## CO-OPERATION WITH CHRIST IN EDUCATION.

"Christ is the 'Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world.' As through Christ every human being has life, so also through Him every soul receives some ray of divine light. Not only intellectual but spiritual power, a perception of light, a desire for goodness, exists in every heart. But against these principles there is struggling an antagonistic power. The result of the eating of the tree of knowledge of good and evil is manifest in every man's experience. There is in his nature a bent to evil, a force which, unaided, he cannot resist. To withstand this force, to attain that ideal which in his inmost soul he accepts as alone worthy, he can find help in but one power. That power is Christ. Co-operation with that power is man's greatest need. In all educational effort should not this co-operation be the highest aim?

"The true teacher is not satisfied with second-rate work. He is not satisfied with directing his students to a standard lower than the highest which it is possible for them to attain. He cannot be content with imparting to them only technical knowledge, with making them clever accountants, skilful artisans, successful tradesmen. It is his ambition to inspire them with principles of truth, obedience, honour, integrity, and purity,—principles that will make them a positive force for the stability and uplifting of society. He desires them, above all else, to learn life's great lesson of unselfish service.

"These principles become a living power to shape the character, through the acquaintance of the soul with Christ; through an acceptance of His wisdom as the guide, His power as the strength, of heart and life. This union formed, the student has found the Source of wisdom. He has within his reach the power to realize in himself his noblest ideals. The opportunities of the highest education for life in this world are his. And in the training here gained, he is entering upon a course which embraces eternity.

"In the highest sense the work of education and the work of redemption are one; for in education, as in redemption, 'other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ.' 'It was the good pleasure of the Father that in Him should all fullness dwell.

"Under changed conditions, true education is still conformed to the Creator's plan, the plan of the Eden school. Adam and Eve received instruction through direct communion with God; we behold 'the light of the knowledge of His glory' in the face of Christ.

"The great principles of education are unchanged. They stand fast forever and ever; for they are the principles of the character of God. To aid the student in comprehending these principles, and in entering into that relation with Christ which will make them a controlling power in the life, should be the teacher's first effort and his constant aim. The teacher who accepts this aim is in truth a co-worker with Christ, a labourer together with God."

- A. They are "Denominational History," written to aid us in understanding "the lovingkindness" of the Lord. See Psalm 107: 43.
- 14. Q. What enabled Stephen to make his wonderful defence?
- A. Acts chapter 2. His knowledge of how God had led His people.
- 15. Q. What reason does the apostle John give for relating the experiences he had with Jesus?

#### TO THINK ABOUT AND TRY OUT

One Scripture used to puzzle me in my youth, and I concluded that it must be figurative rather than real. But I later changed my mind. It is Col. 1:23, written by Paul in A. D. 64. It was difficult to know how the gospel was preached to every creature under heaven between the death of Christ and that date.

Maturer consideration, however, has shown the possibility in several ways and by several methods. One of these methods is that of each convert making another convert each year. To prove this, we will leave out the "3,000," "5,000," "multitude," "great company of priests," and the Samaritans that believed Philip, and begin with those 500 disciples who Paul says saw Jesus after His resurrection. I Cor. 15:6. Thus: A. D. 31, 500; 32, 1,000; 33, 2,000; 34, 4,000; 35, 8,000; 36, 16,000; 37, 32,000; 38, 64,000; 39, 128,000; 40, 256,000; 45, 8,192,000; 50, 262,344,000; 52, 1,049,376,000.

This allows twelve years to make up for the Tekoites and what is sometimes called, non-working members, and it demonstrates the possibility of Paul's claim on the win one plan.

### NOW, ABOUT JAMAICA.

Our church-membership reported last quarter was 3,977. We will now call it 4,000. If we would adopt the win one plan and keep it going each year, how long would it take to win every man woman and child for the Kingdom of God? December 31, 1932 we would have 8,000 members; 1933, 16,000; 1934, 32,000; 1935, 64,000; 1936, 128,000; 1937, 256,000; 1938, 512,000; 1939, 1,024,000.

Thus, in less than seven years the win one plan will have won Jamaica. Is it too much to ask that one who really loves Jesus will bring just ONE to Him each year? Let us not be weary in well doing, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not. Begin this year.

It is worth the effort.

