Then, too, the editors of Signs of the Times and These Times, our monthly missionary journals, will gladly provide you with a list of names which should be included on your evangelistic visitation lists. Remember, many of these people have been reading the truth through the pages of our attractive magazines over a period of time and may be considered to be excellent evangelistic prospects.

The Faith for Today and Voice of Prophecy groups also will forward to your church the names of persons who have finished or have progressed sufficiently in the correspondence courses.

Last, but not least, there are always a number of non-baptized members of Seventh-day Adventist families. Many of them have just been waiting for someone to take a more personal and direct interest in their spiritual welfare. You will be

Vacation Bible Schools in Potomac Conference

THE 1963 Vacation Bible School period has ended successfully. Led by Elder R. H. Brodersen, Conference Sabbath School Secretary, 22 Potomac Conference churches conducted schools that enrolled more than 2,500 young people this year. At least 60 per cent of this number were children from non-Adventist parents who are friends of the church.

The Bible schools ranged in attendance from 32 at Hopewell to 500 at Sligo. Many schools hit the 150 to 200 enrollment mark. Schools are normally held in church Sabbath School rooms or school auditoriums between June and August.

This year seven churches began Bible schools for the first time, using the kit materials prepared by the General Conference Sabbath School Department. Kits are prepared for three years, "A," "B," "C," and at the end of the third year the school reverts back to kit "A" again.

A typical program includes songs, pledge to Bible and country, devotional, story, class study, crafts, nature nuggets, and recreation. Young people between the ages of four and 14 attend these schools.

The following reports are typical of the experience of the schools throughout the Conference.

"What a thrill it was to hear and see 200 boys and girls softly and reverently singing their theme song, 'Jesus Is Real to Me,' each day, following a rousing song service by their song leader and associate di-

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rector, Norma Sines. During the twoweek period, July 22-August 2, 233 children were enrolled with approximately two-thirds non-Adventists.

"'Story Time' took us on many interesting adventures from an African safari to the jungles of Brazil.

"The Kindergarten Division of approximately 90 children was ably led by Martha Coon and Courtney Sines.

"About 65 lively Primaries were directed by Phyllis Morgan while Edith Sines and June Franklin endeavored to make Jesus real to the 40 juniors under their leadership.

"The crafts, supervised by Darlene Griffin, Emma Griffin, and Keith Shaffer, highlighted the Primary and Junior activities. Here they made wind chimes, kaleidoscopes, shell boxes, and glorified-glass paintings.

"A very impressive program, Friday night, August 2, closed our fifth Vacation Bible School at Beltsville. Many of these children have come every year and look forward to the next. One little non-Adventist girl attends our church school and this spring a family attended evangelistic meetings conducted by the pastor. The mother and two older children

Elder Melashenko, who was born in Canada of Russianspeaking parents, made similar recordings last year in the Ukranian language.

Elder Melashenko says of his five sons that they could sing before they could speak, but this is not so surprising when one considers the musical background of the family. His mother was a singer and a good musician and each of his five brothers and sisters played instruments. His wife, also Russian, came from a musical family.

Elder Melashenko's first experience in gospel work came when he joined the Voice of Prophecy quartet in 1948. He sang with the group until 1950 when he was forced to have an operation on his throat. Later he became a singing evangelist in association with outstanding evangelists in New England. For the past three years he served as Pastor of St. George's Church in Bermuda, where he became known as the radio gospel singer. The Melashenko family as a septet was in constant demand for programs in churches, civic organizations, and benefit programs.

May God use this family in a wonderful way as they lead in His work in the Hagerstown district.

Potomac Conference Gives Priority to Evangelism in Fall Months

Soul-WINNING evangelism will set the pace for Potomac Conference churches September through November with a strong thrust that could send the Conference past the 11,000 membership mark.

Evangelistic plans for several key areas have been announced by Elder H. J. Capman, Conference President, as outlined by the Potomac Conference Committee. R

Announcement of the following evangelistic campaigns was given this week.

- DANVILLE—Evangelistic meetings will be held nightly in the new \$40,000 school auditorium in this southern Virginia city by Elder D. W. Cross. Adventist work is growing in Danville. Present plans call for the construction of a new church on heavily traveled Route 29, north of the city.
- McDOWELL-The second phase of evangelistic meetings by the Klim-Ellis team in the Conferenceowned "air cathedral" in McDowell will get under way in September. The first phase of the meetings has just ended with 50 new persons' keeping the Sabbath in this "dark" county. Work already has begun on a \$25,000 church for this new group of believers and it is hoped that the building will be ready for occupancy by early winter. The new structure will be patterned after the Harrisonburg Church. A heavy visitation program is currently in operation and with the continuation of evangelistic meetings a large church group is expected to materialize.
- SOUTH RICHMOND—Elder Eric Norman will begin meetings in the South Richmond Church early in October.
- ROANOKE—The Carney-Lay Evan-

gelistic Team currently is holding meetings in cooperation with Elder John Ford, district superintendent. These services will continue four nights weekly, August to October, in the Conference airatorium. Elder Carney reports that 160 interested people at the present time are receiving visits from the evangelistic team.

- HAMPTON—Evangelist C. C. Weis of the Columbia Union Conference Home Missionary Department will be associated with Elder Donald Stutler, district superintendent, in revival evangelism in the Hampton Roads Church during October.
- LYNCHBURG—Elder Ernest Clark will begin meetings in Alta Vista, a small Virginia city, where he hopes to establish the Adventist work in another "dark" area.
- FREDERICKSBURG—Elder Kenneth McComas, Pastor of the Richmond Church, will be associated with Elder Leonard Barnes, district superintendent of Fredericksburg, for a series of meetings in the Fredericksburg Church. These meetings will begin early in October and radio evangelistic services will be held concurrently with the church evangelism.
- ALEXANDRIA—The new \$250,000 air-conditioned Alexandria Church has been completed and will hold its open house September 28. The

members are to be commended for their sacrifice and work in erecting such a suitable church home for Seventh-day Adventists and their friends in the city of Alexandria. Elder G. F. Williams, Pastor, will begin a series of meetings in the new church, September 29, to climax the building program and to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ to the many friends of Adventists in the Alexandria area.

- PORTSMOUTH—Elder D. E. Stutler, Pastor of the Hampton Church, will associate with Elder R. E. Logan in a three-week revival program in the Portsmouth Church during October.
- RICHLANDS—In Richlands the Armory has been secured for 21 meetings, beginning in October and ending Thanksgiving Day. The Carney-Lay Evangelistic Team will be associated with Elder E. L. Tarr, district superintendent, for this series of evangelistic meetings.

A budget of \$10,000 has been approved by the Conference Committee for the conducting of evangelistic meetings in these 10 key areas of the Conference. These evangelistic plans are in keeping with the commitments made at camp-meeting time as faithful Seventh-day Adventists contributed special gifts for Conferencewide evangelism.
