There is no work like soul winning work. The following will prove this statement. A young man that I had worked for, and by the help of the Lord brought into the truth, was being persecuted bitterly by his father. This father had been an elementary school teacher for over thirty years, and also a catechist for the church of England for a number of years, but is now retired from teaching. The son, realizing that he could not influence his father, asked me to go and see what could be done fro him.

This gentleman lives about two miles from the main road by a clayey beaten path over the hills and across a running stream. I had some difficulty in reaching his home. It was Sunday morning, just eleven o'clock that I reached there. The rain was so heavy the day before that he could not cross the mud to go to church. Upon my arrival he was sitting in an easy chair with a book in his hand. After greeting him and telling my name I asked him to excuse my appearance, as my collar was off, my sleeves up, and my pants were in my socks. I said, "You see the mud was such that you know I could not have gotten here otherwise." He said it seemed to him that I was a soldier: and in the true sense of the word I am.

After a brief rest he began to ask me how I was getting on with my church. After I replied, he said, "I see that my son has become a member of your church, and I regret it very much." I asked him why he thought so. He said that the Sabbath by longed to the Jews, and as a Christian he had nothing to do with it; hence his son was cnly a trouble in the home.

I said, "True, sir, it was at one time given to the Jews, but in the beginning it was given to the father of the human race, before sin entered the world; hence it was the purpose of God that the Sabbath should be observed by the sons and daughters of Adam to the end of the world and even in the new earth."

He said, "That may be so," and gave his reasons for Sunday keeping, saying that he was perfectly satisfied in his mind that Sunday was the day for Christians to keep and that he wanted me to understand there was nothing that I could say that would cause him to change his opinion. From eleven to one o'clock he had all the say, but now and then I would bring in some point of truth, trying all the time to get him to sell himself by his own argument; but to my surprise he was a diplomat in that respect.

I then asked the privilege fo presenting to him a study on the reasons why I and others are Seventh-day Adventists, inasmuch as I had taken the trouble of coming to his home. He agreed to my suggestion. I then told him that the attempted change of the Sabbath to Sunday was a fact of divine prediction, that the devil through the government of earth would endeavour to get the whole world to disobey God by keeping another day than the one He had given; hence what Seventh-day Adventists were proclaiming to the world was no new theory, but just what the Lord said would come to pass in the last days.

He was somewhat startled and asked where such things could be found in the Bible. I had a chart with me with all the beasts of Daniel on it, and by his permission hung it up. From then until half past five I had his attention. It was one o'clock when I started. At the end of that time I arose, bade him and his wife good-bye, and thanked them for their kindness in allowing me to take so much of their time. I was sure that I had convinced them both, but could not ask him, in view of what he said at the start.

The next Sabbath he sent me a letter by his son, saying that he must confess to me that by the many Scripture quotations and logical arguments that had been brought to his attention he was perfectly convinced that the seventh day is the day for religious worship not the first.

Therefore upon hearing that, I went to bim on the following Sunday and got both of them to decide on coming out without delay. I am glad to say that he, his wife, and his daughter have been out to church for the past two Sabbaths; and in a letter that he has written to me again he says that he feels so happy in the truth that he wants to do all in his power to spread it far and wide, and in doing so it is his purpose to leave no stone unturned in spreading the advent message.

I would ask the readers of the VISITOR to remember these people in their prayers. There is no work like soul winning.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

"WHERE IS THY FLOCK."

"Where is thy flock that was given thee, thy beautiful flock. What wilt thou say when He shall visit thee?"

"While we should put forth earnest effort for the masses of the people around us, and push the work into foreign fields, no amount of labour in this line can excuse us for neglecting the education of our children and youth. They are to be trained to become workers of God. Both parents and teachers by precept and example are so to instil the principles of truth and honesty into the minds and hearts of the young, that they will become men and women who are as true as steel to God and His cause."— Counsels to Teachers, p. 165.

In the last days we are told that iniquity shall abound, and that the world will have no regard for the law of God. More and more are we brought in contact with such conditions. More and more our children are brought in contact with these evil influences; and as by beholding we become changed, to allow our children to come under such influences—their little hearts being so easily impressed—is to sow for a harvest that will be reaped in tears.

To train our children to become workers for God, to instil into their hearts the principles of truth and honesty, we must place them under the instruction of Christian teachers. We must have schools that will be under the supervision of the church.

"Our Church schools are ordained of God to prepare the children for this great work. Here they are to be instructed in the special truths for this time and in practical missionary work. Wherever there are a few Sabbath-keepers the parents should unite in providing a place for a day school where their children and youth can be instructed. They should employ a Christian teacher who, as a consecrated missionary, shall educate the children in such a way as to lead them to become missionaries." — Counsels to Teachers, page 174.

My brethren, if we ever expect to see our children saved in God's kingdom, we should think fast and act quickly. Schools should be established in every church. We need teachers, young men and women who can be trusted; who are sound in the truth; who have tact and patience; those who walk with God and abstain from the very appearance of evil. If we work and pray to this end we shall surely succeed for it is God's plan and according to His will.

