the membership of these organizations is many times the size of our own denominational group.

The remarkable increase in the circulation of the Signs-from 60,000 in 1937 to 343,000 in 1947, or a period of one decade-has naturally created many problems both of production and circulation. Indeed, those who have been intimately associated with these problems, both during the war emergency and in the days of the postwar era, have marveled at the way God has exercised a guiding Providence in every emergency. At the present moment the publishers and distributors of Signs are wrestling with the new and greater problems involved in fast-rising costs of materials, labor, and various other factors.

During the past year a Goss rotary press was installed and dedicated primarily to the publishing of Signs. This huge press occupies a space in the press room of more than 46 feet and is capable of producing more than a half million copies per week. These are all released from the press printed, folded, and pasted in one operation. In its normal operation, this press has a maximum releasing capacity of 30,000 Signs per . hour, or approximately 500 per minute. This is only one of the items of equipment secured during the past two years that wonderfully facilitate the work with Signs and naturally guarantee greater dispatch in its de-livery to the field.

Facing the recent enormous increase in cost, there has been of late much listing of figures and discussion of budgets to find a way to avoid any appreciable increase in the price of S i g n s. Our people may be assured that the publishers of Signs are constantly studying ways by which they can carry out the original vision of its founders and their bur-

den of heart to make it distinctly a missionary periodical. With this thought in mind, present discussions concerning price are designed only to balance its budget and thus keep it within a reasonable financial range of our missionary-minded membership.

After careful study of costs and circulation for the coming year, it has been decided that during the coming *Signs* crusade, beginning February and continuing into the early spring, the price of single subscriptions mailed direct shall be only \$1.75 or  $3\frac{1}{2}$  cents per week. In addition to this, the price of five or more *Signs* in clubs to one address will be only \$1.50.

In glancing over the various items of our literature program fostered by our publishing houses, we are happy to discover that the abovementioned increase over former years compares very favorably with many items of a similar nature. What will be the result of the publishers' generosity in maintaining this convenient price range with Signs, no one can tell. Certainly they have taken no small risk in making this convenient offer in view of the uncertainty of the times. However, one thing will save the day: If all our readers and all who believe in the Signs will rally to its support this year as never before-then we can lift the circulation to 400,000, perhaps or even half a million, and thus close the books for the coming year on the right side of the ledger.

To all our friends we would say: "This is the time, this the opportunity, to give God's last warning message to a dying world. In this great new year of 1948 let us resolve as never before to flood America with the Signs of the Times."

lication we call upon you to take stock in these institutions. You have nothing to fear; invest your means where it will be doing good; scatter rays of light to the darkest parts of the world. There is no such thing as failure in this work. It is your privilege and duty to do now as your brethren did when there were but few friends of the cause of truth. Take stock in our houses of publication, that you may feel that you have an interest in them."

"... The Review and Herald and the Signs of the Times are cheap papers at the full price. The Review is a valuable paper; it contains matters of great interest to the church, and should be placed in every family of believers. If any are too poor to take it, the church should, by subscription, raise the amount of the full price of the paper, and supply the destitute families. How much better would this plan be than throwing the poor upon the mercies of the publishing house or the tract and missionary society.

"The same course should be pursued toward the *Signs*. With slight variations, this paper has been increasing in interest and in moral worth as a pioneer sheet since its establishment. These periodicals are one in interest. They are two instrumentalities in the great field to do their specific work in disseminating light in this day of God's preparation. All should engage just as earnestly to build up the one as the other."

Not only has instruction been given regarding the beginnings of this periodical, but definite instruction has been given regarding the type and make-up of the periodical. Mrs. White states in regard to the Signs of the Times, "Our papers should not be filled with long discussions or long doctrinal arguments, which would weary the reader; but they should contain short and interesting doctrinal and practical articles."— Testimonies, Vol. IV, p. 599.

MANY a good sales talk has been spoiled because the salesman talked too much. The same principle holds true in a verbal presentation of our message to others. I know of a certain believer who at one sitting presented "The Judgment," "The 2300 Days," and "Hell Fire" to an interested man. Needless to say, we have not seen the man since. Why? The believer talked and argued too long.

