

The battle grows more intense every

Broadview Academy and Chicago Schools

DURING the past week ending October 12, I have had the opportunity of visiting the Broadview Academy as well as our other schools in the Chicago-region. Although I had been at Broadview a number of times, I was very much pleased to find Professor Olson and his faculty working hard to improve the school as fast as their funds will allow and I was also glad to find that they are working faithfully to establish and maintain high denominational standards in the school whose enrollment has now reached something over 220. I am sure our workers in the conference and parents throughout the field will be glad to cooperate with them in such an endeavor.

For a number of years we have tried to establish such classes in our schools as would be practical in giving our boys a mechanical training which is so necessary in the world today. Brother Hallock is surely meeting this need in the splendid shop course that he is teaching the boys.

The new auditorium which the conference has recently built there near the school is certainly a great help to the academy. Another improvement that means a great deal to the boys is their new bathroom which has cost the school something over \$2300. It surely was one of the items of greatest need about the school. The faculty members are all hoping that time will come when the boys can have either a new dormitory or a new addition to the one that is already there as the boys are scattered in several different buildings which makes it very hard to maintain proper standards in a school.

The new shop is certainly a splendid improvement over the old one and the output last month was the largest in the history of the plant.

Professor Olson and the Engineering Department are anxious that the next

building shall be a maintenance building which they need very badly. The farm, under the able management of Brother Johnson, certainly shows a marked improvement over past years and from all indications he has good crops, and the farm is going to show up well this year. We also appreciate the interest that Brother Johnson is taking in the boys, for he is trying to do his part in giving to them a Christian training and such a preparation as will prepare them for a part in the Lord's work.

Brother Newbold with his corps of workers is making some decided improvements in the campus. This is appreciated by everyone, as a beautiful campus is always a great asset to a school.

Surely the Lord is blessing the work of Professor Olson and his faculty and we trust that under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and the blessings of Heaven that this will be the best year that Broadview has ever experienced.

While visiting the academy, I was glad for the opportunity to visit Miss Herscher's room and find that she has a room full of youngsters in grades four to eight. If I remember correctly, there were something over thirty enrolled. Then going over to Mrs. Shull's room I found that her room was simply packed with little fellows in grades one to four, with an enrollment of thirty-six. These teachers surely are doing splendid work with the children and while they have pretty good equipment and are getting along very nicely, I hope the time will soon come when Broadview can have a nice two-room school building for the elementary grades which will be away from the campus, as it will be much better for them in every way.

The South Side school under the direction of Brother and Sister Little is getting along nicely and doing splen-

did work. Brother Little is away at the present time attending the training camp at Grand Ledge, but Sister Little, with an assistant, has been doing the best she could to carry on until he returns. I am sure the church and pupils in the school appreciate the capable direction of Brother and Sister Little and everything indicates that they are conducting a very successful school.

My next visit was to the Shiloh Academy which is conducted on the first floor of the Shiloh Church. It was quite a surprise to find that they had ninety-seven pupils enrolled from grades one to twelve. The principal, Sister Pearson, is endeavoring to conduct a good strong denominational school and I believe that the way they have their work organized along with the faithful efforts of the assisting teachers, that they have every reason to be hopeful for a successful year. They were also a bit handicapped due to the fact that Mr. Giddings is taking the Cadet Training course, but in spite of this they were getting along very successfully. Sister Thompson and Sister Lockhart certainly have their hands full with their school rooms so filled with pupils. They have everything looking neat and the work is organized so that they are able to carry on a good strong school program.

Work Established in the "Soo"

TODAY the kingdoms of the world are calling for men to join their armies. Thousands respond, ready to toil and labor and sweat and die for their governments. Today the living God calls for men to join His army and rout the enemy. The call goes into every country, every village, and every home. God is calling for men of faith—men of prayer. He is calling for men with courage and strength; men who will do or die for the truth. And from far and near the loyal servants of the Master respond.

But the forces of the enemy are also rallying. The arch-deceiver is preparing for a "blitzkreig" of enormous proportions which will sweep thousands of unsuspecting and unprepared men and women to eternal destruction. Who is to warn them of the impending danger?

The first call God sends to every man is "Come." His second injunction

is "go." First we are to *receive* but after receiving we are to *give*.

Our work in the "Soo" has only begun and the advance is slow, yet we have reason to be encouraged. Twice weekly we broadcast over the Canadian station, CJIC. Nearly a month ago we made a cash offer for a Bible text commanding Sunday sacredness. This is bringing in numerous responses which give us a mailing list.

Several weeks ago in making a sermon write-up for the newspaper I incorporated in it the offer of a free Bible course for home study, giving the address of the Home Bible Study League. A number of responses have come in from all parts of the eastern end of the Upper Peninsula. To these truth seekers we are personally delivering or mailing systematically, the loose-leaf notebook lessons which have been prepared for that service.

In these crisis days, however, it is not only the organized armies which are active, but it is now necessary that every man be a sharpshooter. England has just organized a huge army of minute men who are to be constantly on duty should the occasion demand. Should the church of God be less diligent? Should not every man and woman among us be constantly on duty?

Last fall, a year ago, several of our people here launched out in a soul-winning campaign, using a series of tracts to search out the interested ones in their territory. One of our good sisters who works six days a week took twenty-five homes in her vicinity and each Sabbath afternoon called with the tract. Of this group eleven desired the Bible studies, and five others requested more literature. Thus the seed is being sown, but ere long the reaper will overtake the plowman and the work will be finished.

We solicit your prayers in behalf of the work in the Upper Peninsula.

A Cause for Rejoicing

REACHING the conference Harvest Ingathering goal of \$18,000. on September 28 has been a cause for rejoicing throughout the Wisconsin Conference. It was a real achievement. Our workers and church members said, "It Can Be Done in Wisconsin," and in faith they went forth and did it. Nothing is impossible when the membership and working staff of a conference unitedly move toward an objective. When the objective toward which we move is found within the circle of God's will, and unyielding faith is within our hearts, victory is assured at the outset of any venture.

We wish to express gratitude to God for His unusual providences which

have been manifested throughout the campaign. A more spiritual campaign I have never before witnessed. Commendation is due Elder Kott and the district leaders and pastors for the excellent organization which characterized the Ingathering program. Special recognition is due the members of our churches whose untiring efforts made victory possible. To all of you we wish to say, "Thank you."

But while the conference goal has been reached the campaign is not over. Indications are that our people would not let us close the campaign now even if we wanted to. The reason is simply this—a few churches have not yet gone over the top and some of our people have not yet had a part in the work. And this is to be a 100 per cent year in Wisconsin—every church over and every member doing something. And so provision has been made to continue the campaign and work for a \$2,000. overflow. This too can be done in Wisconsin. It can be done because our people *want* to do it. To reach the overflow goal the following program is suggested:

1. Be sure that your church reaches its goal soon.
2. Every member having some part in the work.
3. Churches that have reached their goals continue the work until all the available territory has been worked.

Since the Ingathering campaign is a spiritual activity our work will not be finished when the overflow goal has been reached. We have made contact with thousands of people in this State. We have their names. Many have manifested a deep interest in the message. Many have been discovered who are groping for the light. These interests must be followed up. What an opportunity for a great layman's evangelistic effort! What an opportunity for cottage meetings, missionary visits, and Bible schools! Dear brethren and sisters, let us buy up the opportunities for they may not long be ours.

Let me again thank all who have had a part in the campaign and express my confidence that this great spiritual program will bring into the church hundreds of new believers.
