Soul-Winning Sabbath Service—May 9

The regular preaching service in the churches of the Central Union Conference on Sabbath, May 9, is to be devoted to a study on a special type of personal evangelism.

For almost two years we have experimented with a variety of ideas relative to bringing people who have purchased our wonderful literature into the truth and church membership. Conference presidents, department secretaries, ministers, Bible instructors, and colporteur evangelists—all have hoped and prayed that a plan could be developed which would be easy to work, would embrace a large number of our people, would be economical to operate, and, above all, would be effective. With the Lord's help and the ready cooperation of the workers, we have now determined the plan.

Past Efforts Have Failed

First of all, we must admit that the millions of dollars worth of literature which people outside our church have bought during the past many years alone has not brought so large a number of those folk into the truth as we had hoped. Perhaps nature's law applies just as rigidly to scattering seeds of truth as to scattering seeds of grain. In each case if we do not cultivate the crop, we shall not reap nearly so large a harvest as we might. What has been done to cultivate the territory in which thousands upon thousands of our message-filled books and periodicals have been placed? Outside a few scattered contacts, the answer is NOTHING. We sincerely cannot, must not, continue this course. What do you say?

God Ordained This Work

God gave to John, the revelator, the message which applies so definitely to our literature ministry: "And after these things I saw another angel come down from heaven having great power and the earth was lightened with his glory."

Sister White wrote: "In a large degree through our publishing houses is to be accomplished the work of that other angel who comes down from heaven with great power, and who lightens the earth with his glory." 7T 140. With this consider the statement also made by Mrs. White, that "more than a thousand will be converted in a day, most of whom will trace their first conviction to the reading of our publications."—*Review and Herald*, November 10, 1885. These three pronouncements, along with others just as important, fix the pattern of results which we are to see in OUR day. We believe these words. Our concern is to do more, to inspire many more of our people to sell a great deal more literature, and to lead large numbers of our members to help follow up the interests.

A New Plan Has Been Devised

Here is the plan:

1. Those who sell our literature will be known as colporteur-scouts.
2. They will work a territory thoroughly. Then the minister will hold public meetings. He will be supplied with a complete list of every person who has bought literature, plus important information about each one. He can send special invitations to them, or visit them personally.
3. They will work territory where no public effort is planned in the immediate future, but will keep an accurate record of all customers and interests. Both in this and the previous situation, they will enroll as many as possible in the Bible correspondence courses.
4. Each week both the district minister and the conference president will be sent the names, addresses, and important information about each customer and each person who has a definite interest in any part of our message. When colporteur-scouts discover some who need clothing, food, or fuel, or consolation they will report them also.

Thus a minister will really be in a position to minister to the people living all around him. Attempts will be made from the office to enroll all others in the Bible correspondence courses whom the scouts have contacted but have not enrolled. It is not expected that our preachers make all of these follow-up contacts. Their duty is plainly marked out "The best help that ministers can give the members of our churches is not sermonizing, but planning work for them. Give each one something to do for others." 9T 82.

Consecrated Members Are Needed

So, we shall need the attention and consecrated effort of church members. Here is a family who wants Bible studies. Will you be willing to take just one single hour out of your seven days a week and give these hungry people the spiritual food their poor hearts cry out for? Here is a family that already knows some of our message and is willing to attend services. Are you willing to make friends with them, and possibly drive by and take them to the meetings in your car, sit with them in church, introduce them to others, and pray with them in their homes? You won't have to search for names to call on. We shall supply your minister with enough of all types of cases that await your loving interest.

Your Prayers and Help Are Needed

There are other important features to the plan. The one in charge of the service at your church on May 9 will explain them. Do pray that God will help us to catch a vision of what can be accomplished in this scouting program, and then let all of us get into it in some way or another for the cultivating and saving of the great crop of souls that the Lord has placed us among.

E. V. Schultz, colporteur-pastor in Nebraska, has had 12 of his last year's contacts baptized already. And in Missouri, Brother Thomas, now 75 years old, brought in 22 recently. Mrs. Corley, one of his converts, is canvassing and attended the Institute too. This demonstrates the "chain reaction" of soul winning. Working with Miss Mitchell, the Bible instructor, Colporteur E. E. Nelson, of Colorado, has seen three of his contacts baptized. In Kansas the colporteur trophies were shown by little lights in different parts of the state. Mrs. H. W. Hadel and Mrs. Andrews had helped to "turn on" some of these lights.

Although the efforts of all the faithful colporteurs cannot be mentioned, it is gratifying to know they are not just selling books. They are selling man-

sions in heaven, mansions that have a glorious view from every window, every porch, every floor, and every stairway.

Of course, they are working for a commission. A colporteur's commission is souls. The rain is falling. I like to walk in the rain. All of us do. Why don't you join us?
