Civil Air Patrol Chaplaincy

Information from the field indicates some misunderstanding with reference to the denomination's policy concerning the enlistment of our ministers as chaplains in the Civil Air Patrol. We are therefore republishing the following actions and trust this will clear the matter:

"At the 1956 Autumn Council, a recommendation from the Plans Committee with regard to Civil Air Patrol chaplains was referred to the North American Division Committee on Administration for study. In the presentation of this recommendation it was stated that a large number of our young men are enlisting in the Air Force. The enlistment of our young men in any branch of military service deprives them of their noncombatant rights under the law. Those who enlist in the Air Force are subject to courts-martial in refusal to obey an order involving the bearing of arms. The example set by our pastors in enlisting in the Civil Air Patrol, which is closely related to the Air Force, may influence our young men to volunteer for the Air Force. In view of these considerations, it was

"VOTED, That we go on record as

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not giving any more ecclesiastical approval to our ministers who desire to become Civil Air Patrol chaplains."—*Minutes of the North American Division Committee on Administration*, September 12, 1957.

The above mentioned action does not mean that those who are now serving as Civil Air Patrol chaplains must resign their commission.

There has been an increase in the number of our youth enlisting in the Air Force. These youth make it not only difficult for themselves but for their officers as well. Parents and workers are urged to counsel our youth against enlisting but rather wait for the draft. Those enlisting place unnecessary burdens upon the military and jeopardize their keeping of the Sabbath.

Denver Central Vacation Bible School

An average of 225 children were in attendance at the second annual Vacation Bible School conducted at Denver Central Seventh-day Adventist church last August. A total of 243 youngsters actually registered for the school this year.

The school was under the able direction of Mrs. Eileen Walters, who is by profession a teacher in the elementary public school system of Denver. To conduct this successful Vacation Bible School this year required the faithful services of some 50 to 60 adults each day. Out of the entire enrollment 43 per cent were from non-Adventist homes.

Fruits of the Vacation Bible School are the attendance of ten of these students in the regular Sabbath school classes of the church on Sabbath morning. Other girls and boys are being contacted now in connection with the Fall Evangelistic Campaign being held by Elder F. W. Avery, pastor of the church. This year special services for children are conducted simultaneously with the main program.

One young girl enrolled on the first day of school and mentioned that her little brother "sure would like to come." Further inquiry into the circumstances of this family by the Bible worker, Dorothy Mitchell, disclosed that the "little brother" did not possess suitable clothing for the occasion. The Denver

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The Moffat County Fair exhibit was enjoyed by many of all ages as they stopped to view the booth and take some literature being given away. Elder Johnson reported that first prize was awarded the Craig church members for this exhibit.



An average of 225 children attended the second annual Vacation Bible School held in the Denver Central SDA church in August. There were actually 243 registered as students of the school.

Welfare Center soon outfitted him completely and he was ready to begin school the following day.

Vacation Bible School strongly points up the fact that the most effective method of recruiting students for such a program is by personal invitation. For the most part the non-Adventist children which attended this year received a personal invitation from some member of the church.

I am happy to tell you of the goodness of the Lord again and the continuing growth of our Spanish work here in the beautiful San Luis Valley. Our people are of good courage and working hard as you will be able to see.

The Monte Vista Spanish church is now maintaining a little church school. One of the older men of the congregation spent his summer remodeling the little old church building and has made it into a very comfortable schoolroom. There are four large windows on the west side which makes the lighting very satisfactory. A good circulating heater, plus sufficient pupil desks from Denver, and the loan of a piano from a church member make it a very acceptable schoolroom.

At present we have fourteen pupils enrolled and may have two more later. Most of them are in the primary grades. We are fortunate in having an excellent teacher substituting until our regular one is able to come. This will probably

not be until the first of next month.

This is a very interesting missionary project and we hope and pray the interest may be maintained throughout the school year and continue through the years to come, until we can have a strong Christian educational system in this Spanish-speaking community established.

With the remodeling of this other building, it has also made possible the beginning of a separate children's Sabbath school division. The children have already taken a great interest in their new division and we hope that this too will add much to the progress of our church.

Again, we ask an interest in your prayers that the work here in the Valley might continue to grow and that we might all be faithful until the soon coming of our Lord.

News From Cortez District

The Cortez church is very happy this year with its fine school of thirty-seven students and two teachers: Mrs. Marguerite Cooper, Grades 1-4; and Miss Luella Baker, Grades 5-8. The new schoolrooms, located in the recently completed lower level of the church, are light, airy, and fairly well-equipped. The men of the church, led by the pastor, worked long and weary hours, laying the asphalt tile over the 1800 square feet of floor space; making blackboards and repairing desks. The school mothers scrubbed and waxed floors and

did all cleaning necessary so school could open on September 2. As a final touch, the parking area was paved so that the children can have a dry place to play this winter.

The Dove Creek church completely remodeled its big basement room for a bright, colorful and cheery schoolroom. The new asphalt-tiled floor, the light green walls, the refinished desks—all help a great deal, and Dove Creek folk are proud of their eight students and new young teacher, Miss Therissa Crabtree. All the members worked hard to get the schoolroom ready—indeed, by Sunday night, August 31, Elder Goddard wished he could be five or six people, there was so much to do! But God blessed, and both schools opened their doors on time. We praise God for His many providences in helping us obtain materials which helped to complete our fine schools both in Cortez and Dove Creek.

