We have more than doubled our literature ministry during the past three years. We have also the following in a letter from J. H. Cochran, manager of the Pacific Press Publishing Association: "We look upon Inter-America as the best field for literature there is any where."

Truly this is the strategic time to enter God's work of literature ministry in Inter-America. We are hopeful, praying and expecting that the above figures will change rapidly in the near future, doubling again and again till they represent this:

1000 colporteurs and lay members in one year distributed 1,000,000 dollars' worth of literature.

# COLON'S MAJOR CATASTROPHE

Gay Colon, Panama's second largest city, was rousing from its afternoon siesta on Sabbath, April 13, 1940, and was getting ready for its usual round of giddy, week-end pleasure and revelry. The sky was clear and of a glorious blue. A feeling of absolute security prevailed over the population as the city lazily basked in golden sunshine as brilliant as a tropical sun can make.

Somebody knocked over a small stove in a wooden, tenement building, at 5:20 p. m., on Sixth Street. The familiar sound of the squawking siren called the fire department to do its duty. The rest of the people knew nothing of the accident and cared less.

In a few minutes the whole house was a roaring furnace, from which a great column of blaze and smoke rolled skyward. While groups of curious onlookers formed here and there, the flames quickly spread right and left, devouring everything in their path. Appeals were rushed for help from other stations and cities. The panic-stricken population fled from the zone of the fire, carrying whatever personal belonging they could take along. Sacking and looting of preperty followed the confusion.

It was Colon's major catastrophe. The zone affected by the fire was deprived of electric lights as the night drew on. The roaring tempest, fanned by a light breeze from the sea, swept furiously toward the center of the city. The throbbing pumps of the fire engines gave rhythm to the medley of frantic cries and voices of the moving stream of bewildered humanity in the streets. Cracking noises and explosions reverberated over the city. The surging cloud of smoke was illuminated by leaping, hungry flames. As the inferno moved forward with its besom of destruction, showers of burning coals and hot sparks fell upon the building ahead that waited their turn to be devoured. Flaming timbers and red-hot sheets of zinc roofing material (pieces six and eight feet long) were caught up by the torrid breath of fiery tempest and hurled a hundred yards into the air, sailing like burning kites in the sky.

The conference office and the publishing house lay right in the path of the fire. When we saw that the fire had become a major calamity, a few of us went to the Pacific Press building and had prayer, asking God to protect this institution from the fire. We packed some of the most important documents, records, etc., for immediate removal if necessary. By telephone we requested the Inter-American Division office to call for special prayer there for us.

The conference office is located at the corner of Eleventh St., and the publishing house is at Fourteenth St. The surging cloud of smoke rolled threateningly over the press building, showering sparks and coals around us. Shortly after our prayers had gone up, the wind shifted slightly, causing the course of the fire to veer toward the other side of the city. This it did about two blocks before it reached the corner where the conference office is located. It then proceeded around, bearing again toward Fourteenth St. From our lookout on the roof of the publishing house, we could see the fire leaping toward us. It seemed at times that only the hand of God could stop it. A number of buildings were dynamited at Thirteenth St., and the debris soaked with water, in an attempt to arrest the progress of the flames. The houses between Thirteenth and Fourteenth Streets were evacuated; in order to dynamite them if necessary. Closer and closer came the fire, so that when it got a block away we could feel its intense heat at the press building. Suddenly the fire subsided at Thirteenth St., and there the work of destruction stopped-one block away. We knew that God had heard our prayers and that He had helped the firemen to cut off the path of the flames. That was after midnight.

At least twenty entire blocks of stores and residences were completely destroyed, and approximately 12,000 people were left homeless. None of our churches were in the zone of the fire, and the conference office and the publishing houses were spared with the surrounding buildings about 24 Seventhday Adventist families were left homeless, some of them destitute. While the loss to the city amounted to several millions of dollars in property, the number of lives lost was very small.

The various relief organizations of the Canal Zone and Panama, particularly the United States army, have rendered effective relief to the homeless and destitute. Our local churches and the conference have been assisting in the relief work, especially caring for our needy brethren.

We are grateful to God for His mercy, and we renew our consecration to Him for more faithful service in the future.

This sinister catastrophe will doubtless awaken many a careless mind to think on God's word, and cause them , to appreciate more and more the meaning of the message we publish in our literature. What has happened to this city is a sample of the many calamities which occur on land and sea in fulfilment of prophecy. Vast fortunes are reduced to ashes in a moment of time, and men are helpless to stay the work of destruction. Let us all draw nearer to God as we see His judgments falling upon the earth.

