DECEMBER

Our people therefore, should have all tithes and offerings in the church treasurer's hands before that date, because on Monday, December 28, he should send his report to the local conference treasurer. The church clerks should also have their records completed and forwarded to the conference office on that same date, to give the conference treasurer and secretary opportunity to close up their books and get their report to the Union Conference office in time to complete our records for the year 1931 before we go to the Union Conference session mentioned above. This conference session will be held in Battle Creek, Michigan.

Let us do all we can to make the year 1931 just as strong as possible. It has been a good year for soul-winning. Over sixteen hundred have already been reported as joining this movement, which number ought to go above the two thousand mark by the close of the year. Let us work faithfully to gather in just as many precious souls as possible. There is yet time to win many more to Christ before December 31.

December should also be a good month for Harvest Ingathering. The great cry of the world urges

us on to more diligent activity in gathering funds to keep our missionaries in the field. Emmanuel Missionary College is planning for another field day. Shall we not follow this example everywhere, and make one more real effort to reach our goals in this very important work? Let us consider most earnestly the needs of the cause of God at this time when the world's financial crisis is threatening the work of God. Now that the candy was ready for sale what could be done about a market? The next thing we heard some of the girls were tramping from door to door in Holly and Fenton. Even the filling stations and garages were not neglected. In a machine shop in Fenton the men left their machines to be sure they would not miss their sacks. Many told the girls to "keep the change" and not infrequently they were told to come again. The result: every dormitory girl reached the student

goal and was ready with her envelope Friday evening.

In our Friday evening service Elder Taylor gave an interesting study of "True Sacrifice." The closing exercise of the service consisted of gathering in the offering. While we sang "They Brought Their Gifts to Jesus" students and teachers consecrated all to Him as each came forward and placed his envelope in the offering basket. We were glad later to be able to count out of the basket over two hundred dollars.
