Draftees Wrongly Assigned

Seventh-day Adventist youth are still going into the Army and Navy. And the consideration shown their conscientious convictions regarding noncombatant service and Sabbath observance in time of war is in danger of being lost unless they give greater attention than some of our recent inductees have done.

We are having more difficulties regarding wrong assignments now than in time of war. Young men who have obtained their 1-A-O classification submit to assignment to the infantry, field artillery, and other combatant units, and take combatant training in the use of arms. They make no protest against it, and say nothing about it to regional representatives of the War Service Commission. We learn nothing of it until trouble results, and then the damage is done.

Men classified 1-A-O are rightly eligible for only one assignment in the Army, and that is to the Medical Department. In the Navy it is to the Hospital Corps. Any other assignment is a violation of their noncombatant status, an ignoring of their "O" classification. And if they consent to and take combatant basic training, they should not be surprised later to have their officers claim that they are not genuine noncombatants, for they have, without protest, submitted to combatant training.

We learn that our 1-A-O men have been told by officers that it makes no difference, now that the fighting is over, whether they drill and train with arms or not. Some have been told, "You are not going to kill anybody. The war is over; this is merely physical training. Take the gun."

It does make a difference. It establishes a precedent. It lets your church down. It disregards your classification. It denies your established right to noncombatant recognition, and a noncombatant status. It puts you on record as not being concerned about your noncombatant classification, and it is bound to create trouble for you, and for others, later.

What has happened, very likely, is

that the Seventh-day Adventist youth now being inducted, together with their parents, paid little heed three or four years ago, to the instruction then published in our papers giving information about the directives, regulations and orders which the Lord enabled us to obtain which recognized and provided for the noncombatant status, classification, and assignment of our men. They were not then affected.

Now, however, without having informed themselves, they find themselves in service. Officers are in charge who,

many times, are equally uninformed regarding the provisions worked out years ago to safeguard the noncombatant status. Hostilities have ended, and nobody seems to think it is of any consequence today whether a man is in a combatant or noncombatant assignment. So carelessness and laxity have developed.

I cannot emphasize too strongly the importance of holding what we have gained. It required the courageous devotion and faithfulness of many loyal soldiers to obtain the recognition God worked out for us. It ought not lightly to be tossed away.

We urge parents and youth to be true to the teachings of the church, to insist on the rights and privileges and concessions gained over the years, to maintain the noncombatant status. Our regional representatives are still in the field, and they can be called on at any time.

If you need help and information, ask for it. We will make it available immediately. If you are not informed who to write to in the various states of the United States, then write to me at 6840 Eastern Avenue, Washington 12, D.C., and help and information will be forthcoming at once.

If and when wrong classification or assignment occurs, protest. Continue that protest until you are rightly classified and assigned. Your noncombatant convictions have been given formal recognition and provision made for you to maintain them. You have come into a noble heritage. It cost something to obtain it; do not throw it away. Live up to your faith.