There is great power in silence, and the Signs is a silent persuader of truth. Its attractive cover page, its striking editorials, and its balanced topical arrangement are so presented as to make the deepest impression upon the reader. The subscriber to the Signs is introduced to all the doctrines of Seventh-day Adventists without arousing the subscriber's bitter antagonism or prejudice. The subscriber may not agree with the Signs, and he may argue to himself about some article he read in the Signs, but one thing is certain-the magazine does not argue back. It just goes on repeating the positive truth regardless how much the reader may differ in his views or opinions. In time the reader's views and opinions are silently shaped to agree with the Seventh-day Adventist viewpoint, and many times the reader not only mentally accepts the message of the Signs, but openly professes it in his life.

#### SYSTEMATIC USE OF THE SIGNS

NEXT to the Review and Herald the Signs of the Times is the most important missionary journal printed and circulated by us as a denomination. Since its appearance in the field of religious literature a little over seventy years ago it has steadily increased in interest and circulation. In this weekly visitor can be found a correct interpretation of current events; it is the only doctrinal missionary journal for which an annual campaign is systematically conducted in our churches. In it the reader will find a clear expression of the teachings of the church, and so convincing is this silent messenger that a large number of its readers are today walking in the light of Present Truth. The symbol S.S.S. (Signs Saves Souls) could well be applied to it.

While the Signs of the Times is being handled by nearly all our churches with some degree of success, it has been proven that far greater success has been accomplished through a systematic use of this paper. By the term systematic use I mean a regular and well planned course of distribution, in a field or territory well prepared, by a society or group of persons well trained for such a work, and whose objective is the saving of souls. In places where there are organized churches or companies, the church should be divided into bands; each band should be placed under competent leadership; and it would be well to have a general leader over all the bands, whose-duty would be to supervise, instruct, and with words of encouragement see that the work is being done according to plan. This general leader could be the leader of the church home missionary society, if he or she is competent and has the time to put into the work.

In places where there is no such organization a similar work can be done by members designated to the task.

While engaged in this systematic house-to-house work, the worker should endeavor to secure regular subscribers to this valuable journal. It is well to be able to say that you have placed a copy of Signs in every home, but it would be much better if by your personal efforts every home in the territory assigned to you would become a regular reader of Signs by subscribing for it annually, biennially, or quinquennially. The Signs subscription list should be greatly increased. If every worker would go forth with this as his aim, think of the long list of new readers who would be enjoying the rich feast offered by Signs to those who peruse its pages. Think, too, of the hundreds, if not thousands of souls who might embrace the Third Angel's Message and join our ranks, and with us prepare for that grand and glorious event-the Coming of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. May this be the main objective of every missionary worker as we launch out in the 1948 Signs campaign.

#### FIRE PRECAUTIONS

At present it is difficult to ascertain the exact cause of the fires, but from all appearances, they can be traced to either defective wiring, overheating or faulty heating installation.

In view of these two fires I would caution our church boards to carefully inspect their church wiring and heating installations. Due care should also be taken to see that the proper individuals operate the heating apparatus. In this cold weather it is very easy to overheat a furnace and cause a fire. It



would be a good thing for each church board to carefully study its insurance policies and make sure that the amount of insurance carried covers any loss which may occur. I surely hope that all our church boards will attend to these matters at their earliest convenience. T. CARCICH

THE goal of every church is the saving of souls in the kingdom of God. When we lose sight of this goal we no longer have the right to be called the sons of God or to claim to belong to the Christian family. Christ bids us "Feed my lambs." For this purpose God gave us the blueprint of Christian education. And for this cause the church schools of the Seventh-day Ad-

ventist denomination were established.

In order to take a concrete example of what following the blueprint of Christian education will do for any church, let us cite the experience of a church group which for the last two years has had 100% attendance of their own children in their own church school.

This church opened their first church school in 1934 with an enrollment of 9 children. There were 53 members in that church that year. The church building was an old dwelling which would hold no more than 50 or 60 people. School was held in the same room. Wooden benches which were used for pews on the Sabbath were turned around and used as recitation benches during the week. But the church began to grow. The church was located in a small town of 600 population. After the church had prayed persistently for two years that a Christian doctor might be sent to help break down prejudice, God an-swered their prayers. The church and school continued to grow although very often there was a question as to where they could obtain the pupils. Even greater faith was required in finding the financial means with which to maintain the school. But God always provided both after the members determined to step out in faith, as did the Israelites at the Red Sea.

