Our Central American Training School

HE EYES of every member of the denomination are being turned during the first quarter of 1939, to educational work in Inter-America, and we who are connected with this work in this field feel we should do everything in our power to let our people know what the needs are where their money is going. The needs have been presented and are being presented from week to week through the Missions Quarterly, but maybe one or two experiences might be encouraging to our brethren.

Our training school is a mighty factor in developing national workers to unite with those who come out from the homeland in the finishing of the work. It has been our privilege in the last two years to ordain three young men, the product of our school, and the first national workers to be ordained in this union. Every one of our graduates is out on the firing line and making good.

Our school is also making itself felt among those not of our faith, in fact we have requests from more than we can accept of those not of the faith, who desire to send their young people to our school because of the principles of Christian education. This past year we have had two boys, sons of a prominent Jewish merchant in the city of Panama, and they have been so well pleased that we are threatened with applications from seven or eight more of the Jewish colony in that city. At a school rally given in a conference meéting in Panama a few days ago, the older young man of the two was asked to say a word, and it was marvelous to see the grasp of the

principles of Christian education that that Jewish boy has already imbibed as a result of one year in our school, and he has already talked with us the matter of baptism.

almost begged us to take her in after we had told him that we had no room. The girl had been smoking cigarettes up to the time of entering the school. She immediately became interested in the Bible class and dropped one study in order to take another Bible class. Being a fullpay student she had little work to do in domestic work, and was seen around the campus continually with one of Sister White's books under her arm, snatching every moment to read this book. Inasmuch as my daughter, who was also a student in the school, was going to one of our senior colleges in the States, she persuaded this young woman to attend also, since she had finished the American high school on the Zone. This young lady is now a student in one of our senior colleges, is a member of the baptismal class, and we have every hope will become a strong Seventh-day Adventist.

Our school is attracting the attention of the best people of the capital. Visitors are continually out there on Sunday and are imbibing the principles of Christian education. One of the leading educators in Central America, when asked to write an article for our school annual, wrote one of the finest eulogies of the spirit and principles of the school that I have ever read. Our school is fulfilling its mission in an acceptable way, and is proving to be a strong factor in making known the principles of this message to those who otherwise would not come in contact with it.

As you hear of the needs, brethren, from week to week, may God help you to give us one of the largest overflows ever received in our Sabbath schools.

Organization Necessary

Chicago Church School Saved From Destruction

THE READERS of the LAKE UNION HERALD will be interested to know that God still has His hand upon the church schools which are so precious to the children and parents of this denomination.

The pastor, teachers, and students of the South Side Church school in Chicago have a thrilling story to tell which shows that the Lord is directing the sincere work of His people. Elder H. J. Capman, pastor of this church, and Brother and Sister Richard Little, who have been teaching there for some time, have done their utmost to build up this school and to equip it so it will have a very splendid standing. Our people in the South Side Church have spared nothing to build this school to where it is a credit to our denomination. God has rebuked those who would destroy it, and the following experience shows us once more that God is in our educational work.

One night last week burglars broke into the church school building and demolished most of the equipment in the schoolrooms. They seemed to be bent upon vandalism as they jerked the electric clocks from the walls, tore the seats loose from the floor, and threw the bookcases into the middle of the room. They took all the tools, a motor, typewriter, mimeograph set and a fine microscope away with them. When the detectives arrived the next morning they discovered five different places where the burglars had attempted to set fire to the building, which is a wooden structure and

could have easily burned. A bottle containing chemicals was thrown into the furnace which blew out the lower part of the furnace but did not scatter the coals sufficiently to set the building on fire.

The next night the Brownell public school located not far from our South Side Church school was burned to the ground, with an estimated loss of \$100,000. The same night the detectives arrested three boys aged 19 to 21 who confessed to having entered our school, wrecked the rooms, / taken many valuable supplies, and set fire to the building. They also confessed to having set fire to the Brownell school, which was burned completely, leaving only the brick walls standing. Most of the equipment taken by these three young men from our school was recovered.