#### ANNUAL SESSION

The annual committee session of the Antillian Union Mission has recently closed, and perhaps a few high points from the reports presented will interest the readers of the MESSENGER.

Our territory lies close to the United States, and our office in Havana, Cuba, is only 60 miles from Key West, of Florida. The union includes the Bahamas Islands, Cuba, Haiti, the Dominican Republic, Porto Rico, and Jamaica. Five flags waft their colors in the breezes which sweep over our missions. There are two British colonies, one American colony, and three independent republics, one of which is the "Black Republic" of Haiti. Three languages are spoken—English, Spanish, and French. We have 11,200,000 people to evangelize.

We are organized into two local conferences and four missions. These islands are a hive of Seventh-day Adventist activities, for our people everywhere are busy in branch Sabbath schools, lay preaching, and other missionary endeavors.

During the year 1939, we baptized and accepted 2,214 souls into membership on profession of faith. This was 559 over the previous year, when we received 1.655 new members. It also exceeds by 457 souls the previous highest attainment in baptisms. We thank the Lord for thus blessing the labors of our evangelists, pastors and faithful members. We have set our stakes and lengthened our cords for an anticipated 2,500 souls during 1940. The year has opened very auspiciously and gives promise of a rich harvest. In one mission alone we have 40 lay preachers' evangelistic efforts being conducted at the present time.

The literature ministry has contributed its full share to these results, for during the past years nearly a million dollars worth of our truth-filled books have been scattered throughout these islands. And the time has come to reap the harvest. Our colporteurs delivered 48,000 dollars worth of subscription books during 1939. This was nearly equal to the largest attainment in the history of the colporteur ministry in the union, and the leadership of this department is determined to establish an all-time record in 1940. One of the greatest factors in our activities is the branch Sabbath schools. We have 397 of them, with a membership of 5,171. These members are all potential Seventh-day Adventists, and afford a fertile field for seed sowing.

The greatest undertaking before us in 1940 is the removal of the union's Spanish Training School. There is much money to find and many obstacles to overcome, but a good beginning has been made. We have the money for

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the purchase of a fine farm, and so are greatly encouraged to move forward by faith. We are confident of final success, and so are laying our plans to proceed as if money for buildings were in hand. "The God of heaven, He will prosper us; therefore we His servants will arise and build." Neh. 2:20.

Our union committee meeting was a good one. We were greatly assisted by Brethren Roberts and Raley from the division. The Spirit of the Lord came very near to us on many occasions, and our leaders have returned to their respective fields filled with courage, for they "have strengthened their hands for this good work." Neh. 2:18.

# CARIBBEAN UNION CONFERENCE

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#### THE LORD WILL PROVIDE

Last August, we interviewed the judge of Barbados in an effort to obtain a piece of land upon which to build a church. The judge owned this land, but refused to sell it to us. We believed, however, that all things are possible with God, and that He would in His providence overrule. After a period of about three months, one of our sisters, who is a relative of the judge, went to him about the matter, and made him to understand that the earth is the Lord's, and that he was only a caretaker of the Lord's property. She further told him that his life was in God's hand, and asked if he were not afraid to refuse Him the land for His worship.

A week or so later, the judge sent a message to me to come and see him. I did so, and together we went to see the property. Well, I am happy to state that we are now in possession of the property. He not only let us have it, but sold it at a quarter of its market value.

We were also in need of a suitable place where we might erect a tabernacle for the purpose of holding meetings, so again I approached him for

the spot and succeeded in getting it. The tabernacle is now erected, and meetings were begun in January. Securing these two pieces of property from this gentleman is nothing short of the mighty power of God for the success of His work in Barbados.

The work here is moving onward. Late last year, our little church building at Hillaby was dedicated to the worship of God. The following night a series of meetings was started, and within a week it was manifest that the building was inadequate to hold all those who were anxious to hear the message. I have never seen before such an interest in my experience. Many have embraced the message, and 41 precious souls were baptized on December 31, and still many more are to be baptized. They are coming all the time.

