"She didn't need to tell me. I knew,"

This tragic incident has a Christmas setting, but as long as there are children and as long as there are vehicles which can take their lives, this story will be timeless. sic instructor and also in choral and quartet membership.

High Lights In **Central States Conference**

Before we ring down the curtain on 1961, we submit this thrilling report on evangelism.

Evangelism 1961

ST. LOUIS-101 added to church by baptism-the largest number of souls ever baptized in a single year in the Central States Conference. On Sabbath, November 18, 18 candidates received the rite of baptism. This brought the total to 101 for the year. The unique thing about this thrilling experience is the fact that no public effort was conducted; instead, the members of the Berean church united with their pastor, D. B. Reid, in an integrated program of evangelism, utilized the Voice of Prophecy broadcast and Bible school lessons and created an interest. Scores of truth-seekers were contacted by the pastor and Mrs. Rosa Pugh, our Bible instructor, and by trained lay-workers, which resulted in this great harvest of souls. Pastor D. B. Reid has already laid plans for a more aggressive program of soul winning in 1962.

DES MOINES-church membership tripled-the summer tent meetings conducted by Evangelist S. D. Meyers, pastor of the Omaha, Nebraska, church, added approximately 50 souls. This practically tripled the present membership. It is a thrilling sight to behold on Sabbath mornings upward of 75 children and adults worshiping in the church, where formerly were many vacant pews. Pastor Scales and Mrs. Hampton, our conference Bible instructor, are busily engaged in binding off the interests and integrating into the church program these fine adherents to the faith.

DENVER-summer evangelism created problem-Evangelist C. Sampson Myles, assisted by Mrs. Fitch and Mrs. Lewis, Bible instructors, and a fine dedicated group of laymen, conducted the first

successful tent effort, in a number of years, in Denver, Over 50 new members have been added by baptism, with a number waiting to receive this sacred rite.

This large influx of new members has created a seating problem in the church auditorium. To alleviate the crowded situation, two services are conducted on Sabbath—one for the adults in the main auditorium, and the other for the juniors in the lower auditorium. Pastor Myles and his congregation are now in a fundraising program for the purpose of erecting a much needed new church building in Denver to provide for the fast growing membership.

KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI– Pastor G. Herfin Taylor has kept his church doors opened on Sunday nights presenting a series of timely and prophetic messages, which resulted in a fine interest in Kansas City. Thus far to date 20 souls have been baptized and the prospects are good for additional baptisms early in the year.

All of our pastors have engaged in some form of evangelism during the year; and in spite of difficulties are able to report souls for their labors.

God is blessing, wonderful spirit of cooperation. Victory for entire district in sight." Topeka-Pastor sends word of encouragement. "Topeka and Junction City will join the victory churches soon."

The results thus far are encouraging and success is assured, Pastor Winley, district leader for Kansas City, Kansas, and Leavenworth, Kansas, reports both churches are now actively engaged in the program. In spite of the scarcity of money in this area, the people have responded to our appeals. The church will have its goal soon.

We give up the heavenly treasure for the sake of having more of this earth. This is a loss that we cannot afford to sustain. If we live so that we can have the blessing of God, we shall have His prospering hand with us in our temporal affairs; but if His hand is against us, He can defeat all our plans, and scatter faster than we can gather." Testimonies, vol. 5, pp. 271, 272.

I believe God is blessing our field in a wonderful way. Our tithe and other church offerings are increasing every year. 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No Place to Hide?

Man is burrowing underground. Centuries of supposed cultural and scientific progress confront him with a dismal choice—either crawl into a hole, or remain outside and be blown to bits.

Where can man hide from the fury of a 20 megaton bomb? A nuclear warhead on target over any city will kill 90 per cent of the people within 8.7 miles of the blast. Skincharring heat will kill unprotected persons standing 29 miles from the explosion. The wind-like force generated by the inferno races at 670 miles an hour at one and a half miles out, and it roars with the power of a 160-mile-an-hour typhoon at ten miles from the center of the detonation. Who and what can withstand this holocaust?

Where can God's people hide at such a time? Besides heeding the counsel of government agencies to erect fall-out shelters, Christians need to seek a hiding place from even greater devastations of sin and worldliness. A nuclear explosion may deprive one of life temporarily, whereas sin deprives one of life eternally.

A day is coming when men will seek hiding places from a brightness far greater than that of any man-made bomb. This terrible brightness rolls the heavens together and moves mountains and islands out of their places. Men will again burrow into the dens and rocks of earth, saying:

"Fall on us, and hide us from the face of him that sitteth on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb: For the great day of His wrath is come; and who shall be able to stand?" (Rev. 6:16-17).

Modern man is faced with the choice of either hiding *in* Christ now, or hiding *from* Christ at His second coming. No doubt, the prophet had this in mind when he wrote: "Seek ye the Lord, . . , it may be ye shall be hid in the day of the Lord's anger." (Zeph. 2:3).

Thank God, there is a hiding place for Christians in the day of God's wrath. That place is not in the dens and rocks of earth, but in a Person. Speaking of Christ, the prophet Isaiah said: "And a man shall be as an hiding place from the wind, and a covert from the tempest; as rivers of water in a dry place, as the shadow of a great rock in a weary land." (Isaiah 32:2).

Rather than looking down, this is a time for Christians to look up. Said the apostle Paul: "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth. . . . Your life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ, who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with him in glory." (Col. 3:1-4).

With these promises in mind, let us take courage and seek God in prayer, Bible study and daily consecration. Let's also seek Him in Sabbath school and church service each Sabbath day. And let us place our children in church schools, conference academies and Union College—institutions ordained of God where youth can seek and find God.

For us, seeking the Lord means that we shall at all times, and under all circumstances, be found doing the Lord's work and keeping His commandments. There is no other way to be hid in the day of the Lord's anger.

We do have a hiding place-Christ!

"Hiding in Thee, Hiding in Thee, Thou blest 'Rock of Ages,' I'm hiding in Thee."
