JONESISM IN FLINT, MICHIGAN

(Continued from last issue)

I attended Mr. Jones' series of meetings that followed for I really wanted to know his attitude. He was at Brother Rutherford's home for dinner and Brother Rutherford went to see him off at the station when he left Flint. Every courtesy was shown Mr. Jones on our part. The attendance at his meetings was notably small considering the total membership of the churches backing him. In some of the meetings the attendance was 60% Adventist. I did exactly what their handbills invited us to do: "Come and bring your Adventist friends." The meetings did our people much good. In fact, the general comment was: "If I didn't know what I believed before, I certainly do now." Because of the small attendance two of his scheduled meetings were dropped. During the entire time, Mr. Jones was nervous and found it extremely difficult to speak. The pastor of the No. Baptist Church said in opening a Sunday night meeting that "he hoped the people would overlook the platform appearance and speaking of Mr. Jones," and reminded them that "he was not an evangelist such as they were used to hearing."

While Mr. Jones repeatedly asserted

that he had nothing against the Adventist people, he nevertheless charged them with teaching and believing things which cannot be proved. We are gaining new members in every meeting of our campaign. Many of these will count their experience from hearing E. B. Jones and then realizing that Seventh-day Adventists are right in their doctrinal interpretations.

The report has just come to me that E. B. Jones has sought the pulpits of the churches in Minneapolis to hold a series against our minister who is conducting a campaign at this time. His request has been refused. Why? Undoubtedly because the churches do not want a repetition of what happened in Flint. Even as the Adventist Church did not satisfy E. B. Jones on a position of leadership, so, I predict the Baptist Church will fail also. He who tried to be a reformer in the Seventhday Adventist Church will eventually turn to his old pattern and try to work his particular reform with his present associates. An interesting question is: "Why doesn't the Baptist Church give him a regular pastorate?" The answer will be apparent in future discussion.

An offering of \$1184 was given on Christmas day toward the new school project at Jackson. The members at Jackson are to be commended for their week by week giving of around \$500 per Sabbath for their much needed projects.

Elder Obed Klein reports a substantial increase in their tunds toward the church-building project in Pontiac.

Elder J. C. Zollbrecht will take over the pastorship of the German church and two or three other churches formerly cared for by Brother Wolcott in Detroit about the middle of January.

It is reported that the new Junior Academy in Detroit is now virtually cleared of all bills and plans are being made for an aggressive soul-winning program throughout the city.

1948 Report of Tithes and Offerings

We are now closing the records for 1948. It has been a good year in the support of the work in Michigan. We have exceeded all previous records. The total tithe has reached \$1,040,769.01, a gain over the previous year of \$98,811.37. This is the largest tithe ever received in one year in the history of the Conference. Total Missions Offerings were \$329,195.77, giving us a weekly average per member of $53\frac{1}{2}$ cents. We thank God, the Creator of the Universe, for the blessings He has bestowed on us this past year. In addition the churches have contributed \$11,215.59 to Famine Relief and \$7,203.77 to the Voice of Prophecy. This wonderful report should give us courage for greater soul-winning efforts in 1949. There is something about the horrible, clutching, agonizing need that just grips the heart and holds you in spite of yourself. Why, I need normal books so badly I could weep. I scrounge my brain for every shred of 'larnin'' Dr. Edwards and Miss Shepherd bestowed there. This year, I teach biology, and Oh if I just had the books people stow back in their bookcases and allow to get cobwebby!"

Elder and Mrs. F. B. Wells ('40)—Suji Mission, Tanganyika, East Africa

Mrs. Wells writes: "Brock says to please send any propaganda material the college has on hand, bulletins, calendars, etc. . . . We meet quite a few who want to continue their education, and we would like some ammunition for EMC. Brock would make a fine press agent for the college, for that is the next place to heaven for him.

'Some time ago, the heathen down at Makanya were needing rain desperately, or their crops would be ruined, so they prayed to their gods. When no rain appeared, they went to the chief and asked him what to do. He told them they were foolish to pray to their gods, as they couldn't
