WEEK OF PRAYER

In taking up my duties as president of the Eastern Canadian Union Conference and in my first official message to the Sabbath keepers in Eastern Canada and Newfoundland the Week of Prayer is a timely subject. The custom of an annual Week of Prayer is not urged because prayer is more important then than at other times. Every week should be a week of prayer but we are living in an age of hurry when prayer is sadly neglected in many homes. The blessing of united prayer at the family altar, in the weekly meeting and at special appointed times is emphasized all through the Scriptures. "Let us hold forth the profession of our faith without wavering; (for he is faithful that promised); And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works:

Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; and so much the more as ye see the day appraoching." Heb. 10: 23-25.

Profession alone will not save anyone and yet we are exhorted to hold fast to it. In our churches and companies there may be some who through indifference or discouragement are about to break this last tie that binds them to their first love for the truth. A special effort should be made to reclaim all such during the Week of Prayer. If roots of bitterness have grown up and if unkind words and prejudice have divided hearts forgive as you expect to be forgiven. Take the initiative in reconciliation with those with whom estrangements have come.

As we listen to the call for help from other lands let the Spirit of God subdue our hearts and unite us all in willing service. If possible meet with others of like precious faith during the Week of Prayer. If that is not possible then set apart a time each day to read the messages in the Review and pray for a special uplift and revival of faith and power for the finishing of the Third Angel's Message. We have our problems in the Eastern Canadian Union but none that cannot be solved if we all join

in united reconsecration and willing service.

If we do our proportionate part in supporting our mission workers in the dark heathen lands every one must bring into the treasury as liberal an offering as possible to make up our average of sixty cents a week for missions before December 31.

In closing I most earnestly plead for your prayers that God will give me the strength and grace needed to bear faithfully the burdens that falls to a Union Conference President.

WEEK OF PRAYER

We trust that every church will plan to meet regularly every day during the Week of Prayer, December 8-15. Arrangements have been made for ministers to visit some of the churches during this period. Not all will be visited at this time by conference workers.

Elder Chapman is preaching every night except Saturday night in his hall at Amherst, and does not feel free to leave. Professor Armstrong feels his first responsibility is with the school during this time of seeking God. Brother Van Sickle will be just taking on added work in the office, which will necessitate close application lest the work get behind. Brother Lamont is just beginning a special fall effort in St. John, in order to get a start before the holidays.

Elder Young will spend the entire week among the churches. The writer will also devote his time to this work. Brother Crooks will spend some time during the week with those churches where his departmental work requires his presence.

Word has already been sent to every church what to expect and what not to expect. It will be planned to give some special ministerial help soon to those churches that are not visited during the Week of Prayer. It seems better to

take a little more time and send experienced ministerial help, than to endeavor to provide for every church in the one week. This would necessitate a serious break in work which men are carrying on. Also those who have not had the experience cannot give the lifting power which the church hopes to realize when the conference goes to the expense of sending some one to visit the church.

We ask our local church elders and leaders to make a special effort at this time to enlist the largest number of the members possible in daily meeting. Read the article prepared for the day in the *Review and Herald* and have special prayer. Labor for all those within reach of the influence of the church, especially the youth, our boys and girls, "the flower of the flock."

Special interest in, and prayer for our foreign missions should have a large place in the daily exercises. The Annual Offering is taken in all our churches, Sabbath, December 15. While the Week of Sacrifice gift may have taken most of the available funds of many, yet we can give something in the annual offering. There may be some who have postponed the Week of Sacrifice who will make an equally substantial donation in the Annual Offering.

We shall write a request to every church elder and leader, to furnish us a report of the results of the Week of Prayer in his church. From these letters we hope to glean some good experiences for publication in the Mussenger.

Let us, individually and collectively, make this Week of Prayer a season of special and earnest intercession. The isolated, as well as those who have the privilege of daily meeting with others, may share in the refreshing, "God is not far from any of us."

May the following experience be our goal for the Week of Prayer:

Health Habit Talks

For Parents and Teachers

From the College Nurse

THE GROWTH OF THE CHILD

"Without health, no one can as distinctly understand or as completely fulfii his obligations to himself, to his fellow beings, or to his Creator. Therefore the health should be as faithfully guarded as the character."—Mrs. E. G. White.

Did it ever occur to you that the child of school age is growing? I am sure that this fact has come to you very forcibly at times when dresses must be lengthened and coat sleeves let down. But, did it ever occur to you that the boy or girl of nine or ten should grow in height and gain in weight as regularly as the baby?

In the well regulated household the baby is weighed regularly every week, and, if he does not gain as he should, the cause is immediately located and attended to. When children do not grow or gain regularly in weight, something is wrong. If these boys and girls were weighed regularly every month, a condition of malnutrition would be discovered early and not allowed to result in serious consequences.

Children suffering from malnutrition are not only much below normal weight for height, but they gain much more slowly than they should. At the ages of 6 to 10 years when a healthy child should gain 4 or 5 pounds a year, it may gain only 1 or 2 pounds, or even not at all; from 12 to 16 years, when healthy children should gain from 6 to 10 pounds a year, they may gain only 2 or 3 pounds.