Among those in the picture, there is a young woman who, because of her faithfulness, has won her mother and some of the former associates of the church from which she came. She has been threatened with death by her hus-



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### COLPORTEUR MISSIONARIES

Recently, for the first time in the history of our work, we have sent colporteurs into Petén, the great jungle country in the northern part of Guatemala, next to the Mexican frontier. It is a sparsely settled section where much chicle is produced and where there are extensive ruins of the old Mayan civilization, some of which are being excavated. It is a great level plain with many rivers and is very malarious. However, despite the fact that is a jungle country, water is almost unobtainable during the dry season, except near the rivers. There are many wild boar (jabalí and coche del monte) snakes, wildcats, alligators, birds and fish.

About five years ago, Brother Alfredo Lutz and I traveled by foot through the country, coming out by way of Belize. We found it a very difficult and dangerous country in which to travel, due to large distances where there are no inhabitants. This made it necessary to sleep in the open. Wild animals, snakes, mosquitos, flies, alligators, tropical sickness, the lack of water, the absence of roads, and the lack of a market, have driven out most of the inhabitants. At present all freight is taken out by airplane or pack animals. ÷., In the latter part of February, Brethren Feliciano Barrientos and Gerardo Barrera, colporteurs of several years' experience and strong in body and spi-

rit, started on a journey of several weeks into that section, with a mule laden with books and their beds on their backs. Financially the trip will not pay the expenses, but it is a part of our field which we must reach with the gospel before the work is finished. We ask the prayers of our brethren for our two valiant colporteurs in this jungle trip.

Brother Sherman writes that the last night that he was there, a man who is not an Adventist was sitting in the back part of the room. When he said good-by to Elder Sherman, he said, "Your arrival in this town has completely changed the atmosphere of the place and the condition of the people."

#### Fruits of Medical Missionary Work

While there, Elder Sherman announced that he would pull teeth free for those who desired to come. Some 200 teeth were extracted. When the people saw that he was there to help them in every way, their sentiments concerning our work were quickly changed. After helping them physically, they were willing to listen to his teaching. We are convinced that the medical missionary work, as stated by Sister White, is the right arm of the message in opening many doors. We believe that our workers would find quicker access to the hearts of the people if they would follow out the instruction of doing really practical missionary work. When Brother Sherman left the brethren, many arose early in the morning and accompanied him a long distance along the way.

He made this announcement without authorization. and his friend knew nothing about it. When he arose from the table he was surprised to see people coming from every direction. They continued to come until 60 were assembled. He silently prayed to the Lord and said. "Lord, I have never spoken before such a large group as this." However, the Lord gave him courage and he began to speak, and the Holy Spirit enabled him to present the message with power. As the result of this meeting, 25 souls were converted, and this company is now calling for a worker.

# Another Worker Fallen

#### Scattering Seeds of Truth

It is not always, in this day of hustle and rush, that one can pause long enough to make a satisfactory verbal answer to certain inquiries. nor is it often practical to hold a Bible study on a busy street, in a crowded store, or at work on a farm. However, under all such circum-stances, it is easy to scatter seeds of truth if one has at hand a package of tracts from which to draw a timely message.

Somebody placed tracts on a steamer, which resulted in the opening of our work in the island fields-a work which has made great progress in those regions. A tract dropped in a street, caught the eye of a passer-by and re-sulted in a person being won to the truth, whose years have been spent blessing others, especially the children. Persistently placing tracts on the seats of a street car, led to the conversion of the motorman, who in turn has won scores of others through his ministry.

Plowing a field, a farmer drew from his pocket a tract which he handed a questioner to read while he made his round. Tract after tract passed out in this way bore their silent message as the husbandman pursued his pressing duties. They had satisfying results.

At least one tract a day should be our aimsurely not an impossible or a difficult task. But if every Seventh-day Adventist in all the world would do just this, there would be more than 3,000,000 tracts fluttering out over the world each week, or nearly 156,000,000 during the year. The year just closed reveals the largest gain in sales and deliveries of any division in the world field. We have carefully studied the records in Inter-America for the last five years, and note that the sales and deliveries . in 1939 were more than double the sales in 1935.

The average number of colporteurs rose in five years from 167 to 304, almost double the number reporting in 1935. We believe the phenomenal gains produced in Inter-America can be attributed to the fact that an extensive program has been carried forward by the administration of the field to recruit and train a larger army of colporteurs. And the results of their efforts are very gratifying.

With the message due the world, and the favorable opportunities afforded us now in many lands, we should greatly increase our literature sales. It can be done if more men and women can be encouraged to enter the work.

We commend the leaders in Inter-America for their zealous efforts.