#### A BOOK A MONTH

A sister in one of our churches received a letter from her Book and Bible House secretary with reference to having some one in her church attempt a little work each month in the selling of our books. No one volunteering, she concluded to do it herself. In the few hours given each month to visiting in her vicinity, she "secured orders for twenty-seven books, held two Bible readings, allayed prejudice in several instances, and has a number of homes open for more literature." Such neighborhood work is certain to bring definite results. The Lord is calling for more of it on the part of His people every. where. And there are so many ways in which it can be done. Open doors and doors that would open with a little gentle pressure beckon to us from every side.

Many thousands to-day are going forth with "literature in their hands" to help enlighten the people. Are you planning to attempt more along this line? A book a month is the suggestion to all. Surely with a little more planning in our home life, we could arrange to sell at least a book a month. Oh, that more of our people had a realization of the times in which we are living, and of the work to be done in house-to-house labor! There are many, many who know not the truth. They need to hear the call. The sorrowing are to be cheered; the weak strengthened; the mourners comforted; the poor are to have the gospel preached to them; the truth is to go as a lamp that burneth. Time is short; the enemy will make every effort to magnify in our minds matters of lesser consequence, and lead us to regard lightly the very work that needs mostly to be done.

We earnestly suggest that you write to your Book and Bible House secretary for particulars regarding suitable books for neighborhood work, price lists and other information. Please do not put it off, for "a book a month" may change many lives. The book-a-month plan also means a a little profit to you for the time you spend at it.—Western Canadian Tidings.

### CHRISTIAN CHARACTER

A Message from Pastor Lin Rashford. What a difference there is between Character and Reputation! The one we must make for ourselves, the other is given to us by others. No one can really injure our character, while our reputation may be completely ruined by some enemy or even some one who poses as our friend. God's people are to build character, and reputation will take care of itself. Some may strive to take care of their reputation, while at the same time live in such a way as to produce an unchristlike character, bringing reproach on the Cause they profess to love, and vexing the spirit of those who uphold the truth and lift its banner aloft.

Smoking destroys both character and reputation in one who would be proud to be called a Christian. Is it true that we have a few members who still indulge the poisonous weed? Of course, the church may not know of it, but God knows; and it is certain these will not long continue to walk with the people of God. The smoking habit has grown to an alarming extent in some quarters of this Island. It would indeed be far easier to count those who do not smoke than to number those who do, for the non-smokers are fewest. What a hindrance it is to some who desire to be Christians while desiring to continue the filthy habit! They are creating for themselves a reputation for smoking instead of building up a holy character.

If someone in our churches indulges in the noxious habit, he is unfitting himself to pray, except it be to ask God for forgiveness and relief from the terrible habit. But if you desire God's help you must quit using the weed. None will go to heaven because of being at this time associated with God's people. All must be clean who bear the vessels of the Lord. "Touch not the unclean thing," saith the Lord. Ye are the temple of the living God. and if any man defile this temple, "Him shall God destroy." How dreadful it will be for a professed believer to hear His words: "Depart from Me ye workers of iniquity." Do you have a reputation for smoking, or are you making a Christian character?

If Pastor Rashford's article is meant to indicate that some of our members are known to be cherishing and practising this sin, then we think the church should clean up the camp. The use of tobacco or intoxicating liquor or both is a test of fellowship, and the Lord will never bless a church which permits such a habit to be among its members. Faithful, steady, and kind endeavours should be made to induce such persons to surrender the habit right away. If such endeavours fail, then the church should follow the Lord's instructions, and they should be kindly but firmly separated from our fellowship. The Lord can never pour out

His Spirit upon His people while they knowingly allow such perverted habits to go unchecked. There is another sin too well known to need naming that should be dealt with. To let the evils live among us is to condone with them, and that makes us parfakers with the wrong-doers in God's sight. Let us give heed to the Pastor's admonition.

#### **NEWS NOTES**

Between now and the day when Jesus Christ shall come, we may expect many happenings that try our faith and sincerity. "The season of distress and anguish before us will require a faith that can endure weariness, delay, and hunger,—a faith that will not faint, though severely tried. The period of probation is granted to all to prepare for that time." Great Controversy, p. 439. old ed. Testing demonstrates strength or weakness.

The week-end, June 3-5, was a time that will live in the memory of our Morant Bay and many other friends for a long time. It was the time of the organization of our first Church in that town, in connection with which happy event there were many appropriate services. Friday night Pastor B. A. Meeker led our hearts through fertile paths of precious Christian experiences. Sabbath morning, the Sabbath School, brightened with the sunny influences of a calm and delightful climate, enlisted the earnest interest of 112 members when the records were taken, and many more who, living far away, managed to be a little late. It was difficult to tell which was accorded the best attention—the picture roll, or the lesson study, or the pennant which Mrs. Edmed assured the members is within their reach if they keep up to standard. Anyway, those new members in the warmth of their first love seemed ready to plunge into every stream of opportunity and duty, and to drink deeply at the wells of saving consecration.

