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RETRENCHMENT

There is not a Christian in the world but that is the fruit of Christ's death. And he gave himself, not only for those now united with him, but for all human beings.

There are schools and meetinghouses to be built, and sanitariums to be established. There are new fields to be entered, and we must have your help. Shall we ignore the commission given us, and thus forfeit the promise accompanying the commission? Shall the people of God become careless and indifferent, and refuse to lay by of their means for the advancement of his work? Can they do this without severing their connection with him? They may think thus to economize, but it is a fearful economy that places them where they are separated from Christ.

Let God's people pay a faithful tithe, and let them also, from parents to children, lay aside for the Lord the money that is so often spent for self-gratification. Practice self-denial in the home, and then, when calls for help are made, you will have something to give.

Let those who are poor give what they can. However small the offering may be, the Lord will recognize the self-sacrifice, and will bless the MRS. E. G. WHITE.

BOGGSTOWN and THE ACADEMY

FRIDAY, March 24, I went to Boggstown and the Academy, to attend a board meeting. A number of matters of importance were considered which we hope will make the school more efficient the coming

The school is doing a grand work this year and God is greatly blessing the efforts of the present corps of teachers in their work. This school is destined to do a great work for the young people of Indiana. The future of the cause in this state will be moulded largely by the attitude our brethren and sisters throughout the conference sustain toward this

Shall we have our own young people in the state educated to fill important positions in the work, or must we bring in persons from other conferences to fill these positions?

We have invested about ten thousand dollars in this educational plant. This seems like a large amount to invest in a school, but when we consider what this school may mean to us, and what it may accomplish if we will lend it our hearty co-operation, it is only a faltry sum to invest in so great a work.

From this time forward, every year, this school should turn out workers for some of the many lines of missionary work. Parents, what kind of an education do you prefer your children to have? What kind of employment do you wish them to engage in? Do you wish to let the world educate them for worldly positions, and then because they cannot get a position where they can keep the Sabbath, have them give up the truth and go the world? Or will you educate them for the work of the Master, and connect them with the great message of reform that God is now carrying to the world?

These are matters of the most vital importance. Life and death are the

great issues at stake in this matter, and not simply the question of a position or avocation. At a low estimate, our brethren in Indiana represent half a million dollars. Thus far about four thousand dollars have been paid in toward erecting this educational plant to educate our boys and girls for usefulness in the cause of God. Less than one percent of our means has been placed at the disposal of those in charge of this work with which to equip a plant for the accomplishment of the most important work God has committed to our hands. God holds us responsible for the proper education of our children. And when will we awake to this great responsibility, and realize that God will call us to an account for the salvation of those whom we have been the means of bringing into this world?

We are needing the money that has been pledged on the school. And much more is needed to replace the money the conference has had to borrow to complete the buildings, and for which we are having to pay interest. Are there not those in Indiana who will come forward and assist us in this work?

Are there not those who are making wills, who should bequeath to this school a liberal donation, that it may, after they are laid at rest, be doing a work in preparing souls for service? In this way Rev. 14:13 may be fulfilled, and our works may still continue though we may be laid to rest until the indignation be overpast. I would like to hear from any who will assist us in this grand and noble work of fitting workers for the great harvest field. It is a mighty work and should receive the first and most hearty support of every Seventh-day Adventist in Indiana.

I had the privilege of meeting with the students Friday night and talking to them, and I was much pleased to see so many bright intelligent young people, and nearly if not quite all of them are desirous of preparing themselves for some line of missionary work.

My wife and little boy accompanied me on this trip, it being the first time they had ever visited the school. On the Sabbath, we were with the Boggstown church and enjoyed our meeting with them very much. The work is onward in this conference, and also in all the world. May we

all realize this, and awake to the importance of employing every moment in earnest labor for the Master.

TEXT-JOSHUA 1:1-9.

PRINCIPLES

Take for your motto, "I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me."

