Ways and Means

S we study the needs of the work in various parts of the great world field, it is frequently the case that we are led to believe that our lack of funds is our greatest handicap in the prosecution of the message. But it is my firm belief and conviction, from a careful study of our methods of operation, that there are many ways by which the means already at our disposal can be made to cover a greatly extended service, and thus accomplish a great deal more than the available funds have thus far given us in net results to the cause of God.

We must certainly look our problems squarely in the face, and accept some of the plain, cold facts connected with our administrative work, if we expect to measure up to God's requirements of us in these increasingly perplexing times. We know and understand that the future holds, not better times, but greatly increased and more difficult problems for our work and workers in all parts of the world. On the other hand, we know that it is not by might, nor by power, not by numbers of workers, not through amounts of money, that the work of God is to be finally completed. The work must be done, under the blessing of God, by a much better use of the facilities available, a more intelligent distribution of what we already have.

While we recognize that our spiritual needs constitute our most outstanding requirement, it seems to me that hand in hand with the fulfillment of this need is promised heavenly wisdom for greatly extended prosecution of our work through more definitely productive returns from the facilities and means already granted us. In the grave responsibilities that are placed upon us in the cause

of God, we are forced, time and again, to the profound conviction that there need be no lack of harmony between a strongly spiritual work and an outstandingly efficient, productive, and highly fruitfull one. Indeed, the two should go hand in hand.

We are clearly instructed that until man has done his full part, even as did faithful Abraham upon Mt. Moriah, in giving up his dearest treasure, we cannot expect the Lord to work miracles in our behalf for the furtherance of His cause. We must do our full part, and then by faith lay our burdens before the Lord, believing that He will do His part in providing means for the finishing of the work.

New and Untried Experiences

The year 1939 holds before us untried ways and untold perplexities. We are already learning, to our sorrow, through a knowledge of China's trouble in particular, that what we have failed to do in times of peace we must do in times of war and trouble. But the end is not yet. This is only a beginning of sorrows. There are doubtless in store for the people of God even greater troubles, but also still greater triumphs than we have thus far experienced. Distress, wars, and perplexities will come of a certainty, and in spite of all we can do to stem the tide of oncoming disaster. But the possibilities for triumph in the cause of God, as measured by the mold we give our individual stewardship, constitute a mighty challenge to every believer, that every ounce of ability, of talent, and of energy that the Lord has given us may be enlisted in service for the finishing of the great task laid upon us.

Let us open our eyes and look upon the fields that are ripe already to harvest! Even a tract prayerfully presented may mean a soul for the kingdom of heaven. A single sermon, prepared under the unction of the heavenly Spirit, has led scores of persons to the foot of the cross. Under the blessing of God, then, what may be the returns from a single series of meetings, or an evangelistic campaign in one city, or village, or island field? What may be the results, in the aggregate, of the consecrated effort of all our workers, of all our people generally, through the length and breadth of the earth?

"Not by might, nor by power," not by the amount of work, but by the quality of effort, is the work to make advances to the uttermost parts of the earth. Let us look about us, brethren, and look close by, for the next advance move that we can make in our work. Look not for some great improvement in method, or some outstanding opportunity, but capitalize every economic expedient that suggests itself to your constantly alert minds! Set an example of faithfulness in labor before those with whom you associate. Be constantiy on the lookout as you move about, for those who may be drawn into conversation so easily in these troublous times, and then pointed to the Lord's great remedy for sin.

Judgment-Bound Souls

Let us keep ever in mind that every man and woman we meet is a judgment-bound soul for whom Christ died. and to whom our obligations are as real, as definite, and as binding as the debt we owe to any person in any other part of the world field. Shall we not let the words "Here and Now" constitute our motto for 1939, that greater, and still greater, results may crown our efforts as the days go by? This is a sure and effective means of closing up avenues that Satan would use to divert us from the great objective before us in giving the message in these last days. Many a temptation would fall unnoticed, if the men and women who make up our churches would keep actively at work in the one and all important endeavor to lead others to the Master.

But how, you may ask, can all this be accomplished? "What is that in thine hand?" said the Lord to Moses at the burning bush. Just a rod, that was all. Only a stick selected from the bushes by the wayside in the wilderness of Midian, as Moses watched the flocks of Jethro. But, lo, under the blessing of God, coupled with complete surrender of the human instrument, it was used of God for the deliverance of a whole nation—yes, deliverance from the bondage of heathen darkness

It seems to me that this experience of Moses has a most definite and striking application in these days, when we face great skepticism, false religions, and Gibraltars of heathenism. "What is that in thine hand?" Is it a book, a tract, a Bible, the ability to converse interestingly and intelligently upon the topics of the day? Is it an opportunity to invite a neighbor over to your house for a little friendly visit, which may be turned into an occasion of pointing the way to a better world, and a share in the inheritance of the saints? God has given to each one of us a gift, yea, gifts in

large measure to some of His workers. We shall be held accountable in the day of judgment for the use that we make of these talents entrusted to us, for as long as they are left in our possession!

