Student Missionary Writes Again

John Felkel, UC's student missionary, is spending the year at Taiwan Missionary College. The following two experiences are taken from a recent letter from John.

'Last Saturday night I was riding on a motorcycle with one of the overseas workers when we noticed a crowd gathered along the side of the road. This road is a big modern highway that goes all the way from the college here into Taipei. We stopped the motorcycle and went over to see what was going on. An older man and two younger men were trying to sell some 'medicine' that they had demonstrated there, so we got in on the last part of the demonstration. The older man took a stone which must have weighed 30 or 40 pounds and dropped it about three feet onto the chest of one of the vounger fellows lying on the ground. The stone made quite a THUD when it hit his chest but the young man immediately jumped up, showing that the 'medicine' had allowed him to take such torture without any harm coming to his body. One man in the audience bought some of the 'medicine' while we were there then quickly made his way to his bicycle and hastily rode off. He seemed quite embarrassed but later we thought it might have been because we were standing in the audience. The 'medicine'

looked like it was a mixture of powdered rocks or some kind of colorful powderlike material. It cost about \$.25 (U.S. money) for a small package of the stuff.

"My Chinese language study is in full swing now. I am exchange teaching with one of the students from the college here. I teach her English and she teaches me Chinese, First I had to learn a type of phonetic alphabet that is used to teach voungsters in school how to speak Chinese. There are 37 symbols in this phonetic alphabet and when someone writes these phonetic symbols beside the Chinese characters I can pronounce the word. To teach me Chinese, the girl uses a book that is used in the Chinese schools as a children's reader much like the first-grade readers used in the States. The book has the Chinese characters in it and beside them are the phonetic symbols which I use to correctly pronounce the characters. I couldn't possibly learn to write Chinese in one year so I am concentrating on learning to speak the language. I hope by the time my one year is over that I can converse quite readily in Chinese."

John writes that he might have a chance to go up into the mountains to see the tribal people before the summer is over. He plans to send movies, slides, and a tape recording soon for MV programs.

agent. This gives man both the right to choose good or evil. Mature individuals possess the ability to study to know what is right.