Take an unconquerable attitude toward God's work. "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." If you think you can, you can, particularly if you know you can. There are no deserts, no Jordans, no Alps to a man when God is going before him. Do you think for a moment the fact that man takes up self-supporting work deprives him of the power of the gospel? Did the fact that Stephen engaged in attending to the business of the church deprive him of that power? (See Acts 7:5-8.)

SUCCESS IN HARD TIMES

It does not make so much difference what is on the outside if the inside is all right. "Let not your heart be troubled." Keep the citadel strong. "The gold and silver are mine," and the Lord says, "Ask and ye shall receive."

AN EXPERIENCE

I had worked four days in a town called Sodom, and in some way the name of the town seemed to have gotten on the inside and I was obtaining no orders. Friday morning I went to a little brook in a secluded spot and there on my face before God I took the orders for the day. After that I went back to town, worked all day and obtained an order in every house but one. During that hour I succeeded in getting Sodom on the outside.

canvass, 250 copies; second, \$50; third, 500; fourth, 600; fifth, 850; sixth, 1000. And yet after the sixth canvass, agents said the field was no longer good. By what process of reasoning do you suppose they arrived at that conclusion?

PREJUDICE WILL NOT HINDER

Don't believe the things people tell you that are not so. Don't believe any thing that is told you, and only about half that you see. The Bible says, "Who is so blind as my servant?" Prejudice is not to be feared. The men who have triumphed in the ages past have been men who were not afraid of all the powers of heaven or hell.

Brethren, help us in every way you can. Talk courage. Books can be sold to-day just as well as at any time in the past. Let us do it.

IT IS ENCOURAGING

We have everything to encourage us in the work of the Master in Indiana. As we look over the work that has been performed during the past six months, I suppose many have noticed that nearly every effort, whether in new fields or in our churches, has been blessed of God, and souls have been converted. This is as it should be in view of the times in which we are living and when the workers sustain a living connection with the Lord.

Briefly stating the situation, meetings held with the Ligonier church resulted in twelve or fifteen additions to the church. At Hartford City, over twenty were added to their number and the church greatly revived. North Liberty has had a refreshing and several additions to Meetings south of the church. Hartford City five miles have resulted in a Sabbath school of between forty and fifty members and a number of new Sabbath keepers and they are talking of erecting a church building. Meetings now in progress at Medaryville have resulted in a Sabbath-school of over forty members, and the prospects are good for the organization of a church in the Meetings near Wirt near future. have been the means of a new Sabbath-school being organized, with a membership of 15 or 20. A church was organized, April 22, at Martinsville with a membership of 23. The total number of Sabbath keepers there, is about forty. More of these will unite with the church soon. The church at Olivet Chapel has had a revival and several additions, besides a number of other churches have had meetings and from one to several have been added to their numbers.

Nor is this all. The tithe for the first four months of this year has exceeded that of the corresponding months last year, several hundred dollars. And all of this is being accomplished with several less laborers than were employed by the conference a year ago, and thus the testimony is fulfilled, that "the progress of the work does not depend upon a large number of laborers."

Thus we see the work is going: progress is being made. Let us now keep the car of truth rolling, ever gaining greater volume and velocity, until the message shall triumph gloriously. Let us never turn back to the old rut of debt-making and borrowing money to pay laborers, but pay as we go and do the business of the Lord upon business principles.

The Sanitarium at Connersville is now paying its way, and the citizens have donated between three and four thousand dollars to start this enterprise and are willing to donate more if needed. This they propose to give to our denomination if we will accept it and conduct strictly a high standard Seventh-day Adventist sanitarium.

God hath wrought wonderfully for us for which we are glad, and greatly encouraged. May God greatly bless our dear brethren and sisters of Indiana, and let us pray that this year may be a very prosperous one.

The convention closed with a consecration service, led by Elder Curtis. All felt that God had greatly blessed and strengthend us for the work He has called us to do, and each went away with the feeling that our coming together had been profitable, and an inspiration to greater effort in the service of God.
