COLLEGEDALE NEWS NOTES

After sundown last Saturday night, the new girls—those who had not attended S. J. C. before this year, were invited by the old girls to a Japanese program to be given in the parlor at eight o'clock. At that hour, about a hundred girls, clad in kimonos, left their slippers outside (as all Japanese do), and entered a Japanese room. Upon entering, the new girls were greeted with many bows and words of welcome. The girls were divided into eight groups, each of which sat in a circle on a rug.

Sister Field, who several years ago spent some time in Japan, told the girls of the customs of the Japanese women. Her talk was made more interesting by some relics she showed, which she had brought from Japan. Miss Juanita Hibben, from Chattanooga, spent a few years in Korea. She told of some of their customs, very similar to those of the Japanese. Mrs. Adams also told about her short stay in Japan, and some of the strange ways of the people.

The girls were then given an opportunity to eat as Japanese do—with chopsticks. Each was given a dish of spaghetti and a pair of chopsticks. Perhaps the girls were glad there weren't any Japanese there to see them eat. After this they were served with ice cream and wafers—eaten after the American fashion, however.

While the girls were having a good time inside the boys were having a potato roast. They all went over to the mountain side where they had just as good a time as the girls had.

Our library recently received a gift of about 150 volumes. Elder W. H. Heckman presented these to the school. The books are an excellent selection, and will add to the usefulness of the library.

Elder O. Montgomery and Professor W. E. Howell were visitors last week over Sabbath.

The Vesper service was indeed interesting. Professor Howell talked to us on the providences of God in permitting so many young people to be here obtaining a Christian education. In the testimony meeting that followed nearly every student told of how God had so directed that he might be at Collegedale this year to prepare for a place in the work.

Professor Howell spoke to us both at the morning service and at Young People's Meeting. Our hearts were made glad again as we heard of the way the heathen are accepting the gospel message.

Wednesday night, a Thanksgiving program was given in the chapel. The program consisted of several appropriate selections by the chorus, a reading by Miss Jean Wingate, and several pencil games to test our knowledge and mental alertness.

Thanksgiving Day is always full of interesting things at Collegedale. At eight o'clock in the morning all met for a brief chapel exercise. The rest of the morning was spent in playing games, a ball game adding interest to the morning's recreation. At noon dinner was served in two places. The parents and students living outside the home had invited some of the home students to a dinner in the boy's parlor; the students in the home had invited some of the students living outside to the dining room. At both places the floor was strewn with leaves, and logs were placed on the floor, where everyone sat. All enjoyed the excellent dinner, served picnic fashion, which the Domestic Science Department had prepared. After dinner Professor Thiel led in a hike.

CAROLINA NEWS

At this time the white membership of the Carolina Conference has passed \$6500, which is \$500 over their goal; and they are still at work. \$6220 would have amounted to \$10 for each white member, figured on the basis of our mission quota. The prospects are that we will reach at least \$7000, which will put us over \$11 per capita.

We now know of fourteen white churches that are over the top; yet most of the reports from the churches as to the result of "Over the Top Week" have not yet been received. There are five colored churches over, and some reports showing encouraging gains are being made by them.

Brother Green, in writing about the colored church at Durham, says they now have a membership of twenty-three with good prospects for more. In explaining the membership there, he says there were five old Sabbath keepers, three back-sliders who were reclaimed, and fifteen new ones, added as a result of the effort held there this summer.

Today, all the white workers and ministers have come to Charlotte for a Council Meeting regarding the Week of Prayer, and a number of other important problems concerning our conference work. Tomorrow, the colored ministers will come in for the same purpose.

Elder Clapp reports that he is having an encouraging attendance at the theater meetings in Durham. Among those manifesting an interest is one of the Trinity College Theological students, who is studying with him to learn more about the prophecies.

Elder Allen Walker has closed his meetings in the theater at Walhalla, but is continuing now in the church building at West Union. He is having a full house attendance. The Sabbath school, including the children, is running between thirty and forty. He is encouraged to believe that there will be several added as a result of the meetings in Walhalla and this follow-up work.

Last Sabbath Elder Keate spoke at the Spartanburg church in the morning, and at Cherokee in the afternoon. He talked at the Young People's Meeting at 5:00 o'clock at Spartanburg. He reports that the members all seem of good

courage, their hearts being stirred by the reports of progress from the Fall Council.

Elder Boynton reports that the situation at Cleveland is more encouraging than ever. He says the interest is increasing, and the prospects are better than they have been at any time.

The effort that has been planned for Sumter will no doubt be in progress at the time this item is read. The tabernacle is now nearing completion. Elder I. D. Richardson and wife, Elder Bellinger and wife, Miss Ruth Orchill, and Miss Graves will all take part in this effort.

Brother L. W. Nations has been holding a series of meetings in a tent about ten or twelve miles from his home. From the various reports that have come to the office he has had an attendance of from two to three hundred. At the time he closed his meetings, on account of cold weather, there were four hundred in attendance. He says that two Baptist ministers are deeply interested, and a number have declared their intention of keeping the Sabbath. He is planning to follow up this interest by personal work.

Brother B. W. Simpson, of Winston-Salem, says he is now ready to start out in the colporteur work. On account of sickness he has been delayed this week, but will probably start next week.

There is promise of full attendance at our Colporteur Institute February 12 to 21. We trust that a number will decide between now and then to take up the regular colporteur work.

Satan is making strenuous effort to close up our work here in Charlotte. An ordinance has been passed prohibiting solicitation for money without a permit from the City Council. They are also trying to stop the sale of our literature on the streets. Ominous signs on every side indicate the near approach of our Saviour. Let us work now while we have opportunity.
