

No chance for mistake

These days, hospitals run a very tight ship. You check in a couple of hours before your scheduled appointment with the anesthesiologist, put your clothes in a bag, tie on a skimpy gown and cover your hair with a blue cap. Clad in this fashionable attire, you climb up on a

gurney and "relax" in a holding pattern. While you wait, persons in blue from bonnet to booties stop briefly, study clipboards and ask, "Are you Mrs. McClure?"

That pretty much describes my recent entry into the operating theater for another foot and ankle surgery—but with a new twist. One clipboard person asked me to point to the foot that was to be repaired. I pointed down to the right as she uncapped a fat black marker and drew a large "X" on the designated foot.

"Is that so no one makes a mistake?" I joked. "That's right," she replied without humor.

Soon after, the gurney was wheeled into Operating Room 3, and I was positioned on a beanbag surgical table for the bone graft. A young man (same blue covering) asked if the foot marked "X" was the one to be operated on.

"Yes, it is," I answered. With a serious expression, he picked up a big marker from a tray and wrote "NO" on my left foot while I developed a mild case of marker anxiety.

I learned a couple of days later that in another hospital, hundreds of miles from Baltimore, a tragic mistake had been made. Someone amputated the wrong foot! When I heard that, I appreciated the "NO" that didn't wash off easily and "X"-marks-the-spot hidden under mountains of cotton and gauze wrappings. There had been no reason for a mistake in my surgery.

Sometimes I wish all decisions were that easy—that yes or no choices were simple. Though it may seem there is great risk for me to choose unwisely, Jesus promised, "I am with you always," and "I will never leave you or forsake you." I am grateful that our relationship can grow so close, my choices will reflect His guidance. And if I do make a mistake, because of His love and the cross, it is not fatal.

She would sleep for two or three hours and then wake up screaming, scared to death. Fearing another earthquake myself, I felt frazzled and fractured. Tim, my husband, and I took turns comforting Jennifer. Instead of sleeping when it was his turn to be with her, however, I lay awake feeling like I needed comforting myself.

One particular night, we awoke to Jennifer's cries. It was my turn to help her. Dragging myself out of bed, I headed to her bedroom. There she was, standing at the edge

of her crib, tears

falling down her cheeks, sucking on her pacifier and clutching her baby doll. I picked her up and settled myself down in the rocking chair, hoping inside that it would not be but a few short minutes until I could get back in bed.

I rocked and rocked, but Jennifer seemed much more restless this time than usual. She wiggled around into several positions before she finally settled herself down. Both arms were clasped tightly around my neck. I could hardly breathe. With her favorite blanket wrapped around her, she was soon fast asleep.



Just in time.

The San Andreas fault turns out to be one of the least harmful earthquake areas. Its rifts are so visible we all thought it was ready to drop the big one on LA. Surprise! Hidden faults can do us in. Remember last year's earthquake in Mexico City? Of course not. The network news was busy following O.J. and so gave us only fleeting glimpses of the Mexican devastation. We also missed most of the shaking in Turkey, India, Russia and Africa. Maybe we were busy listening to Rush. But we did see Kobe. "Earthquakes in various places ..." Jesus is coming again.

Then there are the myriads of self-proclaimed "prophets" who are shouting out the signs so we "won't miss them: "Newt's house has a secret bill ready for passage, a bill that will make the National Sunday Law prophecies come true? Let's watch the Son. Now.

amazing how every sentence seemed to touch the trials and tribulations I was going through, both past and present.



Is the Pope a Christian?

"Do you actually believe the Pope could be a sincere Christian?" my caller asked. What a question! Should I not assume sincerity on the part of the head of a concededly Christian church? Apparently, some believe I should not.