After four years the number of pupils was increased and the demand for the ninth and tenth grades became so great that another forward step was taken. Two teachers were hired and a new school building was started in order to provide the necessary room. However, for one and one-half years those two faithful teachers taught side by side in the old remodeled dwelling which was still used as a church while the new building was being constructed. Several families had moved into the community in order to have their children in church school.

In February of the year 1939, the school was moved to the new building. Later that same year, when the chapel in the basement was finished, the church itself was comfortably housed. More Adventist families kept moving into nearby areas, even at great sacrifice in order to take advantage of the facilities for Christian education for their children. Pupils came from nearby churches. The school rooms became full and finally overcrowded. The organization of another church school in a nearby church in 1945 helped to relieve the congestion. Some non-Adventist families living in the community saw the truths revealed in God's Word and joined the church. Their children were sent to the little church school.

The new year of 1948 finds the school with an enrollment of fifty-eight pupils and three teachers in three class rooms. A third teacher has been added because of the overcrowded conditions. Once more the chapel is overcrowded for church services and so a new building has been started. Yes, it is the long desired house of worship. All have been called upon to step out in faith again and arise and build for the Lord.

But, you say, you were going to tell us how you reached your goal of 100% of your own children in your own church school. May I say simply,-by prayer and faith. Yes, each of the past two years it seemed as though the goal of 100% attendance would be missed by one or two families. But prayer has changed things, and God has answered our prayers. How do we maintain our school financially? By each one sacrificing. Our first mission field 'should be in our own home and in our , own church. The souls of our children are not more precious in the sight of God than aré those in far away India or Africa, but they should be to us, for God holds us accountable first of all for those lambs which He has entrusted to our care.

If you wish to see God's work finished in the world, in your state, in your community, in your church and in your hearts, then sacrifice until you can say, "My lambs are in the fold of Christian education." We cannot stop there. We must work until we can, with the blessing of the Lord, say, "My lambs are all workers together with God for the finishing of His work on this earth." We may not cease to work and to sacrifice until our Lord says to us, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant." "God's work was begun in sacrifice and will be finished in sacrifice. "Where your treasure is there will your heart be also."

# A Signs-Conscious Student Body

AT E.M.C., Signs of the Times holds a very real place in the experience of nearly every student. For several years the College Literature Association has been carrying on a program of literature evangelism, through which thousands have been reached with the gospel message, and a number have been baptized and joined to God's people. The peak of this work was reached a year ago, when 10,000 Signs of the Times were mailed out weekly to homes all over the union where student colporteurs and others had visited, either selling our truth-filled books, or interesting the people in our message by their example and conversation.

The result of this work is many fold. The message is brought to the attention of tens of thousands in the field, and hundreds of young people are actively engaged in missionary work at the college. This work is bearing fruit in souls, and is strengthening the spiritual fibre of the student who participates in it. Eternity alone will reveal the extent of this influence.

No small amount of work is involved in such an effort. Each weekend three meetings are held for wrapping, addressing and mailing these precious pages of truth. On Friday evening,



scores of young people meet from 6:15 until Vespers to wrap and stamp. During the second church service many of the senior church members meet for addressing. Again at 3:00 p.m. a large group gathers to finish addressing and sort for mailing. Altogether, perhaps two hundred individuals take part in each week's work. During the course of a school year many hundreds more have some part in bringing the message to others through the Signs work.

While a magnificent work has been done and is being continued, it is anticipated that an even greater work along this line will be done in the future. What a mighty work might be done by an army of consecrated youth from our schools going forth as evangelistic colporteurs during the summer monthsyes, to sell our literature, but more particularly to act as missionaries bringing the truth for our time to the people, and interesting them in it by their godly appearance, always taking advantage of every opportunity to lay a foundation for follow-up work. These young people would search diligently for hungry souls, keep a record of their names and addresses, to be used as a mailing list for literature when they return to school in the fall. Such a mailing list, worked carefully with literature, followed up with correspondence, Bible studies and personal contacts, would bear souls for the kingdom.

It is not difficult to visualize a youth movement for evangelism along this line that would rival the most effective efforts, not only in economy, but in souls reached and saved. Nor is it beyond reason to believe that such a movement, spreading to other schools and young people's societies all over the country, might act as one of the chief means of sounding the "loud cry," and of finishing the work.

Pray for the Signs work at E.M.C. and at other schools where the same work is being done. Pray that the Lord's blessing might follow each page of truth, that men's hearts might be touched and that souls might be saved. FRANK E. SWEARINGEN
