# A Personal Letter from Our General Conference President

September 6, 1953

Dear Brethren and Sisters of the Central Union Conference:

The pressure of the work is tremendous, but I want to send to each of you a message as personal as I can make it on this occasion.

I am confident that, as a people, we are right on the very threshold of seeing some of the most marvelous advances in soul winning that have been divinely pictured to us. Already this is occurring in some parts of the world. I believe it is about to take place here in America.

Multiplied millions of dollars worth of our message-filled books and papers have been sold to all types of people here in the United States. A very large amount has been sold throughout your conference. Yet the servant of the Lord has declared that "the wider the circulation, the greater will be the demand for books that make plain the Scriptures of truth." So, in every passing year we should find an ever-increasing demand for our literature.

Let us be fully aware that this large variety of our books and periodicals is designed for one purpose namely, "to prepare a people to meet God." Therefore, we have every right to expect greater and still greater evidence that the literature is doing just that. The publishing department leaders are giving much attention to training the colporteur evangelists to be genuine soul winners now. They have their eyes and hearts set on the "harvest." That is exactly where the Lord Jesus asked the disciples and people of His day to fix their eyes, isn't it?

Your union publishing secretary has given me a copy of the Colporteur Evangelistic Scout Plan which the conference presidents, treasurers, publishing secretaries, Bible house managers, and about 30 district ministers in your union recently developed. The forms used for recording vital information about each customer, each person interested in some particular part of our message, and each one needing the attention of our Dorcas or welfare groups are streamlined and easy to use. Surely as ministers, Bible instructors, Bible correspondence schools, and trained laymen take these forms and follow up the precious work of the Scouts we shall be headed for an influx of souls in the Central Union that will thrill us through and through! Something like this we have needed for years. Now we have it!

I learned the other day that in one of the union conferences about 600 have been baptized in the last four years as a direct result of our literature. But I suppose we really will never know whether the sum total is 600 or 1200, because the colporteur work fur-

nishes many surprises as we go through life. These books that are sold keep on working, and although 600 may be all we know of right now who have been brought to the point of baptism during the last four years through our literature, those 600 may well bring thousands besides themselves into the truth. And then of course, things begin to multiply. I do not know anything that multiplies like the seed of the gospel; in fact, the Scriptures make it clear that it would be hard to find anything to equal it. It is like a grain of mustard seed.

The promise is, "I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh." That does not mean only the ministers and the colporteur evangelists and the Book and Bible House managers. That means the people, the heathen, the wicked, those out in the world who are not godly at all, for God is going to prepare them by the outpouring of the Spirit to receive the truth. He will stir up their hearts. The logical source for them to turn to for truth will be the books that they bought from some Seventh-day Adventist.

It seems to me that if we want to hasten the coming of the Lord, one of the finest ways in the world to do it is to multiply our work in the distribution of literature, scatter it like the leaves of autumn. The more books from our publishing houses that we can get into the libraries of the people, the more likelihood there is of their picking out one of them, getting interested, and then taking down the others and reading them too. If we can build up Seventh-day Adventist libraries in the homes of the people, they are almost certainly going to be influenced by this message.

With our literature, and also with the follow-up work of our ministers, Bible workers, and trained laymen, what a harvest we must expect to receive before we finish with this work!

The Lord will override all the difficulties and all the impediments. And under the latter rain and the baptism of the Holy Spirit in these last days, God is going to bring to this people the greatest success, the greatest advancement, that has ever been made by the gospel workers in the history of the world.

The need today in your field is for a vastly increased army of these devoted laborers, engaged in the ministry of the printed page. Many successful laymen should leave their usual vocations, to step with consecrated feet into this furrow of need while the day of opportunity endures. My prayer is that many of you will inform your publishing secretary at your conference office that you desire to discuss this work privately with him in your home. Just write him a short card or letter.

It is a wonderful thing to help in the finishing of God's work in the earth, is it not? We often think it would have been wonderful to be back there with Brother and Sister White, and be under the influence of the prophet as she spoke those stirring messages. A few of us are still living who heard her speak and know something about it. But you know, I would far rather live down here and see the finish, see the harvest gathered in. Oh. I am waiting for that time just ahead of us when more than a thousand in a day will flock in, "most of whom," the servant of the Lord tells us, "will trace their first conviction to the reading of our publications." As soon as we reach out and lay hold of the divine power of the Spirit of God and the latter rain, we are going to see it-Pentecost witnessed all over again!

#### Draft Unchanged by Truce CARLYLE B. HAYNES

A truce has been agreed to in Korea, hostilities have ended—at least for a time. And the military draft—has that ended? It has not.

The need of required military service for the nation's youth and professional men remains unaltered.

Those in uniform cannot expect to get out ahead of time. Those awaiting their call to service can expect to serve as long as if the fighting had continued.

Draft calls will go on at about the same rate as before the shooting stopped, from about 19,000 to 23,000 men a month for the next ten months. It will then be doubled.

Nor are there any plans to ease deferment policies. It is not planned to reduce the number of men comprising the military forces.

I wish I could say all this differently and tell you it will me easier. If I did, however, I would not be telling you the truth. The draft remains unchanged, regardless of the truce.