The caller reminded me of an event some years ago when the United States established diplomatic relations with the Holy See. A wellmeaning, I assume, person placed placards in the Washington subway cars protesting that event and saying some rather derogatory things about the Pope. A loyal Roman Catholic, assuming that the Adventist church was responsible, called me and proceeded to tell me at some length and in no uncertain terms that such personal attacks were especially disgraceful in light of our professed support for religious liberty and tolerance. When she came up for air, I responded by telling her that we were almost as distressed by those placards as she was, that my church was in no way responsible for them and that while we reject the Catho-

in the church, along with significant parts of Catholic doctrine and scriptural interpretations, we reject ideas, not people.

After all, if the Pope and I descended from the same Father, that makes us brothers who should not go around making personal attacks on each other.

Suppose a mother one day came upon her two sons in the midst of a fight—not a mere disagreement, but fully engaged with intent to do great bodily harm. She would immediately separate the young warriors to prevent harm to either. She would then undoubtedly hear, "He started it!" "No, I didn't! He did!" "You pushed me first!" It's a litany whose antecedents undoubtedly go far back in antiquity.

What would she do? Would she listen to both sons' stories, decide

which was right and give that son permission to punish his brother? Of course not. She would separate them and say, "I don't care who's right or who started it—don't harm you brother! If punishment for wrongdoing is in order, I'll take care of that."

Note that one son did indeed start it, so one brother was right—and the other was wrong. But their parent did not deem that fact sufficient to justify hostility or the infliction of harm. They could disagree, even argue over legitimate differences, but such differences, no matter how legitimate, would not justify the alienation of a member of the family, let alone the infliction of harm.

Do you suppose our heavenly Parent ever looks down at the hostility generated by the legitimate differences of opinion between His children and says to us, "I will take care of deciding who is right and wrong—do not harm your brother!"

Yes, those parts that I believe to be biblical. Do I reject those parts that are not biblically supported? Of course. Do I oppose them in such a way as to cause offense to those who honestly uphold them so that I wound and alienate them? No, because my parent told me not to harm my brother. My opposition will consist of argument as to the significance of the facts, not personal attacks on people with whom I disagree. And I give them the benefit of the doubt on the issue of their sincerity, no matter the breadth of our disagreement. After all, the Pope and I are brothers.

What happens when ACS responds to a disaster?

The Adventist response to a domestic disaster is through Adventist Community Services, the at-home equivalent of ADRA. ACS has written agreements with the federal government and the American Red Cross which specify the Adventist responsibilities in helping disaster victims. This makes disaster response a conference function, not a local church or ACS unit function.

- 1. When an incident happens, a response team is assembled immediately. It includes trained disaster management volunteers—a chief of operations, a donated goods coordinator, a volunteers coordinator, a liaison officer and a public information officer.
- 2. The levels of denominational structure, the conferences with shared territory and the Adventist institutions are all "flattened" into a decision-making team that functions via daily teleconferences. No entity makes independent and possibly confusing moves.
- The primary things that ACS does—its assigned responsibilities—include handling donated goods and providing emergency pastoral care. ACS volunteers may also be loaned to staff Red Cross shelters, kitchens and social services.
- Distribution centers for bottled water, grocery items, personal comfort kits, baby needs, blankets, cleaning supplies and even building materials are set up in borrowed or church-owned facilities. Sometimes mobile units are used.
- 5. A "listening post" is established where survivors of the disaster can come and pray or talk to a pastor or pastoral care aid,
- A reception center is set up outside the parameter of the disaster where truckloads of donated goods can be directed for unloading, sorting and repacking for use in the distribution centers and sharing with other agencies.
- A command post is established for the response team with telephones, computers, FAX, etc. This may be some distance from the site of the disaster if necessary.
- The word goes out to Adventists across North America as to what supplies are needed and public collections are announced.
- The ACS hotline—(800 253-3000)—at Andrews University is activated as the clearinghouse for information, offers of donated goods and trucks needing clearance.
- The ACS liaison officer joins the coordination team set up by the governor's office to keep communications open with other organizations and coordinate operations.

