

hills of South Dakota, and that man came up there and searched me out." God wants us to be willing to search them out. Think of the facilities we have in our books, tracts, magazines and periodicals for searching out the individual and the masses.

A well attended missionary meeting is a most refreshing place to be. Among the individual reports given in at one I attended recently were:

1. Report from a sister who had been interesting some Jews in some of our tracts.

2. Testimony by a sister whose boy had just written her he was going out canvassing from the school during the summer. She was glad, altho it meant a sacrifice to her. Since then he has made a success in the field.

3. Another report was by a sister who was sending the *Signs* to a brother of hers in another state, where, up to then, no Adventists lived. A letter had just come that the family had begun to keep the Sabbath, and were gathering in a little company to study with them.

4. Another sister who had that day received a check for \$25.00 to apply on the new church building from a Presbyterian minister whose mother was a patient in her home—a most interesting circumstance.

Those who went out from that missionary meeting did so with a desire to do more personal work in reaching others.

Scores of such items might be given of the work where our churches are throwing themselves into the work for those about them. At one of our camp-meeting missionary services, a librarian reported the addition of a man and wife to the church who had been reached by the society with the *Signs* and Bible readings. They were formerly Socialists.

At that same camp-meeting a mother's simple recital of how the truth came to her home shows how far-reaching the simple acts of missionary endeavor may be.

"I lived sixty miles from the railroad in Montana," she said, "was not religious, and did not know that there was an Adventist in the state. A relative over in Missouri became an Adventist and began sending me the *Signs*. I only read the Home Department for more than a year, when finally one day I read an article on the Sabbath, and was impressed with it, and I began to study. I hunted up all

the old papers, smoothed them out, and began to keep the Sabbath. I knew nothing of any conference in Montana. My oldest child was twenty years old before she heard a sermon."

Think of it; this sister now has five children in the truth; two are successful church school teachers, and another is preparing for the work. Two have canvassed successfully, having placed between two and three thousand dollars worth of "Herald" in San Francisco the summer after the earthquake and fire.

Trace it all back to the simple home missionary effort, the sending of that paper. Truly, some seed has brot forth "thirty, some sixty, and some an hundred fold." Did it pay? Will it pay to keep up the missionary spirit in your church, and be continually sending out the printed messages of truth?

Doubt, unbelief, fear, and every other barrier of Satan should be forever put out of the way.

We must have in our churches, the missionary centers,

Enthusiasm,

Missionary Leadership,

Individual Responsibility,

More Real Work for Others.

This will call into use such methods of work as:

Every one using tracts continuously;

Mailing and using, personally, liberal quantities of the *Signs*;

Sale of our magazines by those who can give time to it;

Bible Readings by those who are fitted;

Generous use of our small books selling and loaning to those nearby.

Thus we shall combine the four elements of success, and be more nearly reaching the ideal God has set for his church at work.

This year two religious bills were passed by our legislature which require religious instruction in the public schools. I felt I ought to oppose it, but I was not well enough informed upon the subject, so kept silent. I am sure if I had put up a a good argument against the bills I could have suppressed them. If you have any reading matter upon these subjects I want it."

There are hundreds of other men in responsible positions that would rally to our cause for religious freedom, if we would put into their possession the arguments and principles of religious liberty which are so clear to us. The last issue of *Liberty* has many striking features of interest, and it cannot help but make friends for our principles. Our people ought to give it a wide circulation just now, and urge every one who secures a copy to fill out the petition to Congress and send it in as soon as possible.
