Fall Council Report Of Columbia Union Literature Work*

President, Columbia Union Conference

The Columbia Union has a population of more than 27,000,000. Within its territory there are 1,900 cities and towns with populations ranging from 1,000 to more than 2,000,000. At the present time we have 189 colporteurs.

In 1939 these faithful book and magazine workers sold and delivered \$110,000 worth of our truth-filled literature. The magazine work in the Columbia Union has made phenomenal progress. Life and Health, Health, Liberty, the Watchman, and Message magazines have been sold in large numbers by our magazine workers. In 1939 they sold more than 400,000 single copies, (400,566)—over 12,000,000 pages. If laid end to end these pages would have formed a continuous chain 2,260 miles in length.

Every conference president is back of the book and magazine work in this great territory. Their outstanding support has to a very large degree made possible this excellent report.

No single factor among us is more potent in bringing men and women into a saving knowledge of the truth than the sale and distribution of our denominational literature. One of our leading evangelists, in an effort launched about the middle of January of 1940 in a large city auditorium, provided a long table right at the entrance of the auditorium upon which our truth-filled books were displayed nightly. Many times the evangelist directed the attention of his audience to some particular book on the subject presented by him that night in

the auditorium. To the best of my knowledge the evangelist himself never wrote even as much as a tract for publication, but in the first six months of that effort he and his associates sold \$2,500 worth of literature. Many copies of that marvelous book "Great Controversy" were sold; more than 5,000 Crisis books on numer-

ous topics, and 2,000 copies of "Gospel in Song." Three hundred and fifty-six precious souls already have been baptized in that effort.

During the past biennial period three new churches were raised up in two conferences through interests first created by our literature. These books and magazines often prove to be the opening wedge for evangelistic efforts later. In 1905 Sister White wrote:

"Instruction has been given me that the important books containing the light that God has given regarding Satan's apostasy in heaven should be given a wide circulation just now, for through them the truth will reach many minds. 'Patriarchs and Prophets,' Daniel and the Revelation,' and 'The Great Controversy' are needed now as never before. Twenty years ago one of our colporteurs, who is now sleeping in Jesus, sold a copy of "Patriarchs and Prophets" to a man living near one of our smaller cities. The purchaser of the book later became ill and then spent much time in the study of its precious pages. The contents of the book were discussed by the family and its truths were fixed in the

Spirit of Prophecy Day

STEEN RASMUSSEN

Sabbath, November 30, has been designated by General Conerence action as Spirit of Prophecy Day. A special program has been prepared and appears in the December issue of the Gazette. We would kindly request pastors and church elders to present before the church in the regular Sabbath service on the date mentioned above the wonderful blessings and strength which have come to the cause of God in every way through this great gift. The material in the Gazette is of a suggestive nature and may serve as a guide in a well-rounded presentation of the topic.

During 1940 two books, "Great Controversy" and "Ministry of Healing," have constituted a reading program, and thousands of workers and believers generally have followed the plan of systematically reading these two volumes, following suggestive assignments appearing in the Re-

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minds of the children as they grew up and established homes of their own. About a year ago an effort was held in this city and at its conclusion the grandmother, the wife of the man who purchased the book twenty years before, led the way into the baptismal pool, as 32 children, grandchildren, and relatives followed in the sacred rite of baptism. Five more have since been baptized, making a total number of 37. Eighty-one souls have been baptized to date in this one effort, 48 of whom had their first conviction of duty through the mighty influence of our truth- and spiritfilled literature, which was placed in their hands through the humble and sincere efforts of God-fearing colporteurs.

A few weeks ago one of our sisters, while engaging in Harvest Ingathering work, solicited an elderly man on the street for missions. The man wanted to know what church organization she was affiliated with. She promptly informed him that she was a Seventh-day Adventist. He told her he had been observing the Sabbath for a year and a half, but that he had never met a member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church before. He gave her a contribution and the next Sabbath attended one of our churches in a neighboring city. While the mission offering was being received, he inquired what it was to be used for and then contributed an additional \$5.00. He then made the following statement:

"I have read the Signs of the Times off and on for 35 years. During this time I hid my light under the bushel of fear. At last one year and a half ago I made up my mind to accept the light under severe persecution. I have an Adventist library of your books. I am so thankful to be here. Forty years ago I came in contact with a book entitled, "Bible Readings for the Home Circle" which I prize greatly. Do not hide your light like I did but spread it quickly. Shout your message from the housetops."

