## **Publicity Work Progresses**

It was a great privilege to attend the meetings of conference workers held recently in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Grand Rapids, Michigan. The interest among these workers to give more publicity constantly to the work of our churches and evangelists we found very live and active.

At Milwaukee we worked out a story, featuring the Wisconsin Academy building program on the farms near Columbus, and other plans made at this meeting. Workers took copies of this for publication in their local papers when arriving home. A week later when I returned to the office here, I found from one large city pastor clippings of three stories he had had published in two newspapers. He had gained a new vision of the newspaper possibilities. The Milwaukee Journal, the leading paper there, with a circulation of over 300,000 ran a story for us about the school plans in both city and state editions of one issue. The editor handling this was most cordial, and told me that he greatly appreciates our work, is in friendly contact with Elder Carl W. Guenther, Milwaukee pastor, and will be glad to publish our church items.

There are two good papers in Grand Rapids, Michigan, the morning *Herald*, and the afternoon *Press*. Both were very liberal with space for the reporting of the workers' meeting held in our church there. The *Herald* sent reporters to two of our evening meetings. Every issue during the session carried a report of the council of workers.

Most encouraging is the way in which news conciousness is growing among our ministers and church leaders everywhere. It is good to talk with men who are getting their material published, and feeling the reaction of it in their communities. There is much very fine press work being done in Wisconsin and in Michigan. And I am sure the same interest is found in Illinois and Indiana. In fact, we have received here from our Clippings Bureau good reports taken from the Peoria, Illinois, papers of the Illinois workers' meeting held there just before the Michigan meeting.

Let us work and pray that this press work may go forward and become a mighty factor in giving people correct information about Seventh-day Adventists.

During recent months I have made personal acquaintance with the editor of The Protestant Voice, the foremost weekly of its kind in the country, published in Fort Wayne, Indiana. He occasionally publishes an article about Seventh-day Adventists, and seems to take pleasure in doing it. I met him in Cleveland, Ohio, just before the Wisconsin meeting, and again we talked about church publicity. "It is doing a great deal for your church," he said. "By many people your church is misunderstood," he added, and said some most encouraging things as to the effects he believes the type of information we are giving out is having.

This to me is something of a challenge, and I pass it on, knowing that in the Lake Union Conference our leaders are alert to use the press in giving out correct information by which people may better understand the Seventh-day Adventist church.

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#### INDIANAPOLIS SOUTH SIDE EFFORT

"ALL through the large cities God has honest souls who are interested in what is truth."—"Testimonies," Vol. IX, p. 98.

October 15, 1944, marked the opening of a very successful Sunday night evangelistic effort in the South Side church in Indianapolis.

Brother R. K. Cemer, the pastorevangelist, is assisted in the visiting and Bible work by Mrs. Floy Addis, lay Bible instructor, Miss Phyllis Williams and Miss Mary Kent, conference workers. The church members are giving their loyal support by conducting prayer bands, distributing literature, distributing Home Bible Study lessons and announcements, and by bringing friends and relatives.

From the first night, the attendance has been excellent and the offerings good. Preceding the formal opening of the service, Brother Cemer gives a short illustrated talk on the subject of heaith and many pages of lessons and recipes are included in the Home Bible Course. Special music is provided by the church choir, ladies' chorus, and also by friends from our sister church on the north side.

We now have two hundred and sixty-eight names on our calling list. The Lord has blessed us with twenty-seven souls thus far. Twenty-five were baptized by Elder S. E. Wight, and two were added on profession of

On page 533, "Take hold of the medical missionary work and it will give you access to the people. Their hearts will be touched as you minister to their necessities. As you relieve their sufferings, you will find opportunity to speak to them of the love of Jesus." Page 462, "Literature bearing on this point is the helping hand of the gospel, leading souls to search the Bible for a better understanding of the truth. The sale of our health literature will in no way hinder the sale of publications dealing with other phases of the third angel's message. All are to prepare the way for the coming of the Lord." "There will be suffering ones, plenty of them, who will need our help, largely among those who know not the truth."

