West Virginia Elects Elder Patzer as President

ELDER A. J. Patzer, Union MV Secretary, was unanimously elected president of the West Virginia Conference on Sunday, July 13, at the biennial constituency meeting in Charleston, West Va.

He replaces Elder A. F. Ruf, who has served as president for the past seven years.

Other officers and departmental secretaries elected include Elder M. L. Hale, Secretary-Treasurer; Clifford Yarnell, Manager of the Book and Bible House; Elder F. J. Kinsey, Secretary of the Home Missionary, Sabbath School, Public Relations, and Radio-Television Departments; Norman Hepner, Secretary of the Publishing Department; and Elder Dale Ingersoll, Secretary of the MV, Educational, and War Service Departments.

Named to the conference executive committee were Elder A. J. Patzer, Chairman; Elder M. L. Hale, Secretary; Charles Meadows, J. H. McHenry, Elder Robert Griffin, Elder W. H. Johnson, and Elder Glenn Sharman.

The constituency meeting took place at the Charleston, West Va. Church following a regional meeting on Sabbath. Delegates were in attendance from nearly all of the churches in the conference.

The General Conference representative at the meeting was Elder C. L. Torrey, Treasurer. Union Conference delegates included the new Union president, Elder L. E. Lenheim, and C. H. Kelly.

The new Conference president, Elder Patzer, has taken over his new responsibility and will relocate in Parkersburg in the very near future.

For the past seven years Elder Patzer has served as the youth leader of the Union. He served previously as

May God richly bless Elder Patzer and his associates in West Virginia as they carry on the work of God in the "Mountain State."


Special Notice

Work in the Maryland State Penitentiary

THE Seventh-day Adventist Bible Class in the Maryland State Penitenitary is in session every Thursday from 2:30 to 3:30 P.M. I have had the joy of seeing the attendance rise from six to thirty-one. There are forty-seven registered, but only from twenty-five to thirty-one attending.

I am going right through a presentation of all the message for this time and the men are enthused about the Bible truths they are learning from the Word. They are telling others among the inmates and there are frequent requests to join the class. We have been holding the class in the Prison Board Room, but it is getting to be too small.

The men told me in class one day that they are all trying to live up to the message they are learning in the class. I appreciated that so much that I told it to the Chaplain. He told me that that was true and that is why they appreciate our work for the men so much. The following is a paragraph from a letter from the Warden in response to a report of my work I sent him:

"I wish to acknowledge receipt of your very fine report. I will take this report up with Rev. Weglein and hope that we will always be able to earn your assistance in our religious program."

Recently I loaned a tape to the Warden and the Chaplain of Elder Detamore's two sermons on "Russia in Bible Prophecy," and "The Middle East and Armageddon." The Warden was so impressed with those messages that he asked me to give them to the men in my class and asked that the Director of Education in the Institution might be privileged to borrow the tape to use in the Prison School.

It is wonderful the confidence that is placed in me. My person or brief case is never examined on entering or leaving. I am permitted to teach as I see fit and there is never a guard in the classroom during the session. I have no desire to betray this confidence.

Please continue to pray for this work for those who really need Christ. In prison is no easy place to witness for Christ.


Weddings

Old Bible Display at Jackson Center Church

ON April 19 the Jackson Center MV Society sponsored an "Old Bible" display in their church.

During the previous week members had personally contacted all the residents of Jackson Center. Two large articles and several smaller notices appeared in local papers.

On displays were twenty-six English Bibles, eight German Bibles, two German prayer books, an old German catechism, a Hebrew Old Testament. a 100-year-old Dictionary of Greek and Roman antiquities, and several song books and hymnals. The oldest English Bibles from Jackson Center, were dated 1843. The oldest German Bible was dated 1817. A rural resident of the community and a member of the Jackson Center Church, Orlies Davis, had the oldest Bible on display dated 1800. Nine Bibles were more than one hundred years old, Several were nearing the century mark.

An interesting feature was a com-

plete display of song books and hymnals published by our denomination starting with "Spiritual Songs" edited by Elder James White and published in 1876. Sister Arminta Johns, a member of the St. Mary's Church, loaned the hymn books for this display.

Two local ministers, a Lutheran and Seventh-day Baptist, were present at the program.

Approximately three hundred AnHour With Your Bible tracts were distributed by those making personal contacts. Eight copies of Desire of Ages were given to those with the Bibles over one hundred years old, and twenty-four copies of Steps to Christ were presented to the various ones who displayed Bibles.

This type of program is recommended as a fine way to break down prejudice and get acquainted with residents of a community.

Such persons gladly, willingly, and cheerfully give their money as well as their hearty approval of our work.

The gospel prophet, Isaiah, clearly predicts that the "wealth of the Gentiles" will be given to help the people of God to complete His work on earth (Isaiah 60:5,11).

In old times, God plainly instructed His people to solicit means from the Egyptians to assist them on their projected journey to the Promised Land.

In Nehemiah's time God also impressed rulers to contribute of their silver and gold to the rebuilding of God's temple and its services.

Five million dollars will be raised in this 1958 Ingathering appeal to assist Seventh-day Adventists in carrying forward the Lord's work for mankind. Millions of homes will be visited and given the annual Ingathering report. Last year more than 1500 persons clipped the offer for a free Bible correspondence course and mailed it to the General Conference. Many persons have been baptized into the church as a result of Ingatherings' contacts with non-Adventists.

The members of the churches comprising the Potomac Conference already have brought into the Lord's treasury more than \$76,000, a sum which surpasses last year's Ingathering total.

A final report will appear in the VISITOR in July after the remittances for June come to the Conference Treasurer's office. We commend all our members for their loyal support in making this marvelous Ingathering victory a reality.



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

THE Lord is blessing His work in the churches of District No. 6. The writer is studying with a number of interested individuals, and a large baptism was planned for July 12.



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
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Allegheny Camp Meeting Scheduled August 7 to 17


