 13 to 15 years of age; and eight were under the teen age.

The total cost to the conference of this effort, exclusive of workers' salaries, was only \$32.54. This is remarkable indeed in the light of heavy expenditures used in most public efforts with far less results.

Bill Milham operated the stereoptican, and many other faithful missionary minded laymen helped with folding, mailing and distributing advertising material and literature.

The church as a whole gave excellent support to this public effort, and we thank God for what was accomplished through the efforts of these workers and faithful assistants without incurring a heavy expense to the cause. Another effort is being planned along similar lines for Kansas City in 1946.