Last July, a new family, Brother Ray Jones, his wife, Darlene, and two children, came to Cortez to live. Brother Jones is a full-time Literature Evangelist. At his conversion he left a well-paying position in the oil fields because he wanted to serve his Lord with all his time and strength. The Joneses found a house; the work was going well; two nephews were taken to board and sent to church school. Then one day, Sister Jones came down with the flu. After a few days in bed, she seemed better, but was still weak and in pain. Then, as each day went by and the fever and

pain continued, Dr. Gardner put her in the hospital for tests. Came that fateful Friday, and the dread diagnosis—Poliol!

That evening, a small group of earnest Cortez church members met at Brother Jones' house for special prayer. Brother James Hagerman of the conference office, who was a great mainstay to Brother Jones that terrible week, was with us. Loving intercessory prayers ascended to the throne of Grace that evening for Sister Jones' healing, and our dear heavenly Father heard and answered our petitions.

From that very evening, Sister Jones passed the crisis and began to get better. The next Wednesday afternoon, she walked out of the hospital—no paralysis, no stiff muscles! She is at home now, still very weak, but improving daily. If we were to project these figures to the total population of a given community it would appear that in some places we actually have one out of every two families viewing IT IS WRITTEN. This would also mean that as many as two out of every three television sets are actually tuned in to IT IS WRITTEN. Results in some areas do not measure up to other areas such as Grand Island and Hastings where competition is stronger because of other existing TV stations.

Nevertheless, we are greatly encouraged. Paul Freygang, General Sales Manager of KHOL TV, tells us with this number of samplings, or contacts as we call them, our survey should be far more effective than any other type of survey which they could secure from National Survey Companies. They are delighted and astonished at these results.

Faith Rewarded

When the Alliance church started sending seven of their children to the church school at Hemingford this year, a transportation problem arose. The desirable solution would be to buy a vehicle to be used as a school bus, but many of the people said that the church couldn't bear the financial burden. Brother Ed Reddick, an automobile salesman, and Dr. Robert Bowen, the local elder, started looking for a vehicle.

The Chevy carry-all was found, and the price was right! But with no money on hand at all to pay for the bus, even a "right price" is a lot of money. Dr.

Bowen, in simple faith, went to the bank and signed a note for the full amount of the bus, so the bus was then a reality. Dr. Bowen asked the banker for a sixty-day note, and the banker seriously questioned if any church could pay off a note in that short period of time, but Dr. Bowen advised him that it seemed possible, although he didn't know himself how it would be done. All that he knew was that buying the bus and sending the children to church school seemed to be the will of God. And if we do God's will, how can we fail?

The faith of the Alliance church elder was rewarded in a marked way, for money came in from several sources that were completely unexpected, and the note was paid off, not in sixty days, but in twenty-nine days, saving half of the interest for the church. "If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, . . ."

"It is an eternal law of Jehovah that he who accepts the truth that the world needs is to make it his first work to proclaim this truth:" *Testimonies*, vol. 7, p. 13.

The Scottsbluff Seventh-day Adventist church is strategically located in the panhandle of Nebraska, along the Platte River, and because of this, it is a stopping off place for many visitors and vacationing brethren. We feel we have a great opportunity to bring our message before the public, and we feel we have found various ways of doing this.

One of the ministers who has stopped and been asked to speak was Pastor J. W. Rowland of Walla Walla, Washington. With twenty-three years of foreign service in Borneo, Philippines and Malaya, and seven years of teaching at our college at Walla Walla, he not only had a good message for our own people, but also provided excellent news and publicity for our church. The public is usually interested in a dedicated man who has given years of service in a foreign land.

The publicity factor of our work in the church cannot be underestimated as the public sees the truth by what we do, or what they see us do. Our "pub-

licity rating" is the sum total of what people see us do, say, act and write—which of course, includes the more obvious news features. Although we are told by the Great Master that we should not let our right hand know what the left hand is doing, we are also admonished to "let your light so shine before men, that they can see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

Our welfare work has been the means by which many people have learned that there is a church by the name of "Seventh-day Adventist" in Scottsbluff. We know the public is for our work, for they support it tremendously with gifts of clothing and bedding. They also give us many names of people needing help. A leading woman radio announcer, Doris Barry of Radio Station KOLT, after a visit to our center, has given many valuable minutes of her radio time to plug our work. Since opening in October of last year, 1547 persons have been assisted with gifts of bedding, clothing, and canned foods from the center. The total evaluation of this is \$20,511.

Mrs. Johnson, manager of the center, says, "All are assisted, none are turned away." This is a rule because no matter how we increase our gifts, we receive more clothing than we give away. We know and believe that "Cast thy bread upon the waters: for thou shalt find it after many days" is true. We do not know that any souls have been won for Christ from our welfare work, but we do know that we have won many friends because of it.

In 1942 he was married to Miss Ruby MeSparran who survives him, as do his three children.
