Evangelism Planned

Union College students are about to embark upon an ambitious plan of evangelism.

"Our basic objective is to help others learn of the gospel of Christ, but we hope also to give each student an opportunity to develop his own Christian experience," stated Kit Watts, Union College MV leader.

Students will work together in teams of two. These teams will contact families in the church to obtain names of people who have been former members of the church or who have shown a definite interest. These names will be screened by an MV committee to determine genuine interest. The students then accompany the church member on a visit to the interested person. To the homes of those who show a real interest, the students return a week later. At this visit the interested person may be presented with literature or be enrolled in a Bible Correspondence Course.

"We favor a program such as this because only people who are genuinely interested are contacted," said Kit. "Also this program offers an opportunity to the maximum number of students for participation."

For each month the MV Department has a theme. For September the theme was "Telespective." This meant that the objective for September was to acquaint each student with the ways that he personally can evangelize. For October the theme is "Alltruism for students." The MV hopes to develop in each participating student a concern for others.

We hope that you will remember the Union College MV Department in your prayers as it undertakes this program of evangelism.

Union College-Your College

The place where your son may spend three-fourths of his time during the next four years-or it may be your daughter. Do you know what kind of a college it is? Do you know what kind of teachers occupy the desks in front of your son's classroom several days each week? Do you know anything about the industrial foremen who will have contact with him as much as six days a week? Do you know the faculty adviser who will offer counsel in your stead when "he" or "she" becomes troubled? Or the dean who has to "lay down the law" occasionally?



During the next few weeks we shall give you some intimate glimpses of the Union College Administration and Faculty, its problems and its goals, its possibilities and its limitations, its dealing with your son or your daughter. We want you to know Union College better, to feel it is not just "the Adventist college at Lincoln," but that it is YOUR school. We want you to get acquainted with its traditions and its inner workings; yes. but more than that-we want you to know the people behind the red brick walls of the administration building, We want you to become acquainted with the instructors who are helping your boy with his chemistry or his math, or your daughter with her English or Home Economics.

We wish we had time to introduce to vou each administrative officer, each instructor, and each work supervisor individually. But since that would make a total of well over one-hundred peopleyou recognize our problem. So what we want to do is to give you an inside view into the various departments and acquaint you with the function of each, with special emphasis upon how that department and its leadership affects the individual student-your son or your daughter.

Next week we will introduce you to the administration of Union College. Many of you may know the administrative officers, but we hope you will understand a little more of their problems and their goals and how they affect your student.

Pathfinders Inspect Cave

Pathfinders and parents of the Cheyenne church had a breath-taking look recently into a 50-foot cave that appeared at first to be an innocent "hole" on the top of Table Mountain, some 20 miles northwest of Cheyenne.

A test was made to accertain the depth of the hole, and one of the 15-year-old boys took a day to make a rope ladder that would reach the bottom. This done, 24 youth and adults chose a balmy Sunday morning to return to Table Mountain and explore the cave.

Eighteen of the group made the actual descent on the rope ladder and one by one landed on the muddy floor below. They discovered the bones of animals lying around, which had apparently fallen in from time to time and died. In the subterranean cavern, passages led off in four directions. Even though the weather outside was warm that day, the Pathfinder group were glad they wore

sweaters, once they had actually started exploring the tunnels. Scattered stalactites and stalagmites were found, and, among other things, a live salamander of a species common in this area.

Earlier explorers in the cave—the only cave of any size near Cheyenne—had left their mark, the oldest date being that of 1890 and the most recent date, 1916.

Every person, while going down the rope ladder, had only one question uppermost in his mind, "Will the rope hold?" It was a first-class lesson in courage and faith, for the thought was later impressed on each one, "If Jesus had hold of the rope, do I have the kind of faith that trusts Him in a time of darkness and uncertainty? And will He bring me out of the experience safely?"

All of this loving kindness helped the Cox family keep their interest in the church during the trying days when Mr. Cox was trying to get his Sabbaths off.

From Rome we toured the ruins of Pompeii, the city that was destroyed in 79 B.C. by the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius. As we viewed these ancient ruins and saw evidences of their pagan worship, the debauchery, and immorality, we could not help but think that Pompeii, like the cities of Sodom and Comorrah, was destroyed because of the licentiousness of its inhabitants. Are the cities any better today? The Scriptures say: "Likewise also as it was in the days of Lot; they did eat, they drank, they bought, they sold, they planted, they builded; ...," Luke 17:28.

Our next stop was Greece, where we visited the cities of Athens and Corinth. It was a real thrill to stand on Mars Hill where the Apostle Paul, many centuries ago, declared to the Athenians the identity of the unknown God, which is indeed the true God.

reached in any way other than the air waves over radio or TV.

I can think of only two ways of reaching them that will be mainly used and that is radio and the literature ministry. May God put upon our hearts a great burden for both of these avenues of soul winning, and as we receive the offering for the Voice of Prophecy on Sabbath, October 9, will you not make it a particularly liberal one in view of the fact that hundreds are yet to be warned who may never be reached in any other way.

In areas where the Voice of Prophecy does not reach, should not our local brethren and pastors make an urgent endeavor to help put on the Voice of Prophecy on their local station. These broadcasts over small stations usually come at a very nominal figure, and in some cases we might arrange to put on the DAILY broadcast of the Voice of Prophecy.

Colorado is blessed in having the daily broadcast on one Denver Station KDEN 1340 kilocycles at 6:30 p.m. and over the large 10,000 watt station KLMO, 1050 kilocycles, 4:30 p.m. at Longmont, enabling perhaps a million and a half of our people to hear this broadcast daily. In spite of this, many people like to listen to their own local station; therefore, it is necessary to get this truth-filled program on as many outlets as possible.

Let us give and pray earnestly that this radio ministry may continue uninterrupted over the broad plains and mountain areas of our great state.