The South Side Church school board faces a loss of more than \$150. in damage to the desks, bookcases, electric clocks and other equipment, yet they are ready to replace these losses and are thankful to God for His evident smile of approval in saving this church school from destruction.

We sincerely ask for the prayers of our Christian people in behalf of all our church schools which are doing such an important work in training our youth. W. C. LOVELESS

A Very Busy Church

As we REVIEW the work accomplished in the city of South Bend in the year 1938, we are very grateful to our heavenly Father for all His mercies and for the blessings that attended the work of pastor and church members all the way.

From the first nearly all the members of the church were active in their support of the program of soul winning. The laymen's class of about fifteen did a large amount of work in churches and communities, holding preaching services, cottage meetings, and doing Bible work. We also had a class of Bible workers in training. These were taught by Sister Hollingsworth and all did some Bible work in the city. Sister Hollingsworth was busy all the time, and through her efforts, and the efforts of the laymen and the members of the Bible workers' class, coupled with the work of the pastor, fifty-two were added to the church by baptism, six by profession of faith, and six by letter, making a total of sixty-four for the year. Our net gain was reduced by deaths, apostasy, and letter to fortytwo, giving us a membership at the close of the year of two hundred thirty-two. Throughout the year almost all the members of the church cooperated loyally in every way. They have not only given hundreds of Bible readings, but have been very busy in their Dorcas work, and in giving relief to the needy. They have distributed many thousands of pages of literature in all parts of the city. They also reached and passed their goal in Harvest Ingathering. Special mention should be made of the help and earnest cooperation given by the young people and the children.

Now, as we turn our eyes to the future, we are sure another harvest waits to be reaped this year, and already several are keeping the Sabbath. The future for the work in the South Bend area is bright with promise.

"Spiritually Indifferent Youth" Did You Say?

"I wish we could find a way to get more of our young people to attend prayer meeting; in fact all of our meetings indeed. They seem to have so little interest in such things." So spoke one good Christian leader to me just a short time ago.

Many Christian people interested in our young people are also doing a lot of wondering with a big question mark regarding the spiritual interests of the younger generation of Seventhday Adventists. And of course we do have a problem on this very point.

Like many other churches Battle Creek Tabernacle faced this same question. This year another experiment is being tried. I will let Brother Mallernee, the M. V. leader, tell the story. He writes me as follows:

"We were much concerned about the fact that our young people did not attend prayer meeting to any extent. Not over half a dozen came out week by week. It has long been our observation that young people are rather timid in taking part in meetings of this kind when their elders are present. Taking this into consideration we organized a separate prayer meeting for young people only. This convenes each Tuesday night at the church. Four such meetings have now been held. There were about thirty at the first one and each week has seen a greater attendance until the fourth week showed an attendance of over fifty, all young people.

"The hour is divided into two periods. The first consists of two or three short prayers, a ten- or fifteenminute talk, a short testimony meeting and some good hymns. The second period is taken up by a series of studies on some theme of special interest to young people. These studies are taken largely from the Spirit of prophecy. Time is allowed for questions and discussion. These young people manifest a freedom of testimony, questions and discussion which we have never seen before."

Make note of this: the success here is based on the principle of getting next to young people, thus challenging them with personal responsibility towards their own spiritual ways of living and to the organization of the church.

Most churches may not be in a position to do what Battle Creek is doing for its young people relative to this particular feature, but the principle can be applied in many avenues of church activity with equal success to save our youth. Think it over and try it. EDWARD HEPPENSTALL

"NINETY per cent of Adventist effort is expended on the saints," Elder C. B. Haynes has stated repeatedly. This same could be said, probably of Adventist work in all North America. A Revival in the Tabernacle

Hearts were convicted by the power of the Holy Spirit, and a spirit of genuine conversion was manifest. On every side doors were thrown open to the proclamation of the truth." -"Testimonies," Vol. IX, p. 126.
