TITHE PAYING REWARDED

Today two native Dominicans took unch with us. One was a young man who has just given up his position in he military band in order to keep the subbath, and the other, a member of our thurch whose husband is not an Adventst. During the meal the topic of conversation drifted to tithe paying. The young man told of a trap the devil had set for him. He had his tithe put aside, when one of the members who sells vegetables from house to house, came to collect some money he owed her. He told her that all the money he had was this tithe.

After asking him two or three times that he pay her with that money, he yielded, thinking he could collect money from one of the several persons who owed him; but, when he went out to collect, not one of them was able to pay him one cent; so he could not fufil his obligations to the Lord. He took this as a manifestation of the Lord's displeasure of spending money that did not belong to him.

My wife then told about a drought that came to the country where her family lived. Her father was an Adventist and paid tithe. His neighbors were not Adventists, and did not pay tithe. Their crops were all growing side by side, on the same kind of soil, and were green and beautiful when the drought struck that section of the country. In a short time the neighbors' crops began to wither and were checked in a marked manner in their growth, while her father's corn and cotton continued to grow in a marvelous way and never withered in the least. It stood there as a mighty monument, telling all who saw it that the Ruler of the universe still opens the windows of heaven to those who love Him and obey His commands.

People came to him for miles around, wanting to know the difference in the crops. Thus he was able to witness for the Saviour, and to tell them that he was serving the God in heaven, who is able to bless beyond measure those who are willing to take Him at His word, and not rob Him of the small part that He has reserved for carrying the gospel to the thousands who are wandering in darkness far away from home, and are longing for some one to show them the way of eternal life.

The sister then told us of a trying experience through which she and her family had just passed. She is the mother of thirteen children, all too young to do much work. About six months ago her husband took sick, and his pay stopped. He was not able to work again until recently. As they had no money laid aside, they were soon in a pitiable condition financially. They had to sell all the furniture in the house that was salable in order to buy food for the children. Many times the growing youngsters, as well as the father and mother, had to pass the day without anything to eat; and many more days passed with very little to eat.

When they were in the midst of their perplexities and difficulties and knew not which way to turn, or what to do, she was offered some work for which she received \$5.00. This was spent as soon as received, except the tithe. Friday afternoon came, and not a cent was in the house to buy food for Sabbath. She thought of the fifty cents tithe; but said, "No, I can't spend the Lord's money;" so Sabbath dawned on an empty table and many empty stomachs.

As she started to young people's meeting Friday night, her husband asked her for ten cents, but she told him that she could not let him have it, as all the money she had was tithe which belonged to the Lord. Sabbath morning was

When she arrived at home after the service, she found that some one had brought enough food, not only for her family, but others were able also, to share in the bounties the Lord had prepared for them; and that very night the Lord had another blessing and surprise for her. Her brother-in-law came to see them. He is very stingy and selfish, and had never given her one cent before, although he had lived in their home, and she had washed and ironed his clothes and done many other things for him for a long time. After talking a while, he gave her six dollars. Thus she received in monetary blessings several times the value of the amount she gave, not mentioning the great spiritual blessing she received in complying with the divine command in paying tithe.

I thought while she was relating her experience, if all our members throughout the world were as faithful as this sister in paying tithe, the Lord's treasury would soon be overflowing with means for carrying the Third Angel's Message to earth's remotest bounds, and soon the Lord would come to put an end to all the trials and sufferings that come to those who are striving to obtain a passport from this world to those glorious mansions above that our Saviour has gone to prepare. Remember this sister when you are tempted to rob the Lord.

GRAND RIVIERE

In this first convention were represented eleven churches. Two of our good pioneer workers, Pastors M. N. Isaac and Joseph Blot, gave us their timely help. Their exhortations and counsels found receptive hearts, ready to put into practice what they heard. The help of Pastor W. P. Elliott, director of the mission, and Brethren Apollon, Th. Abel, St. C. Guerrier and Orville Dunn, also contributed greatly to the success of the convention. From the opening sermon to the last meeting, we could feel the presence of heavenly messengers in our midst.

PETITE RIVIERE

To the central and southern parts of the island, I was accompanied by Brother Dunn, director of our school, and Brother M. D. Howard, treasurer of the mission. The four churches in the central section sent a good delegation to the convention. Some of the believers came on foot. They walked from 50 to 60 miles. This certainly showed a good spirit. Great joy filled the hearts of all assembled there. The people of the town were also touched by the Spirit of God, and, as a result of our meetings, many friends have been gained for our cause from among them. Our dear brethren and sisters of Petite Riviere appreciated this visit, and did everything to render our stay with them pleasant.