At great cost we have built up a training school at Mandeville to qualify young men and women for this very work. Are there not young people of talent who will put forth an effort even at a sacrifice to prepare themselves to do this nice work of educating and moulding the minds of the child-ren?

Inexperienced teachers will not do. We must have teachers who are submissive to God, who love the children and will prepare themselves for a place in this part of the Lord's vineyard.

We must have the right kind of teachers before we can have the right kind of schools. We must have the right kind of schools in order that our children may have a part in this closing work. Then how happy we shall be when the Master comes and we can say, "Here is thy flock, thy beautiful flock."

"The boy must go to school at all sacrifice. I have lost one, presumably by not sending him to school in time that he might get a vision of life's responsibilities. Please send application blank, I want him to be at school this month."

The above extract from a letter recently received from a God-fearing father in Jamaica alludes to some vital truths, to which some other fathers and mothers should not be blind.

I well remember the experience with reference to the older son. He had grown up in "the nurture and fear of the Lord." He had arrived at that age when young men begin to look about to find out what they can do for themselves. His attention was directed to the West Indian Training College. The father was contemplating making the necessary sacrifice, but he procrastinated, hoping to find some way to educate his son without having to make any sacrifice. One term passed and then another and still another, until the son's mind was directed elsewhere and the final outcome of the matter is stated in that one heart-rending word LOST.

"Lo, children are an heritage of the Lord," Ps. 127: 3. "Where is the flock that was given thee, thy beautiful flock?" Jere. 13: 20. Some day all of us who are parents will have to stand before the Great White Throne and answer this question. What shall the answer be? Will it be, "Behold I and the children which God hath given me." Heb. 2: 13; or I was busy here and there and my son, my daughter escaped?

Surely one of the greatest joys we can anticipate over on the other side is the joy of having our children with us there. But the world is bidding high for their souls. It is offering riches, ease, luxury, popularity. Due to their inexperience scores -* sons and daughters of Israel are accepting the offers of the world and are turning their backs on their fathers' God. A conservative estimate states that 95 per cent. of the young people who finish a course of study in a Seventh-day Adventist school, get their feet firmly fixed on the Rock of Ages. The West Indian Training College, therefore, is a life saving station. The Lord in His goodness has planted it here especially that the fathers and mothers in Jamaica might have its help in saving their boys and girls from the world. Shame on that parent who is unwilling to sacrifice that his children may secure the benefits of a Christian education.

Is it much of a sacrifice after all? To some it is, but to others it is no sacrifice at all. The fees are only 12/- to 15/- per week. It must cost a good portion of that amount to keep the young people at home. Then where does the sacrifice come in? At all events it is better to sacrifice than to suffer the remorse of the father mentioned at the beginning of this article.

INVESTMENT FUND.

I am thankful to the Lord for this, but I know many are deprived of the blessings because they have failed to enter into this plan.

One little experience I wish to relate will show you how God is just waiting to pour out His blessings on His faithful people.

This incident was told by an experienced canvasser who was also a student of the W.I.T. College, Mandeville. The following is his story,—

"Some weeks ago when the Investment Plan was put before the Mandeville Sabbath-school, I thought of some old debts that are due me in the canvassing field,—people to whom I had written several times, and

sometimes in very strong language, urging them to pay up the debts; but all to no avail. So I promised the Lord that I would write those people once again, and if He would let them pay up those debts, I would give Him one half. But after making the promise my faith failed and not until two weeks ago aid I pick up the courage to write, and last week the man who owed me the most sent in his 45/, and another whose debt is the oldest, sent in 24/. The latter sent to say he was on his sick bed and could not write, nevertheless he was con-strained to send the money. So last Sabbath I had £1 14/6d for Investment Fund. This is an evidence to me of the way Christ works for us on the hearts of the people when we let Him, and how faithful He is in fulfilling His promises.'

Others to whom this responsibility has been intrusted have proven so unfaithful that today they are This separated from the church entirely. makes a sad state of affairs in the church, and we believe that many of our faithful brethren and sisters are doing their utmost to clear up these things in their respective churches. We do appreciate this with all our hearts, and we know that the Lord will bless them in their endeavour. This is the Lord's work, and little do we realize how such conditions hinder in the important work of circulating our literature as the leaves of autumn. So we are requesting that each church and colporteur who is now behind with the office to begin to lay plans for clearing up their respective accounts before the end of the present year.

We will have a large shipment of mottoes that will come in about the middle of November, or perhaps before, which will sell very rapidly during the holiday season. This will be an excellent opportunity for each member in the church to do something to assist in relieving the church of debt. We are glad to say that some are making personal donations on these old accounts, and they are thus being reduced rapidly. Port Antonio Church is one that is working on this plan, and we do appreciate such a willing spirit as that, and the Lord will bless such richly.

We stand ready to assist in every way we can in this good work, and shall be glad to hear from each one at an early date as to their plans for the immediate future.