MONTE SAHLIN ACS National Director Even before the terrible explosion at the Federal Building in Oklahoma City, citizens in Danville, Pennsylvania were preparing for disaster during a practice drill on March 11. A simulated chemical spill at a local factory caused an evacuation of families from the area. The Danville Red Cross rushed into action and called its Disaster Team, Among the volunteers reporting for duty were six members of the Danville Seventhday Adventist Church.

The training drill helped prepare the Danville community for what could possibly be a real disaster in the future. In hundreds of simulated earthquakes, tornados and other disasters in cities across the nation, American Red Cross chapters and other volunteers nationwide learned how to quickly respond. The demonstrations helped educate everyone to prepare for the unexpected.

Volunteers portrayed different elements of a natural disaster, including victims. One victim was Danielle Casimiro, an exchange student from Brazil living with a host family in Danville. She was a good actress and threw registration into a panic when she came in babbling incoherently in Portuguese. It was a good practice exercise because she was so distraught at not being able to find her mother.

It was a very enlightening experience with many things happening. There were cuts, broken limbs, skin burns, eye burns and respiratory

problems, as well as irate people who refused to cooperate or give needed information and others upset because their children were in school and they didn't know how they were faring.

Those attending and participating in the drill from the Danville church included Ed Wolfe; Carolyn and Ed McWilliams, who manned the first aid station; Frank Ginitz and Ron Showers, who set up cots; and Barbara Showers, who registered victims. Brett Showers and Michael Young from the church were volunteer victims.

The six volunteer workers from the church have been busy over the past several months taking all the required courses and are now in the process of being certified by the National American Red Cross.

years, have also been dedicated coworkers for almost seven years. The couple works together in building maintenance at the Burlington County Board of Social Services in New Jersey, where they recently have become witnesses for Christ.

Almost a year ago, Bill

had a discussion with a co-worker about the Apostle John's Revelation, and soon after, he brought a Revelation seminar book into the office for her to read. Several months later, when Bill was emptying her wastebasket, he mentioned his new devotional book, Welcome, Holy Spirit.

Delighted to hear about another book, the co-worker told Bill, "I thought you'd forgotten about me!" She seemed so eager to read the book, Bill left it with her that morning. During the same afternoon the woman had shared the book with other employees, and as a result, 12 people were interested in buying their own copies.

"I think there was such a quick response to the book because everybody is in need of the Holy Spirit in their lives," said Bill. "But I've never seen anything like it; I didn't even try to sell the books."

Bill found it confusing when workers throughout the office kept handing him their names for book orders, so he decided he wasn't going to take any more orders.

"But then I remembered what a former pastor used to say—that if something happens so easily, it must be the work of the Holy Spirit," said Bill. "So I realized if the Lord wanted to work through me, I couldn't say no."

Bill's wife, Marian, began to bring in books to share with employees on her floor. She brought in a copy of the women's devotional volume, *The Gift of Love*, and left it with one of her co-workers to look through. The woman was thrilled with what she read and told others about the book. Marian sold eight books that afternoon and has since invited one of the women to her church.

"We don't like to push our religion on anyone, but sharing these books with others allows us to get closer to them and gives us the opportunity to share our faith," said Marian.

"The books give our fellow workers a better understanding of Christ. Also, Ellen White and the Sabbath are mentioned in the books; therefore, they are unconsciously becoming acquainted with Adventists," said Bill. "As a result, they are asking more questions and giving me an open invitation to discuss my religion with them."

The Ewans plan to continue their mission, bringing in new devotional books for next year, as well as other books that they find interesting, such as *If My People Pray* and *In the Presence of Angels*, for which they've already received orders.

"We continue to pray every day that the Lord will use us as instruments to spread His Word. Our goal is to gradually share our faith with all 300 employees through the power of the Holy Spirit."

After four years of attending Mount Aetna Camp as a camper, this year Adam Clark will be working on the staff as a full-time counselor. "Using the people at Mount Aetna Camp, Christ led me to Him and to the Seventh-day Adventist Church," says Adam. "It has made a big change in my life, and I want to give the campers meaningful experiences at camp, like the ones I had."