The very thing *Life and Health* teaches and is endeavoring to do is what people need and are interested in. The shortage of doctors and nurses, the need for the right selection of

It is recommended that these missionary services be observed in all our churches as outlined in the monthly editions of the "Church Officers' Gazette." proper foods during this food rationing period, the knowledge of food elements and thier values, the proper combination of foods — this information comes to them in the pages of the *Life and Health*, known as the National Health Journal.

Ten years ago our pioneer health journal had a circulation of 30,000 including subscriptions and bulk; 16,000 subscriptions alone. This included both Adventists and friends not of our faith. I believe all the other colporteurs would do well to benefit by this plan as we have. We have also found it to be a wonderful *opening wedge* for placing our truth-filled literature 'in many homes where it would have been impossible otherwise."

"I worked with Life and Health for one and a half years before combining it with a book. I left it in hundreds of homes and it was greatly appreciated. This very day a number of people said, 'I'd much prefer the journal coming for five years.' Life and Health, having the highest rating and circulation, and not found on newsstands, getting it for sixty months at present-day price (guarantee against increased paper and ink costs), carrying new discoveries in medicine and science, treatments and methods, and the free personal correspondence service, really means something to the American people, I find. Then too, people will pick up a journal and read it through, perhaps in an evening. They are convenient to file and always available to refer back to. People are amazed at the cost. #### MOHAMMEDANISM AND ADVENTISTS

ON the back page of your quarterly is a statement which I hope you noticed; or do you read the back page of the quarterly?


It says, "In Africa alone, Mohammedanism, is winning a million people a year directly from heathenism." We win perhaps two or three thousand souls a year in Africa. Islam, another name for Mohammedanism has no central organization. It is divided into several antagonistic sections. They have no training schools, no hospitals, no paid priesthood; they have no mission program; and yet they win converts. "How," do you ask?

Dr. Rowland Allen in his book "The Spontaneous Expansion of the Church" gives the reasons as follows: "Islam spreads in Africa mainly through the spontaneous activity of its converts . . . converts to Islam seek teaching for themselves that they may lead their fellows. They travel sometimes from Nigeria to Cairo to learn. . . . If we allowed our converts to preach, the gospel might spread like wild fire. . . . One convert to Islam is the sure first-fruits of a great harvest. Islam advances automatically."

What a terrible shame to Christianity and to Seventh-day Adventists in particular that the Mohammedan — without a Bible, without schools to train him or his converts, with no hospitals for his sick, no preachers giving all their time to evangelizing, no missionary organization, no papers or books, no missionary goals, no General Conference to direct missions should win converts by the millions because each Mohammedan is a convert-maker. If these believers in a false prophet will win souls and add to the prestige and the growth of their church, how much more should we, with all of our advantages and with our light and truth, do?

### WORK AMONG WAR PRISONERS

A CCORDING to an Associated Press dispatch from Washington, D. C., dated January 5, 1945, there were at the beginning of the present year 361,331 prisoners of war in 425 camps in the United States. These included 307,931 Germans, 51,071 Italians, and 2,629 Japanese. The number of German prisoners has increased continually.

Among these prisoners, sent to the United States from Africa, Italy, and the "Western Front," we have found several Seventh-day Adventists. Some of these were Seventh-day Adventist ministers, and others were in the Medical Corps. Most of these brethren were anxious to contact our people in America, and were listed in the several camps as Seventh-day Adventists. They have been treated well by our Government authorities, and were informed that they need have no fear as to their religious affiliations.

The Commanding Officers and the Chaplains of the camps have been cooperative in helping to contact Adventist prisoners of war and in rendering needed help.

Our main mission work has been to encourage Adventist war prisoners by personal visits and in supplying the camps with needed reading matter. Elder L. H. Christian and others have done good work along these lines.

We are happy to state that the following of our German and Italian books have been passed by the censors and can be sent to the camps through the Commanding Officer or the Chaplain:

#### Italian

Verso la Luce Il ritorno glorioso di Gesu Guida a Gesu Meditazioni sopra il Sermone sul Monte Solo con Dio La Fortuna di Maria Speroni German Der Weg zu Christo Die Quelle der Kraft Die Hoffnung der Welt Christi Gleichniffe These books can be ordered in sets or singly, through your Book and Bible House.

