Statistics

IT was Mr. C. H. Spurgeon who said, "I am not among those who decry statistics, nor do I consider that they are productive of all manner of evil; for they do much good if they are accurate, and if men use them lawfully. It is a good thing for people to see the nakedness of the land through statistics of decrease, that they may be driven on their knees before the Lord to seek prosperity; and on the other hand, it is by no means an evil thing for workers to be encouraged by having some account of results set before them."

The statistics given in this issue of the OUTLOOK are encouraging. Much has been accomplished. Let us praise God for what has been done. May the gains here recorded encourage us to attempt greater things in the future. And, after we have read through the different summaries, let us remember that the figures give only a very small part of the actual situation.

Statistics are valuable and necessary. We should make our reports on schedule time and give correct information. But after we have done this to the best of our ability, we must remember that cold figures never tell the whole story. Gains and losses in membership, in per capita tithes and offerings, in literature sales, in our institutional earnings, as recorded in the statistical report, tell but little of the real conquests, victories, and final results. Cold figures cannot number the tears shed, the weary hours of toil, the lonesome night watches of some isolated soul, the homesickness that comes at times to those who leave all to follow the Master's call. Figures cannot give the struggles and labors of those who hold up the torch of truth amid widespread error and heathen darkness.

Neither can they recount the temptations overcome, the persecutions endured, nor the sacrifices made.

God does not forget our labor of love. In the ledgers of heaven are written the full account. They are in the language and figures of the kingdom, the only language that can express correctly and fully the meaning of all that is included in a statistical report such as is given in this issue. There in heaven are recorded the motives that prompted us in all our endeavors. Not one sacrifice, nor willing service will be overlooked. The statistical reports of heaven will reveal much that our reports here on earth did not include. They will tell a great deal that was not taken account of, in the realms of human reckoning.

Elijah at one time told the Lord that only one in all the kingdom was on the Lord's side. From his human viewpoint the situation was hopeless. His report was: Total faithful members, one. Then God came to Elijah and checked over the report, and the total was found to be seven thousand.

Let us be careful lest we in our human weakness fail to see the work as God sees it. Beyond, yes, far beyond, what we see, are the final results as God sees them, and these results will one day be made plain to us. In that day we shall understand many things that are now obscure, and we shall know the full meaning of all our toil and sacrifice for God.

In the statistics of heaven will appear a full and accurate account, as recorded by the angels themselves,—those ministering spirits who have been sent forth to minister to those who shall be heirs of salvation.

OUTLOOK SUPPLEMENT — DIAMOND ANNIVERSARY CAMPAIGN

THE SABBATH SCHOOL RECRUITING AND REVIVAL CAMPAIGN

The purpose of this little supplement is to place before our working force in the Far Eastern Division the action of the Winter Council concerning the matter of building up the Sabbath school membership in our field by the united action and definite co-operation of each worker. Briefly stated, the purpose of the campaign is: First, to recruit the missing church members, and reclaim them as regular members of the Sabbath school; and secondly, to bring in others who should hear the message, and by faithful, personal effort, lead them to the acceptance of it.

This campaign is a world-wide effort, which marks the sixtieth anniversary of the founding of the Sabbath School Department; and it is fitting that we should enter whole-heartedly into this good plan which looks toward greatly increasing our church membership during the early months of the present year. The means by which this result may be attained are outlined in the following actions of the Winter Council of the Far Eastern Division:

Sixtieth Anniversary Membership Campaign

"Voted, (a) That in the Far Eastern Division the dates for this campaign be April 9 to June 25, 1938.

(b) That Sabbath, April 9, be set apart as a special day of prayer in behalf of our missing members and for the conversion of souls, keeping in mind the fact that 11,000 attending our Sabbath schools in the Far Eastern Division are not yet baptized.

(c) That the vernacular church papers be used as a means of awakening our faithful believers to the importance of visiting our missing members, and winning them back to the fold of the Sabbath school.

(d) That the General Conference Sabbath School Leaflet, No. 27, "Are You a Member of the

Sabbath School?" be abridged and adapted, and where the size of the constituency justifies its publication, it be furnished to our Sabbath schools as an aid to making this campaign effective.

(e) That a colored two-page insert in behalf of this soul-winning campaign appear in the OUTLOOK.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADER IN SABBATH SCHOOL WORK

In celebration of the sixtieth anniversary of the Sabbath school, we appeal to every loyal Sabbath school member, to emulate the example of the Good Shepherd by going after the "missing" sheep and the "missing" lambs of every Seventh-day Adventist church. Lend your co-operation with your church and Sabbath school officers as they launch this membership campaign to enroll every church member and the children of Adventist homes, in some class, or in the Home Division of the Sabbath school.

