DUTIES OF OFFIERS Church Treasurer (Concluded from last week)

This officer should receive all tithes, offerings for missions, and all money that is to go to the conference treasurer and give receipts for the same. He should keep a strict account of all money received and paid out, in the church Financial Record, and report the same to the church every quarter. The date of every item should be entered in the book as well as the amount. He should forward all money to the conference treasurer each month, and a report to him each quarter, on the blank prepared for the purpose. He should keep a supply of the tithe envelopes on hand and distribute them among the members every Sabbath, gathering up from them those previously distributed with their tithes and offerings in them. This will encourage regular and systematic giving.

Church Librarian

The librarian should have charge of the church library and keep a careful record of all books and other publications belonging to it; of books loaned for reading, to whom loaned, and the date, and to see that they are returned. Every church ought to have a library of our standard denominational books, including the Testimonies, and some other books approved by our people. This will give all a chance to read. all our excellent books. Few are able to buy them all for themselves, and a church library meets a real need. Then all, both young and old should be encouraged to read the books, and thus make the library a real blessing to the church. The librarian should receive orders from the members for publications for their personal use, and for missionary work, and order all publications for the church and Sabbathschool. Cash should accompany all orders placed with the librarian, or should be paid in a

short time, so that no debt may be accumulated. Then the librarian can send cash with his order to the conference secretary, and much time is saved, because accounts are avoided, and there are no debts to collect.

The librarian should encourage every member to do some missionary work each week, and furnish blanks on which to report the work done. Weekly reports are recommended for the members, and a monthly report compiled from the individual reports by the librarian should be sent to the corresponding secretary. Frequent reports prompt and encourage the members to do missionary work, and the elder should cooperate with the librarian and the treasurer in their work by giving them opportunity to distribute the tithe envelopes and the report blanks at a suitable time in connction with the Sabbath service, and by using his influence in favor of paying a faithful tithe, making liberal offerings, and doing missionary work and reporting it. A faithful elder will always do this.

The Conference Church

All members of the conference church and isolated Sabbath-keepers not members of any church, should send all their tithes and offerings, orders for publications and money for the same to the conference secretary, but their reports of missionary work should be sent to the corresponding secretary each month. 7. "The Lord doth give saying, the female proclaimers are a numerous host."--Robert Young's Trans. 1862.