"What is that in thine hand?" What is the gift you have, my brother, my sister, by the faithful use of which you can best represent the Master for the little span of life on earth? By prayerful consideration of our individual obligations to God, to whom we owe our hope of eternal life, let us seek to open our hearts and our lives to the full working of the Spirit of God. Let us pray that we may be used of Him in large measure for the saving of souls in the days still remaining to us on earth, in which we may labor for Him.

"Seest thou a man diligent in his business? he shall stand before kings"—and before the King!

SOUL WINNING

At the 1938 Inter-American Division Autumn Council held in Balboa, December 11-20, the following resolution was passed:

"Whereas, there are thousands of villages and towns and cities where no organized work is established and where the truth has never been preached, and

"Whereas, we are told that many fields ripe for the harvest have not been entered because of our lack of self-sacrificing helpers, therefore,

"We Recommend, 1. That we put forth a special effort to enlist in service, lay members who show ability in public evangelism and encourage them to devote as much time in lay evangelism as is consistent with earning a livelihood;

"2. That each field endeavor to work out some plan whereby institutes can be held for the training and guidance of such lay workers;

"3. That the series of lessons prepared by the General Conference be used as a basis for such institutes;

"4. That each member of the church be trained in active soul-winning service, with the definite objective of winning at least one soul to Christ each year. To accomplish this, we suggest that the church be organized into working groups:

- a. For house-to-house Bible studies.
- b. For the circulation of literature.
- c. For evangelistic work; enlisting

particularly the young people, to hold evangelistic efforts.

- d. For visiting the sick and the needy.
- e. For pastoral work to cooperate with the elder or pastor in visiting the home of every church member, several times a year, to visit those who absent themselves from the services of the church, encouraging them to faithful attendance, and to visit those who have drifted out of the church, endeavoring to win them back to the fold.

."5. That a definite objective or goal be set by our churches for the winning of new members as follows:

"One member per quarter for each church organization; and in addition, one new member per quarter for each 50 church members or major fraction thereof."

One new convert each quarter in each church and company for each 50 members or fraction thereof-is this too much to expect in these times of the special outpouring of the Spirit of God? Rather, is this not really a very small goal in view of these times? It is indeed small, but it is only our minimum goal. It means that a church of 50 members will have as its minimum goal of new souls won to the truth, two souls each quarter-one for the organization and one for the 50 membersor a minimum of eight souls won to the truth for the year. A church or company of less than 50 members will have

a goal of one soul each quarter, or four for the year. A church of 80-100 members will have as its goal three new souls won each quarter, or twelve for the year—one soul each quarter for the church and one for each 50 members or major fraction thereof. A church of 500 members will have as its goal on the above basis, eleven souls won each quarter, or 44 each year.

Of course, some of our churches are already winning more souls than this goal calls for, and they will doubtless rejoice to realize the overflow of their goals. But those churches and companies who have not had the joy of winning many souls in the past, will surely strive to reach the goal as set forth in the above resolution; that is, one soul won to the truth each quarter for the organization, and in addition one soul for each fifty members or major fraction thereof in the church or company.

As ways and means to this end, we suggest that each church leader first ascertain his goal by counting the church membership, to ascertain just how many souls will need to be won to reach the minimum amount, and then post the goal-the number of souls to be won in the church-where it will be seen by the congregation each Sabbath; then at the close of each quarter post on the goal itself the number of souls won. In recording the souls won, those converts should be counted who are won by the members of the church. Those von in public evangelistic efforts are reported by the worker in another way. A baptismal class conducted in the church will be one of the best ways to win souls and to prepare them for church membership. A baptismal class study book and a baptismal class record book will be prepared by the Division and will soon be ready for use. Of course, the worker will need to baptize those won by the lay members. Branch Sabbath schools and laymen evangelism will also accomplish much toward reaching the goal of souls. The free distribution of literature, and the sale of "El Centinela" and the sale of our books, large and small will win many souls,

Kindly ministry to the sick will open the doors to the truth and will win many. Lessons on Medical Missionary work are being prepared for use in the Division. Bible readings and cottage meetings held, and mission clasess also for those who cannot read, will gain influence for the truth.

