#### Medical-Ministerial Fellowship Meeting

Dr. Jack W. Provonsha, associate professor of Christian Ethics, Loma Linda University, is here shown giving his interesting and thought-provoking lecture, "The Battle for Men's Minds," at the Medical-Ministerial Fellowship meeting held in Glenwood Springs, April 2-5. The ministers, doctors and their families attending this meeting numbered well over 300. Elder M. V. Campbell, general vice-president of the General Conference and chairman of the Board of Trustees of LLU, gave the devotional talks and the Sabbath sermon. It was evident that those present at these meetings were convinced of the importance of doctors and ministers working together more closely in carrying out the great gospel commission.

The night after the Sabbath at a meeting of the Colorado Chapter of the Loma Linda University Alumni Association, it was voted that the chapter would sponsor raising funds to erect a clinic building for the La Vida Mission. ference were given and the business of the session conducted.

Coats, Home Missionary, Sabbath School, Radio-TV Secretary; P. A. Kostenko, Educational, Temperance, MV Secretary; W. C. Hewes, Fublishing Secretary. Elder Chase will also serve as Religious Liberty, Self-Supporting Institutions and Medical Secretary.

The president reported concerning the conference of fice building which is under construction. "During recent years, moneys have been made available, . . . enabling us to have a modern yet modest office on the outskirts of southeast Kansas City, Missouri. Occupancy date should be some time during May, 1964. We believe this building will be appreciated by the entire constituency of our conference and we heartily welcome all our

believers to visit it at 8440 Blue Ridge Boulevard."

Notice these items from the president's report: "For many years, both St. Louis and Kansas City have recognized the need of having modern and adequate school facilities for their school-age youth. The St. Louis school, costing close to \$150,000, is nearing completion and will definitely be ready for use during the next school year. The Kansas City school is about two thirds completed and with increased emphasis being placed upon its completion, it should also be ready for occupancy next fall. The cost of the Kansas City school will be, including land, about \$175,000. We are justly proud of these two excellent school plants. Also, we are very thankful for the new school at Rolla. Our Rolla church members have themselves worked much on the building, as well as giving the materials for it.

"A: Columbia certainly one of the nicest city churches in the Missouri Conference, and probably in the Central Union, was dedicated on March 14, 1964. This building was begun during the past biennium. It stands as a monument to tremendous giving and effort on the part of many.

"At Kingsville we find one of the nicest country churches in our conference. It was dedicated on November

9, 1963. It, too, stands as a memorial of sacrifice and service.

"At Mountain Grove the church members have worked hard and given liberally for their new church build-

ing. We hope it will be completed before long."
