"Millionaires" spelled out in letters of gold marked the special reserve banquet tables. One hundred seventysix distinguished-looking guests filled the Palomino Room banquet hall. The famous Glenwood Springs Village Inn had never served such outstanding millionaires! No cigar smoke, clinking of cocktail glasses, nor smug overstuffed looks of affluence marred the proceedings. All faces instead reflected the light of heavenly riches, the deeper joy that only literature evangelists truly understand.

A beautiful 20-foot mountain range mural on the wall of the banquet hall entitled "The Million-Dollar Highway" immediately gripped the attention of everyone present. The master painter was Literature Evangelist Lee Fredrick of Colorado! Veteran publishing leader, A. L. Page, then painted a word picture of the Central Union's climb from \$188,384 worth of literature delivered in 1960 to the grand total of \$1,013,970 in deliveries for 1968. This marvelous million-dollar victory was more than double the union deliveries of just three years ago and \$281,234–38%—more than literature deliveries of 1967. Everyone present praised God and pledged themselves by His power to win more than 300 souls and deliver more than \$1,400,000 in 1969.

During the banquet highlight—the unveiling of the honor roll—37 trophies were presented to literature evangelists in the above \$10,000 delivery category. The inscription on the trophies read, "For faithful service—member of the \$1,000,000 club, 1968." With mounting excitement the conference presidents and publishing secretaries announced their literature evangelists of the year. Central States—William Morris; Colorado—Albert Powell; Kansas—Charles Jones; Missouri—Glenn Willits; Nebraska—Clair Pettit; Wyoming—Mrs. Lois Boyd.

All were eagerly waiting for the big climax of the evening—the presentation of the Central Union Literature Evangelist of the year. Then Elder R. H. Nightingale, amid approving applause, introduced Eugene Ryan of Missouri Conference as the Central Union Literature Evangelist of the year. Brother Ryan is a real soul winner; five of his customers were baptized this past year. He was third from top in deliveries, reaching over \$21,000 worth for

Every hour literally overflowed with challenges from our leaders, thrilling experiences, helpful ideas from literature evangelists, and interesting films. The spirit of soul winning and preparation for the latter rain pervaded the entire meeting. Dr. Robert L. Osmunson of Loma Linda University keynoted the convention with the challenge "Zero Hour and Holding" and other deeply devotional messages. God's Spirit met with us right from the beginning. Elder Herbert H. White of the General Conference Publishing Department lifted our thoughts each day to the higher principles of salesmanship and success.

On Thursday, the presidents' day, Elder R. H. Nightingale and the conference presidents challenged us to a deeper consecration and to greater achievements during the new year. Publishing house representatives, W. R. Wollard, J. C. Kinder and Clyde Best of the Pacific Press and C. K. Okuno of the Review and Herald, presented the latest facts on new publications, new ideas in selling, and guidance in managing finances.

Through the helpful service of district pastor, Ken Schelske, our Sabbath meetings were held in the Methodist church. It was an unforgettable picture—a Methodist church filled with Seventh-day Adventist literature evangelists! A large map of the Central Union with the words "Light the Central Union with His Glory" gripped the attention during the afternoon soul-winning trophy hour. Literature workers told their stories then placed the pictures of souls won on this large map. During the closing appeal each worker came forward, placed a red banner on the map pinpointing his territory, and thus indicated his resolve to win at least one family for the truth during 1969.

Special prayer lists with top lines reserved for customer families whom they wish to see baptized were placed in the hands of every worker. Our hearts were full as we saw each literature worker from every conference of the Central Union make this pledge and again in the final service promise to stay true without looking or turning back until Jesus says, "Well done." Please pray for this great colporteur army and especially that a hundred new workers may join them during this coming year!