There are many ways to win souls, and our Heavenly Father stands ready to aid any who determine in their hearts to do this work of soul winning. Let every member of every church and company in our Division just now "rally to the work and unite their efforts with that of ministers and church officers. And may the ministers and church officers set the pace and the example in this wonderful soul-winning endoavor.

The sum total of this goal for the churches amounts to approximately 6.000 souls won for the year. We have been winning on an average for the past ten years, about 3,000. Surely, with all our older members at work and with all our many hundreds of members newly come into the faith working, we can easily double for this year our average of the past. We have come to that time when we should rise and make a rush for the Kingdom. May there be no stragglers, but may we all join the final rush of soul winning that is to quickly close the work and usher in our eternal G. A. ROBERTS

LAYMEN MISSIONARY ACTIVITY

They found the family hungering to know the truth for this time. He gladly accepted every ray of light that was given. The meetings were continued for some time until there were 26 adults keeping the Sabbath. Pastor Kinzer visited them a few weeks later and more fully instructed them. Now they have a nice Sabbath school and it is expected that soon they will be baptized.

Why could not many of our churches

arrange for these little cottage meetings and start branch Sabbath schools? From every indication in the world, we will not have very much longer in which to work. May the Spirit of God impress each member of His church to do what they ought to do at this time.

DIVISION COUNCIL REPORTS

In former issues of the Messenger, reference has been made to the Council of the Division Committee which was held at Balboa, in December of 1938, and from time to time reports of the meetings have been given.

In this issue, we give extracts from the reports which were given in the meetings by the superintendents of the five Union fields in the Inter-American Division. All of these reports brought to the Council hope and inspiration, and we believe that our readers will be glad to share in the benefits which these reports bring.

Elder L. V. Finster

. (Superintendent of the Colombia-Venezuela Union Mission)

God's providences have been shown in a remarkable manner in this field. The liberal form of government is doing great things for our work. We now have the privilege of going everywhere. Our fear is that if we do not act now, it will be too late.

In Venezuela, there are more than four million people, and only six workers, almost a million people for each worker.

In Curacao, we have churches on two of the islands and work on all three. We are building a new church building there.

In the Atlantic Mission, our largest mission in the Union, Elder N. H. Kinzer has only three Bible workers, but we have 40 or 50 different churches or companies of believers.

At Barranquilla, as elsewhere in the Union field, the lay members are doing a wonderful work in raising up Sabbath school and Bible classes. We have ordered a picture projector for our lay members to use in these endeavors.

A member of the church, who was selling articles from a cart, was met by bandits on the road, who took everything but his cart. This brother was thankful that he had already paid tithe on the merchandise and praised God for this. A little further on down the road, he was met by the same robbers, who came back and returned everything to him in good condition. This was a remarkable experience in trusting God and being faithful in His requirements.

In the Upper Magdalena Mission, our work is going in a strong way, but we need workers. Bogotá is the largest city in this part of the country, and Elder W. E. Baxter has only one Bible worker to help in his efforts. There are requests for and urgent need for medical work in this city.

Our need is great for a school adequate for our needs. We need equipment, we need buildings, we need everything."

Elder C. E. Wood

(Superintendent of the Mexican Union Mission) "We have come to the time of the finishing of the work."

We sometimes wonder how this finishing work can be done, but God has told us that he will finish the work and cut it short in righteousness.

In the Tehuantepec Mission, one man raised up four branch Sabbath schools within one year. The members travel as far as 24 kilometers to attend Sabbath school. Now these four Sabbath schools have raised up three more this year.

Our mission offerings for 1937, were 19,110 pesos, and for 1938, 27,323 pesos, or a 43% increase.

Our tithe receipts for 1937, were 55,903 pesos, and for 1938, 69,500 pesos, or a 25% increase.

In 1937, there were 319 baptisms, and in 1938, there were 381 persons baptized.

Our medical work is strong in Mexico. Dr. Reynolds' hospital is doing a wonderful work there, and in one year he gave 30,000 pesos worth of free work to the poor. Dr. Ritchie has given a sixweeks nurses' training course for the lay members which has proved very helpful.

Our greatest task, or one of the greatest, is to help the Indians of Mexico. There are 44 different languages and dialects among these Indians and we are working in about 10 of these tribes.

Our publishing work is going in a strong way in Mexico. In the first nine months of 1937, we delivered 49,000 pesos worth of literature.

May God help us to be faithful to our task.

Elder C. P. Crager

(Superintendent of the Central American Union Mission)

We have seven fields or missions in our field, and the work is going forward in a wonderful and encouraging way.

