Objectives of Voice of Prophecy

THOUSANDS of people will listen to the message over the radio who would be reached in no other way. Many who are too indifferent to religion to attend a tabernacle or church meeting are interested and aroused by the stirring, timely, urgent voice heard within their own homes. Countless others are held back by prejudice from being seen in a public place, but they listen quietly to the Word of God for the world in its present state, when they can do so in the privacy of their own sitting room. Hence, the Voice of Prophecy broadcast effectively supplies a need in the proclamation of the message for the last days.

There are those who, should a worker call at their homes, would attempt to argue their point of view so strongly as to exclude from their minds the message brought by the worker. These find their own opposition relaxes and their spirit yields to the quiet spiritual instruction poured forth from their radio, and in some cases they have actually bowed on their knees in humble acknowledgment to God for the blessing they have received.

In addition to the powerful effect of the direct radio message upon their minds, a great many thousands have enrolled in the Bible course and had their experience enriched by personal perusal of God's holy Word under the guidance of the Spirit. So step by step they accept the lessons of the gospel and of present truth until many have given their hearts in complete decision to follow the Lord and keep His commandments.

Effective as the local broadcasts of our evangelists are—and they should be encouraged and supported and their numbers increased—yet they lack a certain appeal which accompanies a nation-wide broadcast. Local broadcasts are accepted in a localized way, subject to the local interests and prejudices of the listener.

Many will listen to a nation-wide hook-up, giving it far more weight of influence and credence in their own attitude toward it than they would to a message limited to one or two stations.

The Voice of Prophecy radio program has captured the imagination of our own people to a remarkable degree. They have realized in this plan to give the message simultaneously all over the nation a hope in all believers' hearts that our efforts to give the message of salvation and the warning to be prepared to meet Him may be greatly enlarged and the work more speedily accomplished. Their enthusiastic and sustaining support of the broadcast is a testimony to the loyalty of our people to support such plans as will greatly advance the cause of God. The Voice of Prophecy has won the wholehearted support of believers and has served well to unite their interests in a great common evangelistic purpose which augers well for the future progress of our denominational work.

The Voice of Prophecy broadcast has had an excellent effect on the public in the favorable attitude toward our work which it has promoted. As a background of influence for other lines of work, for our institutions, and for our local evangelistic efforts, it is proving a great help. The frequent, favorable testimonies of our colporteurs, our Ingathering workers, and others, as to its influence is evidence of its supporting strength in our denominational endeavor considered as a whole.

There is need for careful study that the Voice of Prophecy broadcast and the work of local evangelists may be harmonized and plans of cooperation developed that will make for greater results. Some of the problems involved in such cooperation are delicate and

require very careful adjustment if we are to succeed. But there is no question but that, even as the plans are now, the Voice of Prophecy broadcast has been a very real help to local evangelists in creating a favorable attitude and atmosphere in which to work.

To me it is clear that we are only beginning to reap the benefits of the means which are being invested in this enterprise. It is hoped that when opportunity comes on October 16 for an offering to sustain the Voice of Prophecy the response will be one of spontaneous generosity.

I called the next day and she said after I had gone the pain left completely and when she went to the doctor he said it was only a miracle that she didn't have lockjaw. Voice of Prophecy Offering

THE Voice of Prophecy radio program is exerting a very good influence throughout the hills and vales of West Virginia. Up to August 1, 1,338 people in West Virginia had been enrolled in the Voice of Prophecy Radio Bible Correspondence course. This number included 210 juniors and 1,128 adults. The program is being heard on two local stations; namely, Charleston, WGKV, at 9:30 A.M. Sunday mornings, and Huntington, WCML, at 7 o'clock Sunday evenings. It also can be heard very plainly on the Cincinnati station, WLW, Sunday mornings at 10 o'clock as well as on several other stations at the regular hour of 7 P.M. on Sunday evenings.*

Five letters have come to us from the Voice of Prophecy headquarters telling of people who believe the Sabbath truth and are definitely interested in knowing more about the advent message or in meeting one of our ministers. A few excerpts from these letters follow. This first one presents a challenge for follow-up work. "I am a Methodist, but I am beginning to think you are right about the Sabbath day. But I could not keep it, for there is no church here that keeps Saturday. What was the idea in changing the day?" One lady wrote and asked, "If I give the tithe to the Voice of Prophecy radio ministry am I using it as I should, or should part of it be sent to foreign lands?"

We are glad to report that one of our ministers has since visited this lady and has instructed her what to do with her tithe money.

