CUMBERLAND ITEMS

The Tenth Annual Session of the Cumberland Conference was held in Chattanooga, Tennessee, August 25. to September 4, 1910. Fifty tents were pitched upon the ground, accommodating two hundred and fifty of our people. The camp accomodations for shade, water, sanitation, neatness, and order called forth the highest praise from all who encamped and worshiped with us.

The Cafeteria Dining Tent was a very attractive and educational feature of the camp, and was well patronized by our people and the public who attended.

During the meeting a total of fifty delegates were in attendance, representing fourteen churches with a total membership of five hundred fourty-two. One new church was added to the sisterhood of the churches.

The president's report was well received, bringing courage and bright hopes to all our people for the advancement of the work in the conference during the coming year. The financial report was most encouraging: \$3010 having been pledged by our people on the \$300,000 fund. which gives us \$562 over our entire quota. \$814.88 of this amount has been paid, or nearly $\frac{1}{4}$ of the entire amount pledged. The tithe paid into the conference during the year 1909 was \$5,321.10; for the year 1910, \$8,132.54,-an increase of \$2,811.44. The tithe per capita for the year 1909 was \$10,65; for 1910, \$15.00; an increase per capita of \$4.35. During the seven months we have had charge of your work there that all orders can be filled by October 15 has been an increase in the tithe of \$1866.53 over the same corresponding period of last year.

tire contributions to missions. This is a good example to set for all our sister conferences, and we trust that none of our schools will ever backslide from this generous disposition.

In our address we recommended the raising of \$500 for a tent fund to purchase a camp-meeting pavilion, also a few more family tents. We are pleased to report that \$600 was pledged to this fund; \$513 was pledged to foreign missions; \$51 to our cafeteria fund. We are indeed grateful to our people for these generous contributions, and wish to thank you one and all for your liberal response and hearty co-operation.

Another year has passed by, and we have reached the time of launching another Harvest Ingathering Campaign. Last year this Campaign was launched and directed by the General Conference from Washington D. C. Over 50, 000 letters were written and sent out by our general office in the interest of this missionary ingathering.

This year the campaign work was turned over to each local conference, each doing proportionally the same work that was done by the General Conference. This plan has been looked upon as a good one, and is now being operated in all the local conferences in the raising of the \$300,000 Experience teaches us that much more fund. thorough and satisfactory work can be done at close range with the people than to operate at such long distane.

Sister Knight reports several new Sabbathkeepers in Atlanta. She has organized a Y.W. C. A. with over a hundred members, with headquarters at 209 Greensferry Ave. Through this society many of the best class are being supplied with our good books and papers. We believe there will be good results from this work.

I expect to visit Macon, Dixie, Ty Ty, Fitzgerald, and Savannah during the next month, conducting quarterly meetings at each place.

The time for the usual Harvest Ingathering Service is rapidly drawing on, and we most earnestly desire that all of our brethren and sisters will take hold of this work. The secretary has written letters to all the churches and isolated ones, giving particulars. May the Lord bless richly every effort put forth for the advancement of the message at this time is my prayer.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS Adopted by the North Carolina Conference

at Kernersville, August 18-28, 1910

1. Expressing gratitude to God for His care and blessings, and pledging more aggressive service for Him in the future.

2. Hearty approval of the scholarship plan, and urging our young people to take advantage of it.

3. Earnest efforts to put all our children into our denominational schools.

4. Special efforts in missionary work among our neighbors, with books, tracts, papers. Bible readings with the view of getting at least one person into the truth and inducing the same to attend the camp-meeting next year.

5. The sale of six copies of "Ministry of Healing" and five copies of "Life and Health" per member, to aid our sanitariums in getting out of debt.

6. Making up our quota on the \$300,000 Fund as soon as possible.

(This is an average of \$5.00 per member.)

7. Refusing to retain or use God's tithe for anything except its designated purpose.

8. Pledging to carry out the ten-cent-a-week plan with greater faithfulness.

9. The adoption of the Sabbath-school Teacher's Reading Course by all our Sabbath-school officers and teachers.

10. The use of the "Sabbath-school Worker" by Sabbath-school officers and teachers, and members of the Home Department.

11. The use of "Liberty" and other religious

liberty literature in placing before our public men the principles of liberty, and also by writing articles for the newspapers.

12. Hearty approval of the Harvest Ingathering Campaign and a promise to encourage others by definite example to enlist in this work.

13. Earnest efforts by our churches to organize church-schools wherever practicable, under the advice of the educational secretary.

14. That an advanced church school be conducted at Hildebran the coming shool year, provided satisfactory arrangements can be made with J. W. Beach; without investing in land or buildings.

15. That the conference committee be authorized to look for a suitable site for another school whose location would be more central for the educational work in our conference.

16. Thanks to the citizens of Kernersville and vicinity for the many favors granted for our camp-meeting.