SEVENTY-THREE IN HONDURAS

Sunday, August 21, it was our privilege to baptize twenty-six in Bonacca, the Bay Islands of Honduras. Most of these were young people. Sabbath, the day preceeding the baptism, we had an impressive service in this, our largest church, when all these young people came forward to sign the covenant. Old, as well as young, consecrated their lives anew to God, and it was inspiring to hear the testimonies of those in the church who had grown grav in this message. The Lord was near, and all left the meetings, determined to live closer to God, as we see the time for His coming drawing near. Elder E. C. Henriques is now in Bonacca following up the work there.

Among those baptized was a Honduranian general with his two daughters. For several years this general has been suffering from wounds inflicted in one of the many wars of this country; but he is now getting better. It was, indeed, inspiring to hear his testimony, and to notice his willingness to accept this blessed truth. One sister, a Sabbath school teacher, had the joy of seeing all the members of her class baptized. The secret of her success seemed to be revealed in the words of a testimony addressed to them, when she said: "I have



rayed for you, even if you did not now it."

The instruction given by Pastors Baxer, Wood, and Sutton, during our workers' meeting in Utila was appreciated by all. Several persons have taken their stand, and have been baptized as a direct result of these meetings.

Our 1927 goal for baptisms in Honduras is 100. Up to date 73 have already been baptized and we are pushing hard to go over our goal.

We have been glad to welcome Brother Fanselau, from Germany, who is taking up the book and home missionary work in this mission.

From Belize comes the good word from Pastor Overstreet of nine baptisms within the last few weeks. Pray for us and the work of God in this field. E. J. LORNTZ.

THE JOY OF KNOWING JESUS

"Perhaps you will think it strange that I call you 'Brother'; but it is because this morning I have had the honor and the inexpressible satisfaction of being baptized by Brother Lorntz. There were 25 of us baptized, including my two daughters, Graciela and Blanca.

"Great has been the joy we have experienced this day in which we have been born again to enter into life with Jesus. Certainly, it is only when one is given over to the world and to the things of the world, that he cannot see and understand the great wonders embraced in the treasures contained in the divine Word,—the Holy Bible.

"Today I have fixed my eyes on the One who has drawn me out of darkness into light; and I entreat you, with all my soul, to pray for us, that we may be firm, pertinacious and constant in our faith toward Jesus. I am fully convinced, that, in my own strength, I cannot take one step forward toward perfection; but full of faith, and confiding in the precious promises of our Heavenly Father, and in the light, influence and power of the Holy Spirit, I press forward endeavoring to reach the prize which is the unfading crown of glory, that He has prepared for those that wait for Him."

NEWS ITEMS

Brother J. E. Shidler, who has just begun a series of meetings in the interior of Panama, writes: "This section of the great harvest field is as needy as any. The people are friendly to the teachings of the Bible. Very few of them have ever read the Scriptures; but they realize that they need something better than what they have. The greatest evil among them is passive indifference. They need the working of the Spirit of God in their hearts to awaken them to a realization of their lost condition, and their need of seeking after God, the Giver of eternal life."

"We have had many heart-aches over the work here in Guatemala," wrote Pastor E. P. Howard, superintendent of that mission, "but every quarter that passes sees improvement. We have been dealing with error in the fear of God, and He certainly has been helping. Truth is coming out on top. When this year ends you will find in Guatemala the largest membership ever, and loyalty to the cause growing with each month. Opportunities in the Spanish work here are many, and you will see a remarkable growth as time passes. I have only words of praise to God for His guiding, leading hand."

Sister Eva Borden has entered work in Guatemala as a self-supporting missionary nurse. She has secured recognition from the government and is permitted to follow her profession throughout the country.

EXPERIENCES IN ANTIOQUENA

Pastor E. M. Trummer, who is laboring in one of the most strongly Catholic fields in our division, in a recent letter speaks of some of the hardships, and then adds, "we are very thankful to the Lord that He keeps us full of courage and leads us on toward success."

"The people," he continues, "appreciate practical work, such as opening schools and helping the poorer families to live better healthwise. A number of merchants told me in the Harvest Ingathering work, even last year, that they would send their children if we would open a school; and others have promised financial help. In the small circle about us, there is hardly a day that I am not asked what to do for this or that ailment.

"On one occasion a family was very thankful for my interest in them. Their fifteen-months-old baby had a serious intestinal infection. The doctor had given a number of medicinal remedies; but the little girl kept getting worse. They called me in, and I told them what I would do if she were my child; adding, however, 'But you have your doctor, and I should not want to advise against him.'