After the tithes and offerings had been received, the President of the Conference addressed himself chiefly to the large class of candidates who were preparing for baptism—a class that grows and grows. At the close of the address a call was made for a standing acceptancee of the message given, and the whole audience, which had materially increased, and with evident earnestness, rose to their feet, prayer being offered for their acceptance.

Pastor Stockhausen scarcely had time to take his lunch, before he was off to give his finishing exhortations to the candidates he was to baptize the next morning and later. Then Pastor Meeker laid before them the Missionary plans and responsibilities. Twenty-three persons took the Standard of Attainment, and Brother Williams was appointed to take charge of this class. There was also a good response in other lines, and the Vesper Bells rang in hearts that had spent a day in rich feasting, and yet, a day of heart-rest.

Sunday morning the roads from all directions were unusually busy. Long before daylight, motor cars, busses, and pedestrians disturbed the tranquility of the early hours. They came from Kingston, Port Aotonio, Hectors River, Seaforth, Trinityville, Bath, Port Morant, and the mountain fatnesses whose gentle slopes made the descent to the bay easy. And down by the magnificent Johnston Bridge which covers the mouth of the Morant River there gathered hundreds of believers and their friends, and spectators from the town, to witness the baptism of 33 converts into the Body of the Great Advent movement.

Pastor Meeker gave a very appropriate address, and with inexpressible joy, Pastor Stockhausen led his converts into the watery grave. This makes the second baptismal service of the effort, and brought the number of members to 44.

At 10 o'clock, the company gathered again at the Tabernacle where the organization of the Morant Bay Seventh-day Adventist church was effected. On the platform, besides the President of the Conference, and Pastor Stockhausen, were Pastor F. McWilliam, H. M. Secretary the of Antillian Union, Bro. Everest, Manager, Pacific Press Ltd., Cristobal, Colon, and Prof. F.O. Rathbun, B. Sc., of Mandeville College. Fifty members were enrolled, our veteran Sister Milne's name being first.

The service was a solemn occasion, and at its conclusion, after the official brethren had extended the right hand of fellowship, the members greeted each other with many tears and good wishes. Officers were then appointed to carry on the work of the church until the end of the September quarter.

Thus a new sister is presented to the Jamaica Conference. Her birth has been a healthy achievement of grace, and we are pleased to report that since March 12, when the effort was commenced, the following financial statement has been developed: Tithes paid, £18. 10. 7. S. S. offerings, £5. 11. 7. Gifts to Missions,  $4/3\frac{1}{2}$ . Collections in the Tabernacle, £9. 14. 0. Total, £34. 0.  $7\frac{1}{2}$ . Besides these gifts, the expense of the Picture Roll and other S. S. equipment and other items have been paid for. There is a larger class of candidates—some having given their names in that very day.

We pray the Lord to bless and prosper the new child, that it may grow in grace, and in favour with God and man.

Now the company at Dias is reported by Brother A. Haig as being very busy carrying stones for their new temple. New members are being enrolled, and the work still bears a healthy aspect. Several

of the best members of the Christian social circles have recently taken hold and are preparing for baptism.

A further word from Bro. Haig adds, "Our second baptism came off beautifully. Among the candidates were some of the most honoured and respected of the leading churches around here. The district is on fire. A friend of the Cause has donated cut stone valued at £20 or more. He is no tamember. We have gone over two thirds of our Big Week goal.

Yesterday was one of our field days. I led the van and in a couple of hours the Lord sold thirteen books for me. All I did was to hand them out like hot cakes to ministers, doctors, merchants, and the Hon. Member for Hanover also."

Writing from Bogota, May 8, Pastor E. E. Andross says, "On April 5, the day before we had expected to leave Bogota, Mrs. Andross and I in company with our Local Missionary, Brother Westphal, were visiting some of our believers in this city. We had just left the shoe store of one of our deacons of the church and were walking along on the side walk, when, without warning, a street car passed very rapidly from behind, striking me and throwing me violently to the concrete walk. At this point the street was very narrow and the body of the car extended out over the walk. Of this I was not aware until I was struck. When I was taken by the ambulance to the clinic, the X-ray revealed a fracture of the posterior and anterior pelvic bones on the right side....

