knew that our medical men do receive commissions as officers in the various services without surrendering their noncombatant rights. I referred the question to the Department of Defense, asking for an explanation.

After some time had elapsed a reply from the Department of Defense stated that those students and medical men who accept military commissions under the pressure of a draft call may be recognized as conscientious objectors, but that those who accept commissions without being under such pressure will not be given such recognition. For that reason the medical student at C.M.E. had been refused a commission unless he surrendered his non-combatant rights.



A Good Place to Live

"It happened in New Zealand years ago. At the conference office we received from a dear old sister who for years had been an isolated Sabbathkeeper a very brief note. She had been ill, and she felt that she had not much longer to live. She made, however, no plea for anyone to visit her to comfort or encourage her. The blessed hope to her was real and substantial. What she asked was that for the sake of her neighbors and friends we would be sure when she died to send one of our ministers to conduct the funeral service. She would see to it, she said, that when the end drew near one of the neighbors would send us word in time.

"A few months later the telegram came. The sister lay dying. We asked Pastor J. Hookings, who was then the Missionary Volunteer secretary—a man over 70 years of age, but young in spirit and devoted to the Master's service—to take the train and go up to the little town where the sister had lived so long in isolation from others of like precious faith.

"Upon his arrival Brother Hookings found that the dear sister had already lapsed into unconsciousness. He was introduced to her physician, an Italian gentleman, and as they sat quietly in a dimly lighted adjoining room awaiting the silent approach of the Grim Reaper, the doctor, who was quietly turning the pages of a book he had taken from the table, said in an undertone to Brother Hookings, 'These are wonderful books, Mr. Hookings.' Brother Hookings assented to the remark, but was inclined to think that the doctor had perhaps mistaken the volume of the Testimonies for the Church for some other similarly bound volume. After a brief interval the doctor said again, 'Mr. Hookings, I think these are very wonderful books.' He spoke with such positiveness that Brother Hookings replied, 'I agree with you, Doctor. But may I ask, what do you know about them?'


"The doctor replied that over a period of months he had been visiting the home as the sister's physician. And he said, 'Whenever I had to wait a while in this room I have taken the opportunity of reading in these red-covered volumes.' He went on: 'Mr. Hookings, I have a large library of my own, and I am a prolific reader. I have read much concerning Christianity and the Christian writings of Protestant authors. I would like to say to you that in all my reading I have never found the gospel in so beautiful a setting as I find it in these books of yours. Tell me, Mr. Hookings,' he continued, 'Do your people believe the things that are written in these books? Do they live according to the wonderful instruction that is given here? I notice that the messages are called Testimonies for the Church. To me they seem to be so practical and at the same time so comprehensive. They deal with home problems and family life and business affairs, as well as with

church relationships and missionary work. I want to ask you, Mr. Hookings, do your people live according to the instruction that is given here? . . . Brother Hookings replied, 'Doctor, we believe that this is indeed wonderful instruction, that it is given of the Lord to the church for these times. We teach it to our people, and we and they do try to order our lives according to it."

"The doctor replied, 'I am so glad to hear that. I will tell you why I ask that question. You see, Mr. Hookings, I am getting on in years. Soon I will have to ask some younger man to take over my practice. As I have contemplated retirement, do you know I have felt that it would be a wonderful thing for a man in his declining years to be able to go and settle down in a community of Christian people who believe in the kind of Christianity that is taught in these books and who shape their lives accordingly. I can think of no outlook that would be more attractive, that would be likely to be more restful and satisfying, than to do that. I feel that is what I would like to do." -A. W. Cormack.


✓ Plans are being laid to dedicate the Hutchinson church, free from debt, on June 7. The members are working hard to have everything completed by this time.

Sunnydale Wins!

We as delegates and contestants for the Oratorical Contest appreciated the kind hospitality shown to us when we were at Enterprise Academy this past week end.

The meeting started Friday evening with Elder C. G. Cross leading out in a panel discussion with several of the delegates. Sabbath morning at the eleven o'clock service, Dr. Russell T. Smith from Lincoln, Nebraska, told many wonderful stories of his experience in the mission field during the past two years. Another panel discussion was held on Sabbath afternoon with Elder Cross leading out on the topic of Tobacco.

I appreciated the stories that Dr. Smith told about one of the Indian Chiefs in the mission field, Chief Chambers. His tribe was poor, with very little of this world's goods. One of the government workers came to him one day and offerred to furnish him seeds if he would plant them and bring the produce to him to buy later. There was one thing wrong with this government worker's offer—the seed he wanted the old Indian Chief to plant was tobacco seed. 
