NAME AND FACULTY

It will be remembered that at the last Conference, the matter of naming the Manual Training Academy was discussed, and that it was voted unanimously to refer the matter of naming the school to the Indiana Conference Committee.

Recently the matter of publishing the new Calendar came before a sub-committee appointed by the school board, to prepare matter for the new Calendar, and knowing the action taken by the Conference, they appealed to us for a name. After spending some time in considering a number of names, it was decided by the committee to give the school the name, "Beechwood Manual Training Academy." The beautiful grove surrounding the Academy building, is largely composed of beech trees, and we felt that no more appropriate name could be given the place than a name indicating some of its characteristic.

The government had taken from us the name "Boggstown," by changing the Post Office and placing the school on a rural route, with Fairland as the P. O. And as the name Boggstown in no sense described any feature of the surroundings,—there being no "Boggs" either by name or nature in this locality,—we felt that to retain the name would only misrepresent this ideal spot, and that it would be much better to select a pretty name to go with the name of the P. O. So we now have the pleasant combination, Beechwood Manual Training Academy, Fairland, Indiana, R. F. D. No. 1. We trust that this name and address will commend itself to all, and have a tendency to draw many pupils to this Christian school which has been established for the salvation of our children and to fit them for the work of the Master.

FACULTY

The board greatly desired to secure all the members of the faculty from

the talent among our brethren and sisters in Indiana: but, we could learn of no one whom we could secure as accountant, and that could teach book-keeping and mathematics. So we secured the services of H. F. Benson from the Mt. Vernon, Ohio, Academy to fill this position, and he comes highly recommended.

We have secured as Preceptress and teacher, Sister Nettie Dunn who has demonstrated in her school work in the state, much ability. Sister Lizzie Bailey who has done acceptable work as a church school teacher has been secured as Matron of the institution. So, at present, the faculty for the coming year stands as follows: Prof. B. F. Machlan, H. F. Benson, Mrs. W. D. Curtis, Miss Nettie Dunn, Miss Lizzie Bailey, Mrs. B. F. Machlan, Mrs. Dr. Strickler.

We congratulate ourselves on having an excellent faculty, and the school the coming year bids fair to be the most successful of any year of its existence. The attendance should be greatly increased, and we believe it will be.

PAY YOUR TITHE HONESTLY

IN Elder Covert's article in the *Wisconsin Reporter* of April 26, appears the following statement: "As to the tithe, the State secretary's books show that not more than one-half of our church-members are paying anything into the church treasuries." He further adds that this condition is about the same among our people throughout the whole United States. This is a serious condition. Are we "who keep the commandments of God, and the faith of Jesus," fast losing our hold on God? Brethren and sisters, you are well posted in the word of God, and know about the great blessings that are promised to those who cheerfully pay an honest tithe into the treasury of the Lord's cause. What right have you to hold back this ten per cent from the Lord? It belongs to God and you know it. If this course continues it will sever us from God, and he will take his message away from us.

Let our ministers sound a warning note, clear and convincing, to our people everywhere. The situation is grave indeed. If we stop the flow of tithe coming through the legitimate channels, how long will it be before

we are discarded as messengers of God? Remember that the greatest danger lies in the contagious nature of this robbery. One member pays a small amount of tithe, and the other members of the same church know full well that his income warrants a far larger tithe. What is the outcome? The outcome will be that Lucifer will be on hand and whisper to some of the other brethren: "Why, you pay too much; Brother So-and-So has a larger income by far, and he pays a great deal less than you do. You are foolish."

Brethren and sisters, wherever you are, take heed! *You can not deceive the Lord.* Do not make the plea that you send your money direct to the place where it is needed. The Lord tells you to put the tithe into his treasure house, where it will be distributed by the conference officers, and they alone are responsible for that function. Our God is a God of order as well as a God of love. Order is heaven's first law. Therefore his people should use orderly methods. Keep an account of all your income, and then you can tell at a glance how much belongs to the Lord and how much rightfully belongs to you. Do not trust your memory. It is far better to keep a memorandum book.

Remember the great issues before us! Let no one who understands the tremendous responsibility resting upon us shirk from his duty now. Not all of us can preach to advantage, but *all* can be obedient and work in the sphere where they are placed. Again let me say, pay an honest tithe, and remember that it is sacred, and belongs to Jehovah, and to him alone.