From the first the Lord protected me from great danger of congestion of the lungs in this altitude of 8,600 feet. While for three weeks the suffering at times was quite severe, and the strain on Mrs. Andross in nursing me day and night was extremely heavy, we thank God that it is largely if not wholly passed, and we are looking forward hopefully to being able to leave for home in a little more than a week from this date. . . .

Again we thank you all—you and all the dear brethren and sisters—who have been praying for our early recovery."

Later word has come that Pastor and Mrs. Andross arrived safely at their home in Balboa, and that Pastor Andross is able, with the aid of crutches, to attend at his office. For this token of Divine favour, we offer praise to God.

Accompanied by Pastor H. Fletcher and Brother S. U. Powell, the conference President spent May 14, 15 with the Higgin Town company. On diverging

from the Main Road, we were met by a delegate with a note which reads as follows:

"It has come to our knowledge that Elder Powell has reunited with the S. D. A. Body. We wish you to know that the major portion of the Higgin Town U. S. D. A. are decided and agreed in mind to renounce, and have renounced and disconnected ourselves from Mr. Humphrey's movement, and wish to become affiliated with the S. D. A. Conference to which we originally belonged. Please therefore come over at once and organize us."

This letter was signed by Jasper Rose, as leader in behalf of the rest.

We therefore proceeded to the vicinity of the temporary tabernacle in which they were worshipping, and held a meeting with those who desired to unite with us, at the home of Brother Jasper Rose.

This meeting was continued on Sunday, the day following, and several brethren from Brittonville and St. Ann's Bay Churches were with us. These new brethren were then united by vote with the Brittonville Church, the House of worship being in close proximity. Yet, owing to the frequent rains, it was felt that it might be wise later on to erect a tabernacle on the ground we hold at Higgin Town, as a prayer house.

As we returned to Kingston, we called to visit several isolated members who had been lured into an unwilling separation from us, not having understood the true situation, and these affirmed their loyalty to our Body.

These meetings were very profitable, and we appreciate the help given by Pastor H. Fletcher, and Brother Stevens, and especially the endeavour of Brother Powell to undo the mistakes of the past.

Since this day, several others have returned to the fold, and we thank the Lord for the working of His grace which has broken down the wall of partition and united such as are of one heart, one faith, and one blessed hope. It is too late in probationary hours to allow real or imaginary grievances to sever us from our movement. It is as true to-day as it was in Paul's day, "Except ye abide in the ship ye cannot be saved."

The bond of union that exists among the sisterhood of our Jamaica Churches was enthusiastically manifested on Sunday, June 5, by the aid rendered by several of the Kingston members and others in producing a programme of a very high order. It was given in the Picture House, at

Morant Bay, for the purpose of raising funds to pay for certain improvements to the Tabernacle in which Pastor Stockhausen is holding his meetings. The heavy rains made it necessary to protect the edifice from the weather but as the Conference could not supply the funds, it was decided to shoulder the task independently.

The anthems rendered by the North Street church choir were just splendid, and the solos of Mrs. B. A. Meeker, Miss Vera Sasso, and Brother Oscar Harriott were given with characteristic power and charm. Mrs. F. O. Rathbun touchingly read the story of a drunkard with pathos that moved the tears into our eyes. Pastor B. A. Meeker and Brother Oscar Harriott gave difficult recitations with reality and force; and the two dialogues, "Modern Women," and "Old Rosie," were very creditably staged by Mrs. Connie Smith, and the Misses Carmen Smith, Hazel Burke, and Viola Hamilton; and Mrs. L. L. Hutchinson and the Misses Fanny Burke, Vera Sasso, Verna and Elise Hogg, and V. Hamilton, respectively. Nor can we pass over the stirring quartetette, in which Doctor H. Johnson and Brother H. Hunter supported Miss Vera Sasso and Miss Roach.

Pastor J. R. McWilliam gave a brief address on Temperance.

The attendance might have been better, but the hearty appreciation of the audience coupled with the profitable returns at the gate, made the occasion one of special interest.

At the conclusion, in thanking the contributors to the programme and the funds, Pastor Stockhausen specially mentioned the name of Miss Fanny Burke, through whose energies the project had reached its successful culmination.

Last Sunday we had a very interesting missionary day. Our band visited the hospital at Black River. We went from ward to ward singing some of our beautiful hymns. Both patients and nurses were glad to have us, and invited us to come again. We carried a large bundle of tracts and papers which they gladly received. We are planning to go there again soon.