Our lay members are working very hard. One man, a barber, went to Barrios and raised up a church of 52 members. The first month, he sent in \$35 tithe from these poor people. We will soon have a strong church organization in this place.

Our baptisms for nine months have been 373. The tithe for the same period was \$5200, which is a large gain for this year. Mission offerings have gone up as well as the tithe. Our Harvest Ingathering work is growing. Our members are taking hold of the work in a fine way.

The educational work is going forward in a remarkable way. There are 23 church schools in the Central American Union, but these schools need help, and we must give it to them. Our training school in Costa Rica is a wonderful influence in the Union field as well as elsewhere. We have some excellent facilities in the school, including a new electric light plant and an excellent water system. The students are doing much to give the message. We are doing excellent radio work in San José with gratifying results.

Our needs are many, but I do ask you to pray that in the next meeting, we may be able to bring you an even bigger report.

(President of the Caribbean Union Conference)
Our territory includes Trinidad, Bar-

Our terniory includes Infindad, Barbados, the Windward, Leeward, and Virgin Islands, British, Dutch and French Guiana. There are 50 islands in our Union Field, with a population of from five thousand to hundreds of thousands of people.

Our work in the Mt. Roraima Indian Mission is well known and is being ably carried on by Elder and Mrs. Carscallan. They are trying to revise and rebuild the work in this field and are meeting with remarkable success.

Special endeavors are carried on in the union field, of which the most important is the Welcome Wanderers' Movement, for the reclaiming of lost and backslidden members. Elder Gordon Oss is the sponsor of the movement. We are greatly surprised that we have already a list of over 800 people of this class in one conference of 3500 members, whom we are corresponding with and contacting in every possible way.

We have 8,036 church members at the close of the third quarter of 1938, and 134 churches. Our Sabbath school membership is 9,151.

Elder H. M. Blunden

(Superintendent of the Antillian Union Mission)

We present this report with a sense of deep gratitude to the Lord for His guiding spirit in the work of our field and in producing results.

We are able to report that 1938 will give us baptisms in the neighborhood of 1500 persons. In Jamaica alone, we will baptize approximately 725 new believers this year. One young man in Jamaica won over sixty persons in his first public effort.

Also in Jamaica, we have 101 branch Sabbath schools with 1588 members, outside the membership of our regular Sabbath schools, which now stands at 9672, or a total of 11,260.

Our publishing department is doing a large and extensive work. There are 85 colporteurs in the field who have taken orders during ten months of 1938, to the value of \$64,836.33, delivering more than \$30,000 worth of literature during this same period of time.

The total income in tithe for the twelve months ending September 30, 1938, amounts to \$70,780.98, an increase of \$3,496.14 over the corresponding previous period. Our offerings have amounted to \$30,871.42, for the same period, an increase of \$1,801.73.

Special endeavors are being carried on everywhere in our field. In a letter from B. W. Prince, he says: "You will be interested to know that we have started a strong spirit of evangelism among our lay members. I have asked the pastors to conduct a lay-preachers class. We have 33 lay preachers in these classes. It is our plan to see in a short time, 150 to 200 lay preachers proclaiming the last warning message."

THESE OBEYED

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(With this issue of the Messenger, we are starting a series of tithing experiences of our members under the heading, "These Obeyed." We solicit from any of our members their tithing experiences, and as in the case of this first article of the series, the name of the writer will not be published).—Editor.

"Some years ago the writer gave prayerful study to the matter of living a life that would please God in every respect, and in comparing his life with the commands and requirements of God, could find nothing that fulfilled any command or requirement as it should be fulfilled. Finally the life was

compared with the command of God concerning the tithe, and it seemed that here was one point at least upon which the writer had been altogether faithful, for he had paid a full tithe on his increase from the day of his conversion. However, in a careful study of the subject, the phrase "from the days of your fathers" as found in Malachi 3, came sharply to attention for consideration. Upon diligent, prayerful search, an added privilege in tithe paying was discovered, and back tithe was brought to the storehouse according to the command.

"This was not an easy task to perform, because it was done after a break in health and at a time when consequent return to the homeland was necessary, and the future looked very dark financially and otherwise. To make payment

of this tithe required all funds on hand but one English pound. The payment was made, however, and from one source and another there came to the writer uncollected accounts, gifts, favors, and other financial blessings, until in a few months about \$1.500.00 had accumulated in his possession, which was more money than he had ever before possessed in life's experience. God had indeed honored faith."

"I discovered that I owed the Lord tithe on \$600.00, and the thought came to me that is why I cannot get any work. I promised right then and there to pay my tithe. Before I got up the next day there was a man at my door to give me a job. That was three years ago, and I have never wanted for anything since."

