GENERAL ARTICLES. TROUBLOUS TIMES IN THE CRIP-PLE CREEK DISTRICT.

And there shall be a time of trouble such as never was since there was a nation, even to that same time, and at that time thy people shall be delivered, every one that shall be found in the book. Dan. 12:1 From the events that have taken place in this district during the past week it seems evident that we are entering upon the time spoken of in the above verse. It seems almost impossible that so many events could transpire in so short a time.

Monday morning at 2:30, the people in the vicinity of Independence were startled by an explosion which caused the death of thirteen persons and injured six. The explosive was placed under the platform at the depot where the non-union miners were about to take the train for their homes. The infernal machine which set off the explosion, was connected by a fine wire about one hundred yards long, to the round of a chair by which the wire was pulled. There was a report as of a pistol shot followed almost in the same instant by a deafening roar. Rocks began falling on the car roof. Immediately torches were lighted. The dead and wounded were lying everywhere. The night was intensely dark and the bodies were discovered only as they were stumbled upon or revealed by the flickering torches. The scene was heart rending.

In the afternoon a mass meeting of the people of the district was held at Victor, during which time many shots were fired between the soldiers and union miners, resulting in the death of two more. Tuesday the troops were called out, and General Bell hastened to the seat of the trouble. On the same day the resignation of city and county officials was demanded by the citizens. On Wednesday martial law was declared. On the same day a battle took place between the soldiers and union miners at Dunville, a small place about fifteen miles from Cripple Creek. One man was killed. Thursday the Citizens' Alliance decreed that no member of any union allied to the Western Federation of Miners should be employed in the Cripple Creek District. On Friday a jury began the investigation of Monday's disaster, and on this same day ninety men were deported by the militia on a train under sealed orders. On Saturday the exiles were left on the prairie near Holly, Colo., a half mile from the Kansas line. The same day witnessed the closing down of the Pride of Cripple Creek and the Winchester mines by the militia. Since that time other men have been deported to New Mexico, making three car loads, or nearly two hundred men.

The union stores, four in the district, have been closed. The union halls have been taken by the militia and their contents seized and held for investigation, and the end is not yet. Many are bein g held and will be tried soon on the charge of murder.

What do all these things mean? The meaning is that soon, very soon, our dear Saviour will come and put an end to all these things. What should be the attitude of the Christian at this time? The only true attitude is stated in Jas. 5:7. The only thing the brethern are asked to do at this time is to be patient. When the conflict rages on all sides of us it is not so easily obeyed. We are apt from the standpoint of the natural heart to join hands with either one side or the other, but the Bible says plainly, "Say ye not a confederacy, to all them to whom this people shall say, a confederacy; neither fear ye their fear, nor be afraid." We have no one to fear at this time but the God who made the heaven and the earth. Let the watchman on the walls of Zion give the trumpet a certain sound, and while there is a little time of waiting let us work diligently for the Master.

RESPONDING TO THE CALL.

We are already receiving quite a number of names in response to the call sent out to the churches recently, and the work is opening up so that all who wish may have a part in it. We hope that all our librarians will be ready to assist in this work by ascertaining just how many of these names his society can take for reading matter and missionary correspondence. The State Tract Society can not carry them all, and if it could it would give you no part in it, and we desire to have this work be co-operative, and the blessings it will bring distributed among all our people.

Do not wait, brethren and sisters, let us follow up this work now while the condition in our State appeals to us to carry the third angel's message to the people without longer delay. We feel sure that all will want a part in this work and that if it is faithfully done it will bring new life, and the blessing of God to us individually, and to our churches. How many names will you take, dear librarian? The scattered members may also have a part. Let us hear from you, and may God bless us as we work for others.

We are more than gratified to announce that the brethren at Palisade are taking hold earnestly to establish the above institution.

We have secured the services of Prof. B. E. Nicola, who is known as one of the leading educational men of the denomination, as principal. With such an able and experienced head we can have a state educational institution second to none. All the lower and higher grades will be taught, and there will be a normal course for church school teachers; thus the young people in our state can obtain a good academic education, and preparation for the work. It has been impracticable for many of our young people to attend school year after year at a great distance from home, and as a result some have been lost to the cause. Brethren and sisters, we must save our children. God lays the responsibility upon us as parents.