All of us must by the Lord's grace join the army of the Wepressonists. There is more money in the world than there was this time last year, and the needs of the Cause of God are greater. We surely must enter upon the harvest ingathering work with a dynamic determination to make it succeed.

Talk faith and encouragement. Lift up your eyes, do not cast them down. The higher you look the wider your vision. Jamaica is not nearly as hard hit as many would imagine. In every department advance and progress have been revealed this year. We should determine to advance the Harvest Ingathering achievements. Do not measure your plans on the basis of what YOU can do. Take the Lord into count. Get close to Hlm, make Him your trust, depend on Him, and He will not fail you in your need. "He holdeth the wealth of the world in His hands." Let us just go out, and keep going out, and get our share of it.

The promotion matter and the magazines will be forwarded immediately on arrival. Church Leaders should call a meeting of the Church Board; and formulate plans for a successful campaign. Plan work for every member. Some outside choir singing, and perhaps a good programme may help to reach the goal. But personal collecting is the best plan. Pastor B. A. Meeker will collect from the Chinese. Every person in Jamaica should be invited to help the Cause of God. This can be done if the church Boards will organize their work. We need to pray much also, for "It is God that giveth thee power to get wealth."

We announce this year's Harvest Ingathering Campaign with gratitude to God for giving us this means of securing help for His great work. By faith we already grip success, and believe that the God of Israel will stand by us to help us. We realize that there will be difficulties, but our God knows no such impediments to his work. If we trust Him He will help us surmount them. May the Lord bless our endeavours.

#### GET AT IT. KEEP AT IT.

Here is a question we take pleasure in answering: "I have completed the teaching courses and am qualified to teach. How can I get a position? Please answer through the VISITOR."

Surely you are among the fortunate of earth, and we congratulate you on your achievements. In answering your question we strongly recommend you not to sit down and wait for a position to come to you. Look at this from one of England's newspapers of a recent date: "Messrs. Stockdale and Kempt recently advertised for an accountant. Before nine o'clock next morning, over 7,000 applications were received." So positions are not walking around leisurely hunting for someone that has nothing to do. Therefore start right where you are and make a position for yourself. Adopt the Lord's counsel, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, DO IT!" The verb "Findeth" indicates that you are searching, and that your opportunity in God's providence is right at your hand. Therefore seize it. If your course has not taught you this art, there is failure somewhere. The Bible plan is, "... Get wisdom; and with all thy getting get understanding." Knowing the theory of facts is not enough unless one practises what he learns. Every doctor, after passing his medical tests of the theory of medicine, must walk the hospital for a year before he becomes an independent practitioner. He does not get much return for his work in cash. He gets his profit in the returns of experience. So should a teacher or follower of other pursuits.

Do not hang on somebody else other than yourself. "Work out your own," is heaven's method. Recognize that you are somewhere in God's plan and that He works in you to fill the plan, leaving you to work out what He works in. An automobile no matter how perfectly fitted for its work is a useless machine unless it will move on. Even if it has pep, if it will not move, it is a nuisance. Mine left me in the middle of a long journey once. I tried the battery and it startled me with

its sparks. It was all alive, but the machine would not move. It is when the car moves that it achieves something. You are God's saving machine, but in idleness you are useless to Him, to yourself, and to everybody else. "Why stand ye here idle all the day!"

Never feel that you have finished. The theories of to-day, no matter how perfectly you have learned them, will assume new coats a year from this. The path of the just shines more and more unto the perfect. While you are teaching, keep on studying. If you have a diploma, move on to B. A., then to M. A., secure the B. Sc., the L. L. D., not leaving out the B. Th. Make yourself valuable and then you will be sought after. But if you rest on what you now know, you will soon be antiquated, out-of-date, on the shelf, with a big card with the words inscribed, "NOT WANTED."

Timothy gained a place in the ministry, but Paul urged him still to study. We extend to you the same counsel. Buy good study-books. Budget your hours for your occupations and pastimes, your prayers, your Bible readings etc., but include two hours daily for self-improvement, and take exams to rein you up to time. The Lord will do the rest if you hold fast to Him.

ENVY is like a sore eye-offended with anything that is light. Tradition has it that "Envy dwelt in a dark cave. It was very pale, sickly-looking, and lean; a creature with squint eyes. Its teeth were black and its tongue a fire. This hideous spectre was never happy except over the misfortunes of others. It was restless, self-tormenting, evil imagining, murderous, and always warring against God and His people." No home, no society, no church, built by Envy ever prospered, for it has the habit of the scorpion when surrounded by fire, of stinging itself to death.