THE PRINCIPLES OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We shall briefly note some of the fundamental principles that are to be emphasized if our schools are to retain their distinctive character and fulfill their divine purpose. If the principles governing in our schools are not distinctive, emphasizing as they should the development of character, and preparing our young people for what lies just ahead of us, then I see no valid reason for going to the expense and trouble of maintaining separate schools at all.

The highest principle to be observed is a recognition that the work of education and the work of salvation are one. "In the highest sense the work of education and the work of redemption are one."—"Education," p. 30.

"Education is a failure unless the understanding has learned to grasp the truths of divine revelation and unless the heart accepts the teachings of the gospel of Christ."—"Counsels to Teachers," p. 12.

"The first lesson in all education is to know and understand the will of God."—"Counsels to Teachers," p. 447.

If there is one thing above all others in which our parents are interested it is that of the son's or the daughter's relationship to Christ. I may write out to parents of the sucess of their children in this subject or that. I may speak of the student's popularity or how helpful he is in the social life of the school, but if I cannot assure that parent of spiritual growth, all the rest sounds

empty. I may guess wrongly, but I venture the statement that ninety per cent of the students in our schools have been sent not because they are taught mathematics or language or science any better than are taught in the public schools, but for the sake of those distinctive principles which in many young lives will mean the difference between eternal death and eternal life.

It is because of this tremendously important matter of eternal life that we cannot afford to jeopardize one principle of Christian education as given in the Bible and Spirit of prophecy.

Other priciples of almost equal importance with the moral and spiritual training we shall note briefly.

- 1. The harmonious development of the physical powers and the mental faculties. This means the equal development of the physical and the mental. The physical development includes a thorough knowledge of physiology and the laws of health. It includes also daily systematic labor and preference to mere amusement.
 - 2. A knowledge of practical duties.
- 3. The preeminent place of the Bible in our educational work:

"The Bible must be regarded as the highest and most important textbook."

—"Fundamentals of Christian Education," p. 231.

"The Bible must be made the foundation of all study."—Id., p. 451.

STUDENT COLPORTEURS

Reports have come in from some of the students who are out in the colporteur work and they are very good, and a letter from Manuel Galeano states that after spending 14 hours canvassing with Navarro and Caceres, they had 26 orders in the best binding. Ernestina and Graciela in Cucuta had 50 orders with 80 pesos down. Josefa Durán and her partner in Bucaramanga had 70 orders. A letter from Arismendi states that after working 21 hours, they had 31 orders with down payments.

A letter from Tirso states that in the first week he took orders for 212.50 pesos, and the following week when Jorge was with him, they took orders for 518.40 pesos. Jorge with López in Villavicencia, in three days, took 300 pesos in orders. Judit and Olga, the first two days, took 15 orders in keratol binding.

THE CHURCH MISSIONARY **SERVICE**

The secretaries of the Sabbath School and Home Missionary Departments of the General Conference, in joint council, submit this statement for the information of workers and church officers throughout the field, outlining the details of the proper way to close the Sabbath school and begin the weekly church missionary service.

This draft of procedure is in accord with the actions of the General Conference Committee, and we recommend that the plans herewith submitted be carefully observed by the officers of the Sabbath School and Home Missionary Departments.

Following the lesson recitation according to the regular Sabbath school program, and expense offering (if taken at this time), the Sabbath school shall be closed as follows:

Closing Song. (Congregatoin stand-

Benediction. A brief prayer, Mizpah verse, or other Scripture verse, repeated audibly in unison.

Silent Prayer. (Congregation seated.) At this time the superintendent steps aside, the missionary leader takes his place, and the silent prayer period is ended by the organist's playing the opening notes of the theme song to begin the missionary service. The missionary leader then proceeds with the missionary service in harmony with the outline provided by the General Conference Home Missionary Department.

In order to emphasize anew the Fall Council recommendation of 1931, pertaining to the cooperative basis for conducting the Sabbath school and the Church Missionary services, we quote as follows:

"That this (weekly church missionary) service not be made in any way a part of the Sabbath school program, either as to the use of time or organization, during the regular Sabbath school period, but that it commence only after the Sabbath school exercises are closed in accordance with the recommendations of the Sabbath School Department; and that the Sabbath school shall not in any way encroach on the fifteen-minute period, but that it likewise close promptly on time."

We believe that the carrying out of

these suggestions will greatly strengthen both Sabbath school and Home Missionary activities, and that the missionary endeavors of the church will be benefited through the harmonious conduct of these two important services. STEEN RASMUSSEN,
