Will Your Church Be Honored?

A special Ingathering citation, signatured by the General Conference president, secretary, and treasurer will be presented to each church in the North American Division that meets certain specifications in membership participation and in fund raising gains over last year. Many hundreds of churchessmall and large-will be honored with this distinctive citation, given for the first time in our denominational history. The name of your church will be prominently hand lettered on this citation.

The two specifications upon which the presentation of this new citation is based are membership participation in the Ingathering campaign (either by going or giving,) and the percentage gain over the Ingathering total raised for the 1958 campaign. The following churches will be eligible to receive this citation:

I. The church that in the 1958 campaign raised a per capita below \$20, but in this campaign makes a ten per cent gain, and has seventy-five per cent of its members participating in the Ingathering campaign.

2. The church that in the 1958 campaign raised a per capita of \$20 or above, but in this campaign makes a five per cent Ingathering Burnend 31-NOLDNIHSVM

3. The church that raised the Minute Man Goal (24.98), and has seventyfive per cent of its members participating.

To enjoy these speakers and the rest of the fine program being preparedplan now to be at the congress in Lincoln, April 22-25.



AN APPEAL TO THE READERS OF THE REAPER

God has pronounced a particular blessing on the study of the past of the Advent movement, At Union College, under the leadership of Dr. E. N. Dick and others, strong courses in denominational history have been developed through the years. Two upper division, specialized classes in the rise and growth of modern Adventism are offered regularly. For these courses and for other research purposes, new source material is needed. Union College, therefore, appeals to all church members and workers, who are in possession of or who know of material of historical value to the deeper understanding of God's work in the past, to communicate with the college.

Union College is interested particularly in letters to and from our older workers, telling of their experiences and views; photographs of workers, church groups, camp meeting groups, church buildings, etc., church reports, minutes, and accounts; denominational books, pamphlets, and periodicals more than 40 years old, especially early Ellen White books; charts, handbills, posters used by early workers; camp meeting and conference programs, folders, etc., including song sheets.

Union College has no funds with which to buy historical materials, but would be glad to receive such documents, photographs, books, etc., from friends of the college who might be willing to donate them, so that the history of God's people can be made more vivid and accurate to the students. 
Business Club Banquet



Kansas Youth Rally



Last week end was spent with the church in Sioux City. The members there are of good courage and have reached their Ingathering goal for 1959.



This generation is a reading generation. Thousands of books and periodicals are being published every month, and most of them to destroy rather than to develop the spiritual value in life. There are but few periodicals which do not mix the evil with the good. Crime and immorality, animal passion and perverted appetite fill much of the reading material of today. There are some magazines that should never be found in the reading racks and on tables of an Adventist home. It is within the possibility of Adventist parents to develop in their children, the desire of good reading; reading that develops character for the kingdom of God. You find such carefully selected literature for all ages, from the youngest to the very oldest in the family, right in your church.

Recognizing the value of all our SDA

papers, there is one periodical we are told should be in every home. From Vol. 4, p. 599, I quote: "Our people should make greater efforts to extend the circulation of the Review. . . . Every family should have this paper. . . . Those who consent to do without the Review and Herald, lose much. Through its pages, Christ may speak to them in warnings, in reproofs and counsel, which would change the current of their thoughts, and be to them as the bread of life." We are further told that the Review is a valuable paper and cheap at the full price. "If any are too poor to take it, the church should, by subscriptions, raise the amount of the full price of the paper, and supply the destitute families.

What more could the Lord say than what is given in these urgent words? One has said, "He who is a faithful reader of the Review & Herald will never leave the message." Now, what is our record? With a growing membership are we increasing, or decreasing? In 1954 our conference subscription list amounted to 1400; in 1955 we dropped to 1307; in 1956 we increased it to 1314; but in 1957 we decreased it to 1218. My appeal is to awaken and stop this downward trend. A suggestion to lay away a few dimes a week may make it possible to subscribe for the Review at the time the price is reduced.

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
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
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Branch Sabbath School Evangelism

Would you like to add some new members to your church? Some think that a large evangelistic company is necessary to accomplish this. Others feel that only the ordained ministry can do this. Apart from the foregoing methods, there is another way that your church can build up its membership. Here it is.

Let the Sabbath School Council give study to the location of a Branch Sabbath school. Once the plan is perfected it should be presented to the Sabbath school for the support and prayers of the entire membership. Once started, the Branch Sabbath school leader should give periodic reports to the parent Sabbath school regarding the progress of the Branch school. The parent school should continue its support until the Branch school develops into a company or church.

Does this plan work? It works when the pastor, Sabbath school superintendent and his school believe in the plan and support it. Let Elder E. E. Hagen, of Kansas, tell you how it worked in Hutchinson, Kansas. He writes:

"Some years ago the Hutchioson church established a Branch Sabbath school at McPherson but it soon developed into a duly organized Sabbath school of its own, and today the Mc-Pherson Sabbath school is thriving and prospering. Already the church members have begun a fund-raising program to buy a lot on which a church building can be erected.

"The Sabbath school organization in McPherson thus far in 1958 has resulted in eight souls joining the church through baptism. On September 20 a baptism was held at Hutchinson wherein the Jarvis family and Judy Follett were joined to the church. Three others were baptized from McPherson earlier in the year.

"Leading out in this soul-winning venture are Brother and Sister Arthur Follett, who formerly lived at Hutchinson but have taken up residency at McPherson. It is through their untiring effort with others joining them that this Sabbath school and church company has prospered. With their current zeal we can look forward to the establishment of a church organization in McPherson in the months ahead."

May we count on each Sabbath School Council, Sabbath school superintendent and pastor to seriously study this profitable method of evangelism? When the leaders lead, the members will follow.