#### New Advanced Nursing Program Announced by CME W. E. Macpherson

At the spring council, in Washington, the College of Medical Evangelists was designated as the denominational educational center authorized to offer a program of study in nursing education leading to a Master's Degree.

The graduate council of the college has approved the tentative plans as outlined by the School of Nursing and in September 1954 the first students will be admitted. More detailed information will soon be available upon request. Emphasis in this graduate program will be given to the preparation for supervisors in nursing service and for instructors in clinical and related courses in nursing.

The college wishes in this program to help meet the major needs of the denomination for well qualified supervisors and teachers at home and overseas service. It is not too soon for interested students to make early application in order for credits to be evaluated and programs planned to meet the needs of the field.

# AFRICA Gives to Missions

Our members in North America give generously and frequently in behalf of our world-wide mission program. Some may wonder whether or not the converts in heathen lands are also faithful in sacrificial giving.

An experience that came to me during our last camp meeting season will help to answer this question. Pastor R. G. Pearson and I had driven by car 65 miles from Gendia Mission to a point on the shores of Lake Victoria. For many miles the trail was merely a footpath that had been widened by the local chief by cutting and removing some of the grass and bush. Stones and stumps remained a hazard that we had to accept philosophically. For several miles I walked in front of the car to find a way around the largest rocks. For the last mile an African guide led us along a footpath and across an open field to a mud walled, grass-roofed school building where we were to camp. As it was nearing sunset and the mosquitoes were beginning to buzz, we quickly unpacked our food boxes and bedrolls. When our camp cots and mosquito nets were set up and a rope line had been strung up for our clothing, we lighted the lamp and prepared some

The next morning we inspected the camp meeting place which consisted of a large wild fig tree. The African members had cleared the tall grass and vines from under the tree and had erected a grass sheltered rostrum for the speakers. Rough logs had been arranged as seats and a fence made from Kaffir corn stalks had been placed around the enclosure. I measured the diameter of the area

covered by the branches of this one tree and found it to be 180 feet.

From the camp site we looked across the waters to two islands where we had five churches and some schools. Late in the afternoon we saw a number of 30 foot canoes and two dhows (sail boats) coming towards the bay by which we were camped. Over the waters floated the sound of drums and joyful singing. I asked about the drums and learned that in the shallower waters of the bay there were many hippopotami. They often walk submerged on the lake bottom and might come up under a boat and capsize it. The drums were used to frighten them away.

When the people gathered on Sabbath morning under the green canopy of the giant fig tree with its 50 foot-high arched leafy dome, we discovered that they represented six churches with a total membership of 467. Only one church with a membership of 100 was located on that isolated bit of mainland. The members of each church had brought children, friends, and interested ones, so that the attendance on that Sabbath morning was 837. Fully half of these were children.

For many weeks in their home churches they had been planning for their camp meeting offering of millet, eggs, corn, and cash. For months they had been talking to heathen friends and relatives about the coming camp meeting where the white bwanas (chiefs) were going to bring them a message from the Great Spirit, the God of the earth and the starry heavens.

As the consecration message was pre-

sented they listened with close attention, and when a call was made for those who wanted to prepare for membership in the remnant church to come to the front, men and women and young people stood up in all parts of the congregation and walked towards the rostrum. When this group was gathered near the front the remainder of the congregation stood in reconsecration while the African pastor offered an earnest prayer.

Then the pastor and teachers separated the new converts into groups according to the church area from which they came. Those who were enrolled in the baptismal class for the first time numbered 69. Besides these in this area the churches were preparing 215 for baptism.

In the afternoon we gathered on the lake shore where canoes formed a semicircle of protection against hippos and crocodiles while three pastors led 82 dear souls through the watery grave. Then with singing, all followed the winding trail back to the camp site.

Then came the camp meeting offering, all of which goes into the mission offerings. A blackboard was set up and the names of the churches written down. One by one the leaders of the churches stood up and reported how much their churches had brought as a camp meeting offering. What they reported gains significance when one learns that the cash income of the heads of families does not exceed three dollars per month, and most of this is earned by toiling with their nets as did Peter and John.

The leader of the Kaswanga church (membership 95) reported \$53; then Wanyama (membership 51) reported \$57. No one knew how much a church had raised except its elder and treasurer. We could see the intense interest on every face as leader after leader reported. Finally the leader of Kakimba (membership 78) arose and announced that their offering was \$114. A great sigh arose as the people realized how much this meant. When the totals were added they found that \$401 had been contributed.

The shadows were lengthening and the people were anxious to catch the favoring evening breeze to get across the bay to their island homes. But before leaving, each school presented special songs that had been composed and prepared by the teachers and pupils. A little prize was given to the school judged to have sung the best. So keen was the singing that some schools had to sing their songs twice. After a closing prayer all hastened to load their belongings into the canoes, and head for home. As we watched the silhouettes of the boats in the gathering dusk and the lantern lights begin to flicker, as we heard the drums roll out their rhythm and the Advent songs float over the quiet waters, we rejoiced that God had raised up such

with asphalt tile. The lawn and playground are also receiving special attention which greatly improves the outside appearance of the school. New modern desks have been purchased for two rooms to replace the older type. The library has been completely catalogued and many antiquated volumes discarded. 
#### **Evangelism Flashes**

#### Youth Rally-Worland District