The minister in charge of the district where this experience occurred wrote that this man's testimony electrified the new church, which had just been voted into the sisterhood of churches at camp meeting time. This church was raised up in the following manner. One day while doing Harvest Ingathering work, the

pastor encountered a lady unable to contribute at the time, but after he talked to her about the coming of the Lord and the requirements of the Sabbath commandment she said, "That sounds like the teaching of a book that I am now reading entitled, "Our Day in the Light of Prophecy." He immediately arranged for Bible studies, and 13 of the relatives in that one family already have been baptized. This lady is now laboring for one hundred more of her relatives.

During Big Week of 1940, one of our members sold a set of books for \$1 to the owner of a hotel. He placed them in the reading room. A man visiting there read "The Christian Sabbath" and became so interested that he contacted our people and purchased a dozen more copies. He mailed these books to friends of his in Philadelphia and other places. He has since read "The Great Controversy" and is now a regular church attendant. He was formerly an educator from New York City.

In July of this year one of our sisters, a lay member of the church, began to sell our magazines in one of our small cities. She sold a single copy of Life and Health to a lady of the Episcopal Church, who seemed to be a good prospect for a subscription later. In the latter part of the same month the magazine worker returned to this home in company with the assistant field secretary. The lady told her that she had lent the copy that she had formerly purchased to a neighbor and that she was so anxious to obtain another copy that she prayed the Lord would send the magazine sales lady back again, and when our magazine worker returned she exclaimed, "The Lord has answered my prayer." She gave her subscription for Life and Health and then our magazine worker told her about the Watchman magazine and also about the Signs of the Times. She immediately subscribed for both the Signs and Watchman. magazine worker then said, "This friend of mine who is accompanying me has a wonderful book also, and I am sure that you will be interested in it." She was then given a canvass for "Bible Readings." She purchased a full leather copy and wrote out her check for the book and magazines and then said, "I want, in addition, to give you a thank offering for calling"-and she save her an extra dollar. The woman has now accepted the Sabbath and has started paying tithe.

How truthful the statement from the Spirit of prophecy, "Many are on the verge of the kingdom waiting only to be gathered in." In the columns of the Review and Herald of 1885, 55 years ago, Sister White wrote as follows: "God will do great things for us if we will be humble and learn at His feet. Soon more than a thousand will be converted in one day, most of whom will trace their conviction to the reading of our publications."

This great and important work, the sale of our message-filled books and magazines, demands the best talent in our churches. A theological graduate of Washington Missionary College conducted an evangelistic effort in one of our large cities in which 98 were baptized. Among the candidates for baptism was a furniture salesman of one of the large stores of the city. He and his wife, immediately after baptism, entered into the colporteur work. This was two and a half vears ago. Since that time they have sold thousands of dollars worth of our truth-filled literature and actually led 41 precious souls into the truth.

Forty years ago, through the consecrated efforts of our Columbia Union colporteurs, a company of six accepted the truth. Of that number one is now a conference president, and another has been a conference and union president. It has been said that the Columbia Union is the "colporteur's paradise." We trust that this may be increasingly true of this union and all other unions throughout the world field, until the work is completed and the Columbia Union, with its populous cities

Improvement Program

As WE have moved about the conference since Camp Meeting, we have found a spontaneous growth and development of sentiment to bring about improvement of our Camp grounds and Camp Meeting equipment. Our Conference Committee on November 14 gave study to our needs and has made certain recommendations to the conference.

We list our improvement program objectives as follows:

1. SANITATION

All our people who have attended Camp Meeting on the Chesapeake Camp Grounds are acquainted with the sanitary conditions obtaining. There is a demand for improvement. At the time of our last Camp Meeting many expressed themselves as desirous of seeing new sanitary facilities provided. One of our faithful attendants at the Camp Meeting said at the time of our last Camp Meeting that he felt the situation ought to be changed, and that he "felt it" to the amount of \$25. I had not spoken to him again after this conversation at Camp Meeting until Sunday evening, November 17, and he said he remembered his statement very well, and that the \$25 was awaiting our demand at any time. We list this objective first because of its IMPERATIVE NEED.

