INTER-OCEANIC MISSION HOLDS SESSION AND ACHIEVES CONFERENCE STATUS

The Inter-Oceanic Mission held a beautiful session in Puebla February 27-March 1. A survey commission had recommended conference status, which had been approved by the Mexican Union and the Inter-American Division. Velino Salazar, union president, made this a very solemn service. After an outline was given of what conference status means, the delegates voted to accept the responsibilities it brings, and a new constitution was adopted.

"The Challenge of a Shattered World" was the keynote address given by B. L. Archbold, president of the Inter-American Division. The Division secretary, J. H. Figueroa, also contributed to this historic session.

On Monday evening the 170 delegates enjoyed a colorful "Noche Mexicana" with food, music, and costumes typical of various sections of the country. In an original pageant an elderly lady (representing the old mission) bequeathed to a young girl (representing the new conference) many customs and traditions and wished the new organization success.

Nine churches were organized during the past triennium and accepted into the sisterhood of churches. Tithe and mission offerings doubled during this period and the number of colporteurs and their deliveries of Adventist literature tripled.

President Galicia gave a tremendous challenge for the next triennium; to baptize 2,500 in 1977, 3,500 in 1978, and 4,000 in 1979—a total of 10,000 new members in the next three years. They expect great things from God. Pray for them.—B. L. Archbold.



A VISIT TO PUERTO LIMON

The church for English-speaking Adventists in Puerto Limon, Costa Rica (above) is too small for the large number of members, mainly youth, who meet there. When I visited, although a separate meeting was held for children, the church was full. Most of the people are Jamaicans who have settled on the coast, and they are proud of their heritage. They were happy for my visit and even the Baptist preacher came to the Sabbath service.

There is also a growing Spanish-speaking group (pictured below with their pastor at right) who meet in the same building Sabaths at 8:15 a.m. They are enthusiastic, and are building themselves a new church.

Between Thursday and Sunday I preached eight times, and many responded to the appeal for surrender to Christ. We thank God for the faithfulness of those who accepted the message in the early days in Puerto Limon, and for their descendants who are holding the banner of truth.—M. G. Nembhard.