It is not advisable for everyone to start sending books to the camps. This work must be done orderly as the way opens. You can, however, write your home missionary secretary that you would like to help pay for literature placed in the camps, and ask him to see that several sets of books are placed in every camp in your local conference. Your home missionary secretary, or some other authorized person, will then contact the camp officials for permission to place the books. Several hundred sets have already been placed, and many small books given away.

The same plan holds true in regard to our papers and tracts. We are not permitted to go into the camp and give away books, papers and tracts. It all has to be handled through the Commanding Officer or through the camp Chaplain. The books and papers are then placed in the reading rooms. We are already sending many clubs of the German and Italian papers, but much more can be done to place our papers in the camps. During the *Signs* campaign and on the "Home Foreign Day" Sabbath, March 4, funds should be made available for this purpose, and for giving the message at this time to those who read another language. Tell your home missionary secretary, or your Book and Bible House, that you want to pay for a certain number of German and Italian *Signs* and they will take care of the rest.

That the books and papers are much appreciated we know. One Chaplain writes: "Many thanks for your kind letter and the books. . . . Would it be too much to ask for 50 copies of this and other similar books in the German language."

From an Italian camp the following words were received: "I feel that this is an opportune time to place literature with the Italians while they are here in our midst. . . . If I had the money I would gladly buy literature for them."

Will you kindly give prayerful thought to this important work. You will find a good program for March 4 in the *Church Officers' Gazette*. This is an opportune time to give the message to those of other nationalities.

#### WORLD CONDITIONS AND THE **RECONSTRUCTION OFFERING**

NEVER before in the history of this world has the outlook been so dark. Every time the dial is turned on the radio we hear of death, destruction, sabotage, race riots, murder, and cases of immorality. Certainly the devil is walking to and fro in the earth seeking whom he may devour.

Isaiah, writing over two thousand years ago, saw our old world in its present condition. He saw that darkness would cover not a portion of the earth but the whole world. He saw that the people would be in gross darkness. Certainly this is a very vivid picture of conditions as they are today. Even men who profess no religion fear the future for they see only a dark wall before and turmoil on every side.

While the old world staggers in its drunken condition, God calls His people to action. In a world of darkness, without hope, God calls upon His people to arise and shine for their light is come. This fund is to be used for reconstruction work in countries where enemy action has destroyed many of our hospitals, schools, and churches. Many of our people responded with liberal offerings. One person in our South Bend church contributed \$700; another contributed \$200, still another \$50, and many

smaller amounts. Many of our other churches have responded the same way. Much of this is in pledges and is still to come in. I believe every pledge will come in as promised. It will be greatly appreciated if every pledge is paid to your local church so the treasurer can include this offering, in full, in his report for February. Some did not give nor pledge. OUR mail this morning brought us the happy news that the Wisconsin Conference has reached the high mark of 1,055 in its subscription list for the Reveiw and Herald, which figure shows that we are 12 above our regular goal. We are certainly very happy over this and rejoice that so many of our brethren are receiving the weekly visits of the Review. As we think of the field, however, we are convinced that there are still many families that

are not receiving it. The Society of Missionary Men of the Milwaukee area had their second meeting last Sabbath with Elder Scharffenberg present. Some thirty members are enrolled, and we believe that this organization will become a strong factor in our work in the Milwaukee area. We are already receiving material for the Signs campaign. Our present subscription list stands at about 3500, and the brethren are suggesting that our field should reach at least 4000. #### FROM DISTRICT NINE

A REPORT on the proposed World Calendar was presented to the Ministerial Association of Columbia County at their last meeting held in Portage. The reaction to this report might well provide cause for alarm, if it is in any measure indicative of the attitude of the religious leadership of the Middle West.

Not one of the members had even heard of the proposed reform, either through his church channels or by secular means. Though a full and unbiased report of the facts was given, none of the members were disturbed over the issue or its possible consequences. The gist of the chairman's summing up was: Nothing has been said to us; nothing has been done about the matter here in Portage; the common people would not stand for the change; therefore it cannot happen here!

The *Religious Liberty* angle found no responsive chord, and the men were unperturbed by the challenge to the weekly cycle. "One day in seven," was the general interpretation of the Sabbath commandment.

The men of the Portage district are seeking to adapt the tremendous possibilities of the Adventist Men's Fellowship to the circumstances of an essen-
