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



Public Relations in Practice



A new opportunity for reducing our mailing costs has presented itself. A new set of mailing regulations enables us to send much important mail at greatly reduced rates.

Two features that are most helpful is material that can be marked "Educational Material" and "Library Material." Such mail has been granted special rates when sent by churches and non-profit organizations.

This means that mail formerly sent at parcel post rates which begins at 23 cents for the first pound in a local zone, and rapidly increases in price as the weight and distance increases, may now be sent for 9 cents for the first pound

and 5 cents for each additional pound, irrespective of distance, if it falls under this "Educational Materials" classification. Much of our mail is in this classification and it means a great saving because of our large volume of mail.

When you receive mail from the conference office marked "Educational Materials" or "Library Material" give it immediate attention. It is important. We are making use of an opportunity to give you service that you want at these mailing rates.

The items that can be sent at "Library Material" rates enjoy an even lower rate of 4 cents for the first pound and 1 cent a pound for each additional pound. If you have borrowed films, film strips, tapes, or books from us, they can be returned to us at these rates. Phonograph records can be sent to us at this rate whether borrowed or not.

Freedom of the Press

I understand that one of our workers in China has recently been sentenced to life imprisonment for attempting to translate one or more Spirit of prophecy books. When I heard that, I realized that I haven't begun to appreciate the blessings of "freedom of the press." No. I've taken that for granted because that is all I've ever known. How about you?

Not so very long ago, we had publishing houses in China putting out many types of literature in Chinese proclaiming the three angels' messages. Today, there is nothing, Our workers are persecuted. They have no more campaigns. We still have them here. What is your attitude toward them? Are they a burden or a blessing to you?

Suppose Chinese Adventists could suddenly send a missionary journal like Signs of the Times to their people as a soul-winning venture—how do you suppose they would feel and react? What is happening in China now will happen to Adventists everywhere some day. It may be brought about in a different way by a different sponsor—but "freedom of the press" will not always be ours. Let's

not forget that!

What thrills me is how Signs leads souls to the truth. Every year we have a fresh supply of experiences to tell on this thrilling subject. This year's seem better than ever to me. For example, there is one about a Methodist minister and his family from Arizona. He resigned a pastorate of 1,000 members, and he and his family have been baptized. He is now canvassing, and later, plans to be a minister in our ranks. One of our preachers conducted a Catholic funeral because relatives liked Signs. They gave him \$14.00 head tax to sponsor Signs for other relatives. Then at Grand Junction, we have two families of Griffins who are Adventists now because Mr. and Mrs. Ben Franklin sponsored Signs for them a few years ago. These are only samples of experiences you will hear fully when Signs is presented in your church this year.

Please consider what is happening in China this very day and decide that your family will sponsor five or more Signs this year for others. Please do it while we have the precious gift of "freedom of the press."

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Whence Came Sunday Laws?

The right to worship God according to the dictates of the conscience is an American heritage. In this country the full and free right to entertain any religious belief, to practice any religious principle, and to teach any religious doctrine which does not violate the laws of morality and property, and which does not infringe upon personal rights, is conceded to all. This important right has experienced a life span of only 150 years in the United States. In many countries of the world it is not an accepted right, much less an assured fact.

This God-given right did not come to us by accident. It was not brought to this country by those who came over on the Mayflower. Rather, after much misunderstanding, persecution and conflict, it was hammered out and then incorporated by the people of the United States into their national Constitution as expressed in the first and fourteenth amendments to that Constitution.

Long before the Constitution and its amendments were adopted, bigotry, intolerance, and persecution afflicted the people of our land. The bigotry, intolerance and persecution were caused by religious laws, some of which were so drastic that they came to be known as "blue laws." It is significant that the very first religious laws imposed upon an American colony required church going on a specific day of the week under penalty of death for persistent violation.

The New England colonies enacted and enforced religious laws of which from twelve to sixteen carried death penalties. Of these, the common religious offenses were idolatry, witchcraft, blasphemy, persistent and presumptuous Sunday desecration, and the return of heretics (Quakers and Catholics) after banishment.

The execution of religious dissenters was the logical outcome of the state-enforced religious laws. When a religious law with a mild penalty was persistently disobeyed, zealous churchmen sought to compel conscience by stricter and harsher laws. The Massachusetts laws against Quakers constituted a prime demonstration how religious laws persecuted men unto death in the name of the God they professed to honor.

Many of these "blue laws" persisted after the adoption of the federal Constitution. If such laws exist in any community today, they should be recognized as "hangovers" or "leftovers" of something that has been repudiated by the American people and that is not in harmony with the principles of their Constitution.

There is no small diversity of opinion regarding the propriety of keeping one day in seven holy. The Moslem looks upon Friday as his day of rest. The Jew, Seventh-day Baptist and Seventh-day Adventist maintain that the seventh and not the first day of the week is the true Sabbath. A large number of sincere persons declare that the first day of the week has supplanted the seventh day as the Sabbath, and because of this must be observed sacredly.

The very nature of the issue makes it evident that Sunday legislation is religious legislation. The argument that Sunday laws are framed to give the working man a day of rest is nothing but pious mouthing to hide the religious character of the law. One might as well argue that since the night was ordained for man to rest from his day's labor, then laws should be enacted forcing man to sleep at night. One is as foolish and futile as the other.

However, God has not given any community, state or government the right to decide religious issues. Man is answerable to the government, state or community for the violation of laws regulating his conduct to his fellow men. Man is answerable to God, and God alone, for his religious beliefs and practices.

To concede that the government has a right to impose one religious duty upon a minority against their will, implies that the government can enforce all religious duties. This right, once granted, carries with it police action and persecution, and the chain that binds a minority group will in time bind the majority.

Each Seventh-day Adventist church, officer and member should be intelligently informed regarding Sunday laws and their threat to American freedom. The following two tracts should be read by all:

Tract No. 59-1, "Sunday Laws and Your Freedom" Tract No. 58-6, "Sunday Laws: What to do About Them"

This material could be used as a basis for discussion in service clubs, town and city councils, church meetings, ministerial association meetings and in formulating letters to newspaper editors.