An interesting and spiritually helpful program is planned for Rally Day, June 18. Plan to make this "Diamond Anniversary" membership campaign successful in enrolling every church member as a regular Sabbath school member.

Remember that great Sabbath school achievement depends on enthusiastic leadership.—By J. A. Stevens, Secretary General Conference Sabbath School Department.

(f) That in every church a careful check be made of the church and Sabbath school membership lists, and that all names not found on the latter constitute a special list to be made the subject of prayer and personal work on the part of officers, teachers,

and consecrated members; and that a thorough search be made for every missing member and for the children of our believers and learners, with the definite object of bringing every one into the Sabbath school and into the enjoyment of a definite Christian experience.

(g) That during this campaign each Sabbath school superintendent report monthly concerning its progress in his school, to his local mission Sabbath school secretary, who will report to the union secretary, and he in turn to the Division.

(h) That the Sabbath School Department provide material for a special Sabbath School Jubilee program for June 18, as a climax to this campaign."

It hardly seems necessary that more be added by way of explanation or encouragement to our working force, to cause them to take hold of this effort, and make it the means of building up our constituency in the Far Eastern Division; but we believe it will be convenient and helpful to place in their hands some material for use in presenting the campaign, and putting it over in a strong way, in the churches of our territory. It is for this purpose that we are sending out this little supplement; but it should be understood that each worker is free to employ such means as may seem wise to him and his committee of counsel; and we trust that many plans will be put into operation during the campaign, which may be useful in days to come, in both building up and holding up Sabbath school attendance, and in steadily increasing our church membership throughout the field.

With a prayer that the blessing of God may rest in abundance upon every faithful effort that shall be made during the campaign, to gather in the missing members, and to find others who will become members, we place this supplement in your hands, believing that you will use it conscientiously, and will add to the material given in it, as the needs of your various fields may require.

Every mission employee, every church officer, and every individual believer is called upon at this time to unite in a great forward evangelistic movement, which is to be conducted through the avenue of the Sabbath school. Greater evangelism is the outstanding watchword of the Seventh-day Adventist denomination throughout all its many divisional organizations.

The Far Eastern Division, with its 213,000,000 souls, for the evangelization of whom God holds us responsible, should take the lead of all division fields in an endeavor to make every institution and every department distinctly evangelical in its varied activities.

The Sabbath school should be, and can be, the most potent and effective institution for winning souls to Christ, and for the addition of new members to the church. It should be the supreme objective of every organized Sabbath school to be just such an institution. No superintendent or Sabbath school teacher should allow himself to feel satisfied with his attainments in this branch of service until he sees not only the older believers confirmed in the truth, but new souls being born into the kingdom of God as the fruitage of Sabbath school activity.

Sabbath school statistics in the Far Eastern Division reveal some astounding facts,—facts that are encouraging; facts that are indeed commendable; because they indicate that our Sabbath schools are already serving as magnets of attraction to those not of our faith. Yet such statistical facts constitute a mighty challenge to the spiritual forces of the church, and the evangelistic workers in the various local missions. And what are those facts?

Within the territory stretching from the northern tip of Japan to the southernmost islands of the Netherlands East Indies, from tip to tip of our field, there are more than 11,000 persons attending our Sabbath schools who are not yet baptized church members. What a wonderful thing it would be if we could centralize our efforts during the present year, and more particularly during the Sabbath school membership campaign which is now on, upon these individuals who have already come under the scope of Sabbath school

influence! They are already within our borders, brethren and sisters, and they are waiting to be gathered in. Surely these 11,000 interested ones should constitute a most fruitful field for evangelical endeavor.

During this period of three months which is designated as a special time of seeking out those whom we wish to see become church members, and during which time we hope to bring all the missing church members into the Sabbath school, shall we not also pray and work earnestly for the definite conversion of those who love the Sabbath school, but who have never made a full surrender of their lives to God?

What — Sabbath School Membership campaign.

Where — In every church and Sabbath school in the Far Eastern Division.

When — April 9 — June 25, 1938.

Why — To bring back our "missing members," to win new members, and to work for the unconverted in our Sabbath schools.

By Whom—Every worker, every church officer, and every Sabbath school officer, teacher, and loyal member.

How — By prayer, careful planning, and thorough, systematic personal work.

Let us approach these individuals gently but earnestly, encouraging, and even urging them to follow the Lord Jesus, their Saviour, all the way,—taking a definite stand, and being baptized during this present quarter, that they may be fully identified with God's remnant church as a result of our efforts in their behalf.
