For the past 13 years the Seventhday Adventist denomination has utilized the media of television for the proclamation of the gospel message. Faith for Today is the oldest continuous religious telecast on the air today, thanks to the annual support of the program by our people throughout North America. Latest statistics available reveal that more than 1,800 persons were baptized last year because of the telecast.

As a member of the board of directors of the program, I am vitally interested in its success. At our regular board meetings we grapple with the financial problems of such a vast undertaking. But the Lord has been good and the program continues to win hundreds of persons every year in all parts of the world.

A forward step in the work of Faith for Today was taken by the telecast board when it voted to produce the program in full color as well as in black and white. Color films will be available to stations on a regular basis sometime this month.

This step should open the door for the program to be seen in 34 additional markets. We shall also have the possibility of being scheduled at more favorable times.

But producing the program in color raises costs considerably. Due consideration was given to this, but it is the firm belief that the extra funds necessary would become a worthwhile investment in bringing the program to new areas.

Our members throughout the Columbia Union Conference will be given an opportunity soon to assist in this soul-winning program. The annual Faith for Today TV offering will be taken in all churches on Sabbath, February 9.

## New Voices in "King's Heralds" Quartet

Its 1,400,000 watts of power blanket all of Europe, much of Russia, North Africa, and the Near East. Additional station time has been purchased in the Far East and in South America. Bible schools all over the world are receiving more applications for Bible lessons than limited budgets will allow them to accept. Millions on every continent are starving for the message of hope and peace that the Voice of Prophecy is eager to send to them by radio. Though large numbers are being reached today, vast areas of the world are still groping in spiritual darkness.

Much will be expected of the King's Heralds in the days ahead, in cooperation with the Voice of Prophecy speaker, Elder H. M. S. Richards; Del Delker, contralto soloist; and Brad Braley, organist. As they blend their voices with the electronic magic of radio, spirits will be lifted heavenward, broken hearts will be mended, and eager minds will be turned to the matchless gift of God's grace. This dedicated team will need our prayers and continuing support.

THE recent trial run of the AARN (Adventist Amateur Radio Net) was verv successful. More than 60 stations checked in from the United States and from five other countries. Others tried but failed because of conditions or station problems. The intense interest by such a large group showed evidence of the possibilities of this net.

Letters with your suggestions and contributions will be appreciated as we try to get the program underway.

We suggest the following schedule for the present time: Each Thursday -20-meter phone (am-SSB) 14.270, 1400-1500 G.M.T.; 20-meter phone (am-SSB) 14.270, 1950-2100 G.M.T.

There is also a 40-meter schedule for the eastern part of the United States every Sunday morning at 1245 G.M.T. on 7296.

Here is a suggestion regarding checking in: Please be recognized by net control or relay station before making any comments or listing any traffic. Give your call in phonetics.

After recognition, make your comments and be as brief as possible, for others are waiting to check in or list their traffic with net control. If you have no traffic, say you are QRU. If you are available to handle traffic and will stay on frequency for such, please report QRV. If you wish to visit with someone else, arrange through net control to take that person to another frequency.

If we follow these simple rules, operation will be easier for net control.

For the use of the lodge, swimming pool, sanitation block, and the grounds the rate per day is as follows: Per person, \$1; 1-10, \$7.50; 10-20, \$12; 20-30, \$15; 30-40, \$25; 40-50, \$35; 50-60, \$45; 60-75, \$50; 75-100, \$60; 100-150, \$75; 150-200, \$85.

A \$10 deposit is to accompany reservations, the balance to be paid in advance or upon arrival. The period from Friday noon to Sunday noon (the weekend) is considered on the basis of two days.

For the use of the pool only it is 50 cents per person for those of 10 years of age or older; 25 cents for any under 10. The night lights can be turned on only if there is a minimum of at least five dollars per hour of operation. Camping in the walnut

## **Pastor Finds Rural Areas Fruitful**

THE territory of the Columbia Union Conference is filled with large urban areas. The large cities present a tremendous challenge in evangelism.

But rural areas need to be worked also. Many times the endeavors of our pastors and evangelists meet with more success in these sparsely settled areas than in the large, metropolitan centers.

The following is a very interesting report of this kind of soul-winning work from Elder John Morgan, Public Relations Secretary of the Potomac Conference:

"Thirty miles south of Waynesboro, Va., just off the Blue Ridge Parkway, is a little community called Montebello.

"Here for a number of months Elder O. E. Hanna, district superintendent of Buena Vista and Covington, with help recruited from the Potomac Conference headquarters office, has been conducting regular Sunday services for the people of the community.

"In spite of steady opposition, the attendance has been fine, and prospects for establishment of a Seventhday Adventist church in this community are very good.

"Though most of the people are rural residents, they faithfully attend the services held in the little community church where Pastor Hanna unveils before them the truths of the three angels' messages each week. Thus far the interest has been heartening.

"Just recently six persons who attend these Sunday services and who are local residents, were baptized into the message at the Buena Vista Church. These people drive a long distance each week to attend services on the Sabbath at Buena Vista. They find themselves busily engaged throughout the week in giving Bible studies and encouraging people to attend their own services in Montebello on Sundays.

"Other persons are scheduled for baptism and there is great anticipation of the establishment of a new church in the shadow of Potomac's summer youth camp and just off the north-south Blue Ridge Parkway overlooking the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia."

## Baptismal Instruction Class For Juniors Recommended

At the time of the General Conference Session held in San Francisco, Calif., the Sabbath School Department in connection with their departmental meetings passed a recommendation which we believe will be most beneficial to junior boys and girls in many Sabbath Schools.

Where feasible, it is recommended that a junior baptismal instruction class be held for those juniors looking forward to baptism, and that this class be held during the 30-minute class-study time. The pastor, assistant pastor, elder, or one who is capable of conducting such a class might be appointed by the Sabbath School council to be the teacher of such a class. It is also recommended that the Junior MV Baptismal Manual be used as a course of study for such a class.

This practical pamphlet reviews the cardinal principles of belief and conduct for junior boys and girls contemplating baptism. There are 14 lessons arranged in questionand-answer form that could be comprehended in three months of instruction. These are ordered in the regular way by the church missionary secretary from the Book and Bible House at a small cost of only 25 cents each.

Such a class might be held one quarter each year in schools where there is a need. If such a need exists in your church, why not try it?
