# "What Hath God Wrought!"

THE success accompanying the nation-wide coverage of the Voice of Prophecy broadcast is far beyond our expectation. In January, 1942, the broadcast was heard over 83 stations throughout the United States. With the opening of 1943 the message was released over 220 radio stations. And now in 1944, the Voice of Prophecy broadcast is heard, in the English language, heard, in the English language, on more than 295 stations in North stations in the Spanish and Portuguese languages in South and Central America. The programs are heard away up in the Arctic circle and also down in the southernmost tip of South America.

More than 300,000 have enrolled in the Bible Correspondence School. The courses are now offered in English for both adults and juniors, and to the "strangers within our gates," in the Spanish, Portuguese, and German languages. More than a thousand definite conversions have resulted during the year.

Every advanced step was taken by faith and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The work is sustained by freewill offerings. An average of a thousand dollars is received daily. Fully one-half of the contributions are one-dollar contributions.

We have sent to our contributors a total of 156,000 books-for-themonth during 1943. More than 4,000,000 radio logs and 303,500 copies of the sermons have been sent on request.

Sixty clerks and stenographers are kept busy handling the mail and preparing the materials. An average of 1,000 letters were received daily and thousands of letters left our office. A grand total of 20,000,000 pages of gospel literature was sent to interested listeners. Each letter and each page of literature was handled by earnest Christian workers and accom-

panied by a prayer.

In response to urgent invitations the Voice of Prophecy broadcasting group has made a number of tours and has appeared in person to large audiences in many parts of the country. The radio congregations have turned out in large numbers to meet those who endeavor to make known "Christ and Him crucified," and who call upon men everywhere to return to God.

As we launch out on the new year, we solicit your earnest prayer and hearty cooperation.

# Washington Evangelistic Effort

THERE is no city in the world that occupies so important and strategic a place at the present time as Washington, our nation's capital. This growing city and its environs have been the specific field of evangelistic endeavor of Elder R. L. Boothby and his associated workers for the past four-teen months.

Constitution Hall and Continental Memorial Hall were both secured for Elder Boothby's Bible lectures, which began September 27, 1942. The meetings continued in Constitution Hall for 25 consecutive Sunday nights. During the week they were held in Continental Memorial Hall.

In the November 4 (1942) issue of the *Christian Century* the following statement appeared:

"Washington, D. C., October 20. A revival, sponsored by Seventh-day Adventists and held in a

rather pretentious setting, has been in progress for two weeks in Constitution and Continental Halls. Evangelist Robert Boothby, of California, and his musician, Leslie R. Mansell, announced their arrival in the city with half-page ads in the local papers. They have been greeted by large audiences. To the best of the writer's knowledge, this is the first time a revival meeting has been held in these two halls. . . ."

Another statement concerning the meetings also appeared in the April (1943) issue of Progress, organ of the International Reform Federation, published in Washington, D. C.: "Perhaps the most remarkable Sunday evening service held anywhere in the United States is that of the Seventh-day Adventists, who last Sunday held their twenty-fifth consecutive service in Constitution Hall, finest and largest auditorium in Washington. There is room here for four thousand persons, and they come service after service to listen to prophetic teaching, with a smaller auditorium . . . five nights a week."

The meetings were continued in the auditorium of the Capital Memorial Church, which is located in the heart of the city, from the middle of March to June.

Early in July Elder Boothby started another series in a large pavilion tent in the southeastern section of the city of Washington, where quite an interest had developed as a result of the meetings in Constitution Hall. This meeting closed about the middle of September.

The church was well filled. The regular program was preceded by a song service under the supervision of Mrs. W. B. Hill. Congregational singing, instrumental numbers, and vocal duets were well rendered. 