These three people testify that they believe the Sabbath, and ask for further help and guidance in stepping out by faith to keep it. "This is a beautiful lesson, but I can't help wondering how folks who keep the Sabbath can do so continuously in these days of confusion and chaos, with plants and industries running seven days a week. *But with God, of course, nothing is impossible if we trust in Him.*" Another writes: "I like the way you teach the Bible and I believe you are right in regard to the seventh-day Sabbath, and I am endeavoring to keep it." Another letter reveals that a mother and her children are now keeping the Sabbath. "I think your lessons are wonderful. I had many false ideas of my own before studying these lessons but when I find I'm wrong, I'm willing to drop my belief and accept the Word of God. . . . *I am so glad I have found a peculiar people who believe all the Bible.* I and my children are now keeping the Sabbath. Pray for us that we may be faithful, and pray for my husband that he may give his heart to God." Plans are being made for following up every one of these interests.

The Voice of Prophecy offering is to be taken in all our churches on Sabbath, October 16. May God impress each one to give a liberal offering in order to keep the message on the air so that many more may come to know this blessed truth. This secretary would thus be able to assist Brother Ward in fostering the work of the publishing department and sponsoring the sale of our good books and magazines.

We are happy to welcome to this capacity and to our field Miss Hazel Griggs who has served the Ohio Book and Bible House so efficiently over a period of years.

We have enlarged the office space and provided a spacious and attractive room which will contribute much to the success of our publishing department work.

The Columbia Union Conference and the Review and Herald Publishing Association have brought much courage to our hearts as plans were laid to expand and enlarge the field of opportunity for the distribution and sale of denominational literature.

After October 15 all missionary secretaries, colporteurs, and those members doing business with the West Virginia Book and Bible House should address their correspondence to Miss Hazel Griggs. Let us pray that the Lord may continue to bless our efforts as further plans are laid to evangelize this needy field.

Autumn Efforts

SOUL-WINNING evangelism is one of the most pleasing topics that we discuss in our Conference and church work. Just now in the wonderful autumn months of excellent weather we continue to call the attention of our workers and people to the grand opportunity of doing everything possible to win souls for Christ. In previous years this present splendid period of time was consumed in the Ingathering campaign. Now, however, this time is dedicated to soul-winning evangelism, with Ingathering for the year long since completed.

Some summer efforts already have terminated. Fall efforts have started. In the northern part of our conference Brother B. K. Mills, assisted by Brother Spencer Burrows, one of our new ministerial interns, is conducting an effort in the recently renovated Franklin Church building.

Brother Arden Reynolds is conducting a self-supporting effort in the large Newark English Church building in Newark, New Jersey.

Brother Vernon Rees is conducting a Sunday night effort in our Camden Parkside Church building.

Brother W. G. Gibson and Brother Hollis Wolcott are continuing their effort in Pitman, New Jersey which began soon after camp meeting. Already two persons have taken their stand for the truth and ten others are definitely interested. Upon the completion of the Pitman effort, Brother Wolcott plans to open a meeting in Wildwood, New Jersey.

Elder Huddleston and associated workers have terminated their tent effort in Newark and report that 22 people have been baptized and a number of others are in prospect. Elder Huddleston is continuing his effort in Sunday and Wednesday night meetings held in the recently renovated Newark Number Three Church. Danger Signals Along the King's Highway

WHILE Christ was upon earth He loved His church, He guided it, He talked to it, He guarded it, He died for it. When He ascended He gave gifts to it. He wrote seven love letters and sent them care of John the beloved. Before He left it He repeatedly warned it both personally and through His apostles and prophets against false teachers and apostates.

In His first sermon He said, "Beware of false prophets, which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves." Matthew 7:15. In His last address to His disciples He repeated the warning: "For there shall arise false christs, and false prophets, and shall show great signs and wonders; insomuch that, if it were possible, they shall deceive the very elect. Behold, I have told you before." Matthew 24:24, 25.

After His ascension, He again

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warned His church, through the Apostle Paul, in these words: "For I know this, that after my departing shall grievous wolves enter in among you, not sparing the flock. Also of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after them. Therefore watch, and remember, that by the space of three years I ceased not to warn everyone night and day with tears." Acts 20:29-31.

Later, through the Spirit of prophecy, this warning came to us: "For years I have borne my testimony to the effect that when any arise claiming to have great light, and yet advocating the tearing down of that which the Lord through His human agents has been building up, they are greatly deceived, and are not working along the lines where Christ is working."—"Testimonies to Ministers," page 36.

Again, "When anyone arises, either among us or outside of us, who is burdened with a message which declares that the people of God are numbered with Babylon, and claims that the loud cry is a call to come out of her, you may know that he is not bearing the message of truth. Receive him not, nor bid him Godspeed; for God has not spoken by him, neither has He given a message to him, but he has run before he was sent."—Id., page 41.

"It will be found that those who bear false messages will not have a high sense of honour and integrity. They will deceive the people and mix up with their error the 'Testimonies' of Sister White, and use her name to give influence to their work. They make such selections from the 'Testimonies' as they think they can twist to support their positions and place them in a setting of falsehood so that their error may have weight, and be accepted by the people."—Id., page 42.

Question: "Will God cast away His people because some in the church are losing out in their experience, permitting the spirit of the world to alienate them from the truth?