"That night, when the life of the little one seemed to be slipping away, the parents decided to try my suggestion. The treatments were given, and the little girl rested better. With careful dieting, and continual treatments, they continued to pray for God's blessings upon them. The following day she passed the crisis favorably, and in three days the parents said joyfully, 'she is a new girl to us.' They had not expected to keep her.

"How much we would be able to do for the people, if we only had a nurse here with us. The people then would get a real vision of what the mission of true Christianity is. Owing to all kinds of vice, physical and moral degeneracy is astoundingly great. How much *real* schools would do! I trust that when we have a number of Seventh-day Adventist children ready for the school, we can have a teacher for Medellin."

ATLANTIC COLOMBIA

For the first time in the history of this mission our canvassers reports for one month (September) showed \$1,000 worth of books delivered.

Impassable roads have kept Brother Valdés in Sincelejo; but he has been able to rent a hall and hold some meetings. He reports an ever-increasing interest in that town. The Sabbath school there reported for the first time at the end of the third quarter, and sent in over \$28 in offerings. Under the consecrated leadership of Brother Valdés,

THE MOST POPULAR BOOK

Last year the British and Foreign Bible Society circulated over ten million volumes of Scripture. That is the sixth time they have made such a record in one year. The volumes consisted of 1,136,123 complete Bibles, 1,219,997 New Testaments, and 7,771,967 smaller portions of the Book of books. And this is only one of the great publishing houses producing Bibles and portions of Bibles in more than 700 languages. The Book which Ingersoll, in the nineteenth century, declared would be dead in ten years is traveling faster than ever with its message of hope to a perishing world. the little company is taking its place in our work and letting its light shine in that town where the first of March this year there was not a single Protestant.

Brother Redondo is on another trip in the mission launch to the upper Sinú River. As there is no mail or telegraph service up there, we shall have to wait till he returns for news of his trip.

I have visited Fundación, and found six persons preparing for baptism. Some of these I had not met before. They have begun to keep the Sabbath recently through the home missionary efforts of our members there.

Brother Luis Urbina of San Juan de Cesar recently went to Rio Hacha and took 50 subscriptions to El Centinela. He reports a number of persons deeply interested in the truth in various places which he has visited. Due to this list of subscriptions from Brother Urbina and another long list from Brother Zephirin in Cartagena, as well as increased orders from other colporteurs, the number of magazines coming to this mission is again moving upwards. One thing that helps our sales is the custom of our agents to sell from three to seven different numbers at once. We have sold about 500 back numbers in the last two months.

The Harvest Ingathering work has started off nicely this year. The native members in Barranquilla raised about \$40. A firm which gave me \$25 last year gave me \$100 this year. Our receipts on this fund will be considerably more this year than last.

NOTES FROM THE UNION

Reports throughout the union indicate that a real forward movement is in progress. From the Leeward Islands on the north down through the South Caribbean Conference and into Guiana, the workers all sound a note of courage and are earnestly working toward the attainment of their goals for souls which was set at their respective conference sessions held nearly a year ago.

In two of the several efforts being

conducted in the South Caribbean Conference, special work is being done with the East Indians, and to date the results seem quite encouraging for many of these people are regular attendants. Of course, the final results are not yet known, but we are hoping that many of these people will respond to the light of truth.

Undoubtedly many are anticipating word from Mt. Roraima; and we regret to say that we have had no word from the brethren since the first of July. We must remember that they are back in the interior where there are no postal facilities. We solicit an earnest interest in your prayers that God will richly bless these workers and the Indians among whom they labor. Mrs. R. J. Christian has had to return to Georgetown, and is at present in the hospital expecting to undergo an operation. Again we solicit prayers in her behalf.

Elder C. E. Knight, president of the Guiana Conference, reports pleasing progress on the construction work of the new mission homes being erected in Georgetown. The workers will be very happy for these new buildings where they can protect themselves from mosquitos, and perhaps by this means make their attacks of fever less frequent. Guiana is an extremely unhealthful section and the workers there need our prayers that God may protect them daily.

Students are arriving at the East Caribbean Training School in Trinidad; and construction work is under way on the buildings there. All members of the faculty are on the ground and a night school is now being conducted as an aid to those who are preparing to enter day classes to begin in the near future. The students arriving early are coming for the purpose of working up credits so as to be prepared to enter school on the opening day. We believe them to be a fine class of young people who have a real ambition to qualify themselves for efficient service in the Master's vineyard.

I was very thankful for this experience, because it was a good home, and I remembered that Brother Gil and I had to talk a long time to sell the first book, for these people were very fearful. IF WE DON'T, WHAT THEN?

The many letters from different parts of the field, asking for pastors and teachers, had collected. We could no longer satisfy the senders with anything short of a visit by somebody, so finally Brother Brower and I started out to see how many of these anxious inquirers we could hunt out in the little villages at the far ends of the rocky mule trains. I shall not attempt a review of the entire six weeks, but will try to give some idea of the way the Lord is opening doors to the message in this part of Colombia.