Mount Aetna Camp, located in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountain range near Hagerstown, Maryland, is the year-round retreat center for the Chesapeake Conference.

In 1993, Adam's counselor, Dion Henry, studied the Bible with him. The combination of Bible studies and the impression left by a Friday evening pageant helped him understand that God was real and cared very much for him. When Adam returned home from camp, he

looked up the nearest Adventist church in the phone book and began attending the Bell Branch church. Al Watson, pastor at the time, continued Bible studies with Adam, and in April of 1994 he was baptized.

Adam credits many people and experiences at camp with leading him to God. He especially remembers one night in his cabin when his counselor told a fellow camper, who admitted that he cried during movies, "You have a sensitive heart. Keep it that way." Adam was impressed by that comment because he thought the only way to survive was to have a "macho" attitude. The idea of a sensitive, open heart began to sink into his thinking and became something he wanted to strive for in his life.

Adam is presently a junior at Arundel High School in Gambrills and plans to pursue a career that deals with children. "I love working with children and telling them about the Lord," he said.

Every summer, hundreds of children experience the loving, supportive, Christian atmosphere at Mount Aetna Camp. Yes, they

come to have fun, but Jesus is at the center of everything, and a relationship with Jesus is continuously modeled for them by the staff. "In this day and age when many people are not religious, religion gives me values to believe in," said Adam. "A relationship with Christ is the answer to all my problems. It helps me make important decisions in my life. Finding Christ was the best thing that ever happened to me."

ADRA employee injured in robbery

The two men beat and blindfolded him, tied him up with his own shoelaces, took his keys and locked him in a bathroom.

"Although badly shaken, Koilpillai remained conscious," reported Peter Howell, ADRA's country director. "After looting the office and the safe, the men hit him on the head once more and left."

After a short time, Koilpillai freed himself and got help. The American Embassy and the police were notified of the theft.

Even though the robbery has hampered ADRA's distribution of goods in the area, Howell stated: "The most important thing is that Johnson is going to be all right."



Dr. Kay's Q&A

With planning, kids can entertain themselves



Answer: Children shouldn't have to be entertained all summer, and sensible time limits should be put on sedentary activities like video games and TV. Record their favorite programs and restrict them to one hour of TV either at "rest" time in the heat of the day or during the evening when the family can watch together.

Replace TV with stimulating outdoor equipment like boards and wooden boxes for "building," a big dirt or sand pile for digging and water play and dress-up clothing and accessories, and they will entertain themselves.

Children this age need these activities, and if you can't provide them at your home, then you'll need to find a park, a school playground, a vacant lot or a neighbor's home where they can be free to explore and create their own world. If your children visit another parent's home on a regular basis, be sure to offer to share the supervision with the resident parent so they don't wear out their welcome mat!

Here are some other creative outdoor activities your children might enjoy that take some setting up, but not much supervision.

- Soapsuds fingerpaint: Spread a plastic tablecloth on a picnic table or another hard surface. Put some Ivory Snow Flakes in a little warm water and beat until whipped cream consistency and let the kids "paint" their world.
- Homemade "play dough." Mix two cups of flour, one cup of salt, food coloring, a tablespoon of oil and enough water to mix well, and you'll have your own play dough. Now add a rolling pin and cookie cutters or use it like clay. The sun or the low temperature of an oven will bake objects rock hard.

Kids love water, but pools-including wading pools-can be dangerous without supervision. Try these safe and fun activities:

- Invest in a wading pool and let them splash and play or float boats.
 - Spray bottles make great squirt guns.
- If you have a sand box or a digging area, add small shovels and the garden hose and let them make rivers and dams. Squirt them off with the hose when they're done so they don't track sand into the house.
- Get a large piece of thick plastic, hose it down and let the kids slip and slide. This works great on a slight decline.

And for hundreds of other ideas, head off to the local library. You'll find books filled with activities to keep your kids entertained. And while you're there, bring home a stack of children's books, story tapes and educational videos.






