"It Is Later Than We Think"

THE title to this article was used by a prominent historian and editorial writer a few months ago when addressing a large gathering of teachers and educators in their national convention. Among other good things, he said: "Unquestionably we are living in the most critical period of American history. The question is not whether one people or one nation will dominate in the world, but rather whether civilization itself will be able to survive this crisis hour. . . . We shall not muddle through. Our problems are too acute or too complex to be solved in a slow, ponderous manner. It is later than we think."

Other prominent national leaders and writers emphasize the same thought that we are living in a crisis hour. As students of God's word we know that "in the last days perilous times shall come." We know that we are living in the last days and whatever we do for others and for ourselves must be done today — tomorrow may be too late.

In view of conditions in the world and of the needs in our own hearts and lives, it has been decided to give special emphasis at this time to the circulation of the book "Education" during the rest of the year 1942.