2. WATER MAIN

Last year it was impossible to get from the trunk line through our water main sufficient water for our dining hall and the needs of those on the Camp grounds. Many times we found ourselves waiting at spigots for water. With our growing work in the confer-

ence and growing attendance at Camp Meeting, we ought to improve this situation. This will necessitate the laying of a larger pipe line from the trunk line to our conference building, to the kitchen, and to the various watering places on the Camp grounds. It will of course be all the more necessary to have a larger water main in order to properly meet the improved sanitary conditions indicated in Number One. This need IS IMPERATIVE.

3. LIVING TENTS

We, the Chesapeake Conference, do not own any 12 x 14 "A" type living tents. We borrow from our sister conferences from year to year. We own the old army tents that so many of us have learned to dislike so heartily. The general sentiment is that we ought to buy for our coming Camp Meeting in 1941 from ten to twenty new "A" type living tents, size 12 x 14. The number that we shall be able to buy will be determined by the success of our Improvement Program throughout the field. The committee plans to provide an installment of new tents each year until we build up our equipment to the place where we can properly care for our people in suitable tents. This need is also IMPERATIVE.

4. YOUNG PEOPLE'S PAVIL-

Our young people's secretary, Professor F. W. Baldwin, said yesterday in our worker's meeting, that for every young person that was able to get into the young people's pavilion, there were two who were turned away. We also understand that our young people just do not like the little pavilion. If it were large enough, I am sure they would try to get along with it, but under the circumstances they ought to have a nice new tent of sufficient size to care for every one of them. This tent ought to be about 50 x 70. This need is also IMPERATIVE because we cannot possibly take care of our young people without a suitable place for meeting, and what would Camp Meeting be like without a good attendance of splendid young people with which God has blessed this movement in the Chesapeake Conference? We believe our young people will take hold of this with enthusiasm and will work heartily with us in raising the General Improvement Fund. Let us as leaders in the conference and leaders of our

young people not disappoint our youth at our Camp Meeting in 1941. The need, let me say it again, IS IMPERATIVE.

5. COMMITTEE ACTION

In order to provide for this General Improvement Program, the Conference Committee voted November 14 to raise the sum of \$5,000 just as far as possible between now and January 1, 1941. Many of our people throughout the conference will want to aid in the sums of \$500, \$100, \$50 and \$25. Those who cannot provide the larger sums will want to lift to the extent of their ability.

Our workers and families are unanimous in their support of this plan and have pledged a total of \$450.

A great work is to be accomplished immediately. The third angel's message is not to be closed in a small, insignificant way. The Sabbath is to be "proclaimed . . . more fully." ("E. W.", p. 33.) It is to be sounded with a "strong voice." (Rev. 18:1-2.) Now is our day of opportunity. We can do much better work with proper equipment. Let us arise and build.

SABBATH SCHOOLS in Class A for the third quarter, having reached the three goals—membership, daily lesson study, and offerings—are: Bethlehem, Norristown Number Two, Northumberland, and Telford.

Many others should be listed in this group. Some Sabbath schools find it difficult to gather in the missing members—those who are indifferent and careless in attendance at church services. Others fail in having 50 percent of the membership studying the lesson daily, a practice which all church members should cultivate until it becomes a habit. Still others find the financial goal holding them back from reaching the grade. If all would consider themselves stewards of the Lord's goods, there would be no shortage of funds to carry on the Lord's work, and Sabbath schools would find the financial goal the easiest of all to reach.

"God has made men His stewards. The property which He has placed in their hands is the means that He has provided for the spread of the gospel. To those

who prove themselves faithful stewards He will commit greater trusts. Saith the Lord, "Them that honor me I will honor.' 'God loveth a cheerful giver.' And when His people, with grateful hearts, bring their gifts and offerings to Him, 'Not grudgingly or of necessity,' His blessing will attend them as He has promised."
