Cincinnati Cooking Class

A GROUP of ladies from the Hamlet and Cincinnati Fairfax Avenue Churches met on Sunday afternoons at the home of Mrs. R. E. Dickinson for a cooking school. Mrs. George Lawrence assisted in these classes.

Each afternoon program began with the devotion taken from Dr. Vollmer's Lessons, "God's Saving Health." In these studies it was learned that proper diet has much to do with a person's conduct and ability to understand the Word of God.

The first lesson was on well-balanced meals. Large colored pictures were placed on the flannel-board to show the appetizing menus. During another lesson one lady was surprised to learn that she was getting an average of thirty-nine grams of protein daily, whereas for her weight she should have been getting fifty-seven. An additional daily intake of protein was the answer to her problem. While studying "The Child and Good Nutrition" a lunch box was packed and the contents charted to see if the lunch carried its full third of the daily body need in protein. The lessons on vitamins and minerals brought out that the least

costly fresh foods are not a bargain if they are old and deficient in vitamins and minerals.

Mrs. Dickinson demonstrated such tempting recipes as pecan loaf, creamed eggs and mushrooms in buttercups, homemade gluten cutlets, coconut crisp cookies, pineapple juice dressing, date-nut bread, and high-mineral broth.

Motion pictures from the Cincinnati Library and General Mills, Inc., demonstrated the preparation of healthful food and the effects of food on the body. The young mothers especially enjoyed "Why Tommie Won't Eat" and "Food as Children See It."

The Loma Linda Food Company, the Worthington Food Company, the Battle Creek Food Company, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, General Mills, Inc., the Wheat Institute, and other companies graciously furnished material and valuable charts for the planning of food and concerning the effects of food on the body.

The Homemakers' Cookbook was purchased by those who did not already have one. Whole wheat and unbleached flour and health foods were also available to the ladies.

Those eligible to receive certificates were: Mrs. Frank Whitmer, Mrs. Glen Good, Mrs. Elva Combs, Mrs. Paul Siegel, Mrs. Frank Siegel, Mrs. Carl Mauch, and Mrs. Lowell Egbert. Several others had taken these lessons a few years ago.

Ellen G. White said: "The one who understands the art of properly preparing food, and who uses this knowledge, is worthy of higher commendation than those engaged in any other line of work. This talent should be regarded as equal in value to ten talents; for its right use has much to do with keeping

the human organism in health. Because so inseparably connected with life and health, it is the most valuable of all gifts.

"I prize my seamstress, I value my copyist; but my cook, who knows well how to prepare the food to sustain life and nourish brain, bone and muscle, fills the most important place among the helpers in my family."—*Counsels on Diet and Foods*, page 251.

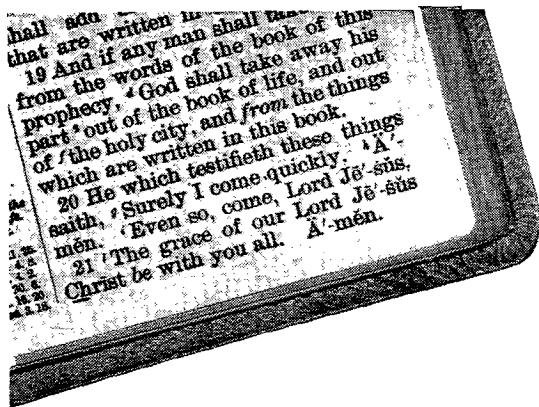