The Lord, in His abundant mercy, is providing a way and has moved upon the brethren at Palisade to lead out in the erection of a building for a school. Brother M. P. Walker has given a part of his beautiful orchard in which a building is now being erected. Palisade is the center of the best fruit belt in the state. About \$700 has been raised and that much more will be needed for the erection of the building. We appeal to you in behalf of our young people, to put up this building free from debt. Can we not have several \$100 and \$50 donations? Smaller donations will also be gladly received. There must be in our conference men and women who are deeply concerned over this great question, and who will sacrifice, if need be, to establish our first state school. The foundation is laid, the contract for the building is let, the teachers are secured, and school is to open early in September. What is done must be done quickly. -----THE SABBATH SCHOOL THE NEEDS OF OUR SABBATH SCHOOLS AND HOW TO SUPPLY THEM.

A little neglected girl from the streets once found her way into a Sunday-school and walking up to the superintendent asked, "Is this the way to heaven?" Her words startled him. He had not thought of it in that way before. But did not that little child, in her innocent questioning, express God's plan for Sabbathschools? The Lord's servant tells us that "The Sabbath-school should be one of the greatest instrumentalities and the most effectual in bringing souls to Christ." They should really be training-schools for the kingdom of heaven.

In the light of these facts let us consider our needs, knowing that God, "is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us."

Our first great need is officers and teachers who are men and women of God, whose lives are consecrated to His service, whose lips have been touched by a coal from His altar. Though their responsibilities are great, the One who bids them labor, says, "My grace is sufficient," and when He calls, they answer, "Here am I." Only earnest, pains-taking effort will be crowned with success. The workers must be diligent in the study of the Word, and must know how to plead earnestly with God for the precious souls committed to them. They will need to "make use of every opportunity to improve that they may render the best kind of service" and grow in efficiency from week to week.

Wisdom and tact must be cultivated. The superintendent needs these gifts from God in planning the work of the school, that right persons may be brought together as teacher and pupils, and every exercise of the school may make us better acquainted with our heavenly Father.

The teacher needs wisdom in imparting to others what God has revealed to him, and in calling out the powers of the pupils and fostering a love for Bible study. The truth of God must be presented in an attractive manner. Christ taught in parables, illustrating the truths of the gospel by scenes and incidents of every day life. The schools of the world have copied his methods. Shall we be more slow to learn of him?

It means much to thus work for God. but there is one unfailing source of help. "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." "He giveth power to the faint; and to them that have no might he in-creaseth strength."

AND HE BELIEVED IN THE LORD

The above statement is God's testimony of Abraham, who believed that God was able to do just what he said, even though there seemed to be tremendous obstacles in the way. Though what the Lord told him was contrary to nature, and to all human appearances a tremendous problem for solution, he, nevertheless, accepted God's statement as truth. and as a result God made him a righteous man. And we are told in the Word of God that this statement, quoted at the heading, "was not written for his sake alone, * * * but for us also, * * * if we believe on him that raised up Jesus our Lord from the dead." Rom. 4:23-24,

When, four years ago, the word of the Lord came to this people that the Lord had inaugurated a plan whereby schools could be freed from debt, to many it seemed an almost impossible thing. There were many obstacles, and the plan itself seemed such a strange way to accomplish so mighty a task. Who would naturally have thought that hundreds of thousands of dollars could be raised by the selling of "Christ's Object Lessons?" But God said that it could and would be done; and every one who accepted this statement as the word of the Lord knows how remarkably and wonderfully God demonstrated his truth.

And how truly has the fourfold promise been fulfilled,-a blessing to the people who have received the book, a blessing to the church that has sold the book, a blessing to the worker who has sold the book, a blessing to the school that has received the money to relieve the indebtedness. Never has there come a greater blessing into the life and experience of the writer than was received while selling the scores and many hundreds of these books.

May God help us one and all to do our part as has been indicated, that the reproach may be rolled away from the people of God, and we be found, like Abra-ham, to be friends of God, because we obey his voice and keep his charge. "And he believed in the Lord; and he counted it to him for righteousness," "and he was called the friend of God." Gen. 15:6; James 2:23. G
