MISSIONS RALLY SABBATH

We trust that our churches in the Eastern Canadian Union Conference will observe the Rally Sabbaths on the dates set apart by the General Conference, and that they will, as far as it is at all consistent, carry out the program recommended by the mission board. The first Rally Sabbath of 1924 will give us some idea of how the plan is working, and how our people are co-operating. The plan is not to press anyone to give more than he can, or even necessarily to give more than he is now giving, but rather to bring about a more steady and systematic giving, so as to enable the mission board to answer the most urgent calls with the assurance of help coming.

God "will finish the work, and cut it short in righteousness: because a short work will the Lord make in the earth." Rom. 9:28. Just as the walls of Jericho fell down by the power of God in the old time even so will great victories come to our work through systematic and united effort on the part of all consecrated believers in this message. Of the benefits of systematic giving we read: "Some may not be able to give a large sum, but all can lay aside each week something for the Master." Testi-

monies, Vol. 9, page 55.

The calls are coming from all over the world for help, and the mission board cannot tell

how many of these calls may be answered unless they know something of what the income from our people will be. Last year's gifts do not furnish a proper measure because there are more Seventh-day Adventists this year, and some are increasing their offerings this year. Many perhaps hesitate to make a pledge of the amount they plan to give, but all should plan to give a definite amount week by week, and if greater prosperity comes, make special offerings throughout the year. Many mission problems would be solved if our people would adopt the systematic plan and make an earnest effort to reach their goal. Square Up Day, which is known as Missions Rally Sabbath, is our opportunity as individuals and as a church to make up whatever may be lacking on our quota to missions. This would eliminate any perplexity and delay in answering calls from needy fields.

It is good to cultivate habits of forethought and system in meeting our reasonable obligations. We are all inclined to be very much like children who usually wish to do something that is beyond their reach and skill, but at the same time are very unwilling to do the little useful things that they can. Try the General Conference plan recommended at the Fall Council, and after setting the weekly goal ask God to help you to keep your offerings up to date. Church officers and ministers are earnestly requested to co-operate that Rally Sabbath, February 16, may be a success through-

out our field.

HEALTH-HABIT TALKS

FOR PARENTS AND TEACHERS

THE FIFTH HEALTH HABIT EATING REGULARLY AND SLOWLY, AND NOTHING BETWEEN MEALS

The question has been asked, "Why is there so much more sickness now than there used to be?" The answer is given in an article by Hans S. Anderson, in the Signs of the Times for November. He says, "Our forefathers subsisted upon whole grains; wheat, corn, and rice being ground entire, conserving all the

rich food mineral as yet unknown to them. They also ate freely of vegetables, berries, fruits, and milk. Within the last century man has made a very free use of the refined and demineralized cereal foods, deprived of the roughage and most of the mineral salts, with a consequent mineral starvation, a sluggishness of the body processes, an increase of disease and the development of diseases before unknown.

"Human beings can not thrive when subject to a diet that is too refined and concentrated. There is a French proverb that says: "Spinach is a broom that sweeps the stomach." The large amount of fiber contained in greens and fresh vegetables not only encourages thorough mastication of food, but this bulky, undissolved material mechanically stimulates the intestinal muscle to contract and thus prevents constipation, one of the common disorders resulting from a faulty diet.

"Some raw green foods, such as lettuce, water cress, tomato, celery, cabbage, carrott, cucumber, radish, et ecetera should be eaten daily, as these pass through the system largely as bulk, and from them we receive the valuable organic salts and vitamine unchanged by heating."

It is much easier to give a drug for the purpose of increasing the appetite or to stimulate the action of the bowels, or to relieve that headache which comes as a result of autointoxication, than it is to study what food is best suited for the individual needs of your

family.

Children do not naturally eat what is best for them. If left to themselves they will eat what they naturally like the best. The appetite must be trained just as any other part of the body is trained. The time to begin this training is with the baby before he has formed bad habits of eating, but if you have neglected to do this, it is not too late to begin now, though the work will be much harder. Do not let your child lose interest in his food. The food he eats will do him little good and you will wear yourself out trying to feed him.

It is not natural for a child not to want his food. If your child will not eat look for the cause and then proceed to remedy it. There are several reasons why children will not eat, very often piecing is the cause. If a child eats all the time and at no regular time he most assuredly will not eat properly, so first of all, give him his meals regularly three times a day every day of the week. Never give a child too much to eat one time. Let the child have the

enjoyment of asking for more. This will also teach a good lesson in thrift for he must never leave his turnips, or carrots, or raw salad on his plate to eat his desert.

Sweets are another thing which destroy the appetite for good plain food. A certain amount of sugar is needed by the body but it is not needed in the form which most people take it. There is very little food value in refined sugar. Let no sweets be eaten between meals and let the desserts consist of nuts, raisins, dates, figs, fresh fruits, custards made with eggs, and occasionally a bit of home made candy. You and your child will profit in many ways by following this program. Many a woman spends much money, time, and her own strength, which is of more value, in making pie and cake which are hard to digest and of little real food value,