Arriving on the Sabbath at the little town, Tulua, in the heart of the great CaucaValley, we were happily surprised to find a room full of people,—about twenty-five of them,—engaged in the study of the Sabbath school lesson. A year before, one of the young men in the company had bought the book, "Our Day," from Brethren Brower and Prado; and, with no other help save that of the Holy Spirit, he was bringing into existence a real Seventh-day Adventist church. Their faces lighted up with joy when they learned who we were; and in their joyous excitement, they would say to one another: "I told you they would come, even if those other missionaries did tell us they wouldn't."

These people had suffered much abuse, both from Catholics and Protestants; but it seems to have served as a stimulant to growth. At the close of the Sabbath school, a little box was passed around for the offerings; and we were informed that as soon as they were baptized, we should have the box and its contents. I am the happy possessor of the box, for we baptized a number before leaving there. It contained \$5.40 for God's cause. To me this was a worlderful expression of faith.

The last evening we were with them, we conducted a meeting, and closed the service in the usual way, but found it difficult to leave. There had been enough folks standing outside to reful the room; and they begged us to continue. So another sermon was delivered, another closing song sung, and the benediction pronounced. We shock hands with the people, and they left the building. But again the room filled with anxious looking people. They took their places just as we used to file into the mess hall for the second or third table in the army. There they were, ready to be served. So what was there for us to do, but break the Bread of Life to this third audience?

This was my first experience of the kind; but it demonstrated to me that these folks are truly "hungering and thirsting after rightcousness"; and if we do not deliver the last message, what then? I can assure you that our own souls are being refreshed, as we minister to dear ones who have for so long been waiting.

From the Cauca Valley, we crossed over the Andes Mountains into the upper Magdalena Valley. This was a hard and dangerous trip, both for man and beast, and it required several days to make it. But we were well repaid for our trouble. We found many who had heard a little about the Bible; and they begged us to stop long enough in their town to teach them. But, even away up there at the headwaters of the Magdalena River, there was an entire family keeping the true Sabbath, and teaching their neighbors the Third Angel's Message.

When these folks were baptized, their faces lighted up with a genuine joy which comes only to those who have found the Lord, and know that their salvation is sure. In that place the priest influenced the man who owned the only hotel building in that part of the country, to order the manager to turn us out. The manager, however, said that he would not eject us, no matter what results might follow. He gave us the accommodations desired; and, when we left, he saddled a borse and went a long way with us. Truly the Lord knows how to care for His servants. Friends, there are many, many more in the hundreds of towns and villages of Colombia who are awaiting the arrival of a teacher. We are doing our best, but pray "the Lord of the harvest" to "send forth laborers."

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WORD FROM BROTHER BOEHNE

Shortly after leaving Guatemala City to establish the first Indian mission station in Guatemala, Brother Boehne wrote friends of their journey. Here are snatches from his letter that will help you to pray more earnestly for Brother and Sister Boehne in their new work. He wrote in part: "August 29: In looking vp the matter of getting our freight from the railroad to Tzanjuyu, (Lake Atitlan), I was advised by several in Solola, that by all means I should go *myself* to pay personally the charges, and oversee transportation arrangements. They all agreed it was unsafe to trust anyone else to handle the money for storage, mozos, mules,

etc., and attend to transfer of the baggage.

"This explains why I am here tonight on my way to Cocales where five mozos and five mules are to meet me tomorrow about noon at the railroad station. Secured five mules at \$1 each. They will take 185 to 200 pounds each. This is considerably cheaper than by mozos. Of the 1,365 pounds the mozos will take 400 to 425 and the mules the balance.

"Having plenty of time, I decided to walk down, thus saving a \$2.50 fee for a horse. This will help make up for the storage charges which have been unavoidable.

"August 30—Had a fine day down at Cocales. Everything went off wonderfully smoothly. Paid the jitney truck fifteen pesos for round-trip to depot at Cocales; it was about six miles. Went down early this morning and returned on the last trip this P. M.

"After breakfast, I went to work; with permission of agent, I weighed and marked each separate box and bundle. Uncrated the organ.

"September 1st.—All my freight has been loaded on the ferryboat. I certainly am glad. It weighs 1,388 pounds. Can easily haul it in the Ford in three loads from ferry to the mission farm.

"I certainly am happy the way the Lord is helping, and I am so happy for the wonderful outlock and prospects that are outs, as my wife and I go forward endeavoring faithfully to do our best in opening up this first mission station for the Indians of Guatemala."
