# GOD'S CUPBOARD

"And the barrel of meal wasted not"

GOD'S supply is never exhausted. We may not be able to see all the bounties in God's cupboard, but the supply is ample, and He has promised to "supply all your need according to His riches in Glory by Christ Jesus." "Bread shall be given him; his waters shall be sure."

In the long, long ago there lived in the little village of Zarephath a widow and her son. A great drought in the land had ruined all vegetation, and her cupboard had been reduced to "an handful of meal in a barrel, and a little oil in a cruse." She had come to the end, as far as material things were concerned. She had just enough for one more frugal meal before she and her son would settle down to a death of starvation. She went out to gather a few sticks with which to cook this last meal. There, near the city gate, she came face to face with the prophet, Elijah. When the prophet saw her, he said, "Fetch me, I pray thee, a little water in a vessel, that I may drink." She turned about to get the water and he "called to her, and said, Bring me, I pray thee, a morsel of bread in thine hand."

Frankly the woman spoke of her poverty. She did not try to make it appear that she had more than she did. She was honest. "As the Lord thy God liveth, I have not a cake, but an handful of meal in a barrel, and a little oil in a cruse: and, behold, I am gathering two sticks, that I may go in and dress it for me and my son, that we may eat it, and die."

Our extremity is God's opportunity. The Lord asks all to share their increase with Him. Sometimes He asks for all. It might appear that we would be impoverished by being liberal with God, but this is His way of assuring us of financial security. "And Elijah said unto her, Fear not; go and do as thou hast said: but make me thereof a

little cake first, and bring it unto me, and after make for thee and thy son. For thus saith the Lord God of Israel, The barrel of meal shall not waste, neither shall the cruse of oil fail, until the day that the Lord sendeth rain upon the earth."

In haste the woman cooked for Elijah her meager store of meal. We must admit this was a real test of faith. Faith is daring. Then she turned again to that meal barrel and instead of it being empty, it still had enough for one more meal. The little cruse of oil which had just been emptied, had as much oil as before. As long as the drought remained "the barrel of meal wasted not, neither did the cruse of oil fail, according to the word of the Lord, which he spake by Elijah."

God did not fill the barrel with meal nor the cruse with oil. But, He did give them day by day as much as they needed. Too often we want a full barrel instead of trusting God day by day for our needs. Many would forget God if the barrel were full.

All that man has comes from God. All bread like the manna of old is bread from heaven. Regardless of how our needs are supplied, God is the Giver. God has his cupboards in strange places, yes, unexpected places. He opened His heavenly cupboard and manna fell in the wilderness for the children of Israel. Not once, but six times a week for forty years. God used a boy's lunch box as a cupboard, and from it He took two fish and five loaves, and fed five thousand men, besides the women and children. A cupboard filled with honey was stored in a lion's carcass, and raven's beaks served as a cupboard to supply Elijah with food.

When the manna fell from heaven, it was the responsibility of the people to gather it. Those who gathered had all

they needed, but no more. That which was left over spoiled, except that which was gathered on the sixth day, and it remained fresh over the Sabbath.

God could have given a week's supply of manna at one time, but He chose to give it day by day. This would help man to remember the Giver. There was never a large amount on hand. Day by day the children of Israel had to look to God for their food. Day by day He opened the cupboard of heaven and gave them daily bread. Thus, for forty years God taught the people three things. First, man is entirely dependent upon God for all things. "He giveth to all life, and breath, and all things."

Second, God taught the dignity of work. Day by day, those who would eat, must gather the manna. The greedy, or over anxious did not profit by taking more than they needed. He that will not work, neither shall he eat, is a Bible principle that will never go out of date. We are admonished to be "diligent in business."

Third, God taught the observance of the Sabbath, the Seventh day of the week, and this, before the giving of the law on Sinai. It is worthy of note that it was for Sabbath keepers that God opened the cupboard of heaven, and from it fed His people for forty years. He still does.

Sometimes our cupboards may appear like that of Old Mother Hubbard, but be not dismayed, God may have some lesson in trust or dependence upon Him for you to learn. Like the children of Israel God may "suffer thee to hunger, . . . that He might make thee know that man doth not live by bread only, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of the Lord. . " In every trial, in every test, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, . . and all these things shall be added unto you."

# We Reioice with Illinois and Indiana

WE rejoice with those who rejoice. Indiana and Illinois have succeeded in reaching more than their 1951 Ingathering goal. Illinois did not start until one week after the campaign opened and reached their \$65,000 goal at the close of the fifth week, actually doing the job in just four weeks. This was done in spite of the fact that many of the workers were helping with the Chicago effort conducted by Elder Robert Whitsett.

Indiana reached their goal in five weeks which is commendable. It is wonderful to see how quickly our people and workers are doing this work in such a short time.

Illinois leads with \$14.66 per capita, and it appears as though they will continue to be in the lead. Indiana comes second with \$13.-27. It is hoped that Illinois and Indiana will continue to forge ahead. We trust that both of them will exceed last year's record.

# Student Aptitude Test

Not only has National Selective Service Headquarters designated Thursday, July 12, as the date for Adventist students to take the qualifying tests for continued deferment, it has also designated eight of our colleges as the location where such tests can be taken, and given the code number of each college which is to be written on the application of each student taking the test. The code numbers are as follows:

1325 Angwin, California (Pacific Union College) 1326 Arlington, California (La Sierra College) 1327 Takoma Park, D. C. (Washington Missionary College)

1328 South Lancaster, Massachusetts (Atlantic Union College)

1329 Berrien Springs, Michigan (Emmanuel Missionary College)

1330 Lincoln, Nebraska (Union College)

1331 Chattanooga, Tennessee (Southern Missionary College)

1332 College Place, Washington (Walla Walla College)

Each student taking the test who lists one of these colleges as a center in which he desires to take his qualifying test must give also the corresponding code number. This code number is very important inasmuch as applications cannot be processed without it.

In case candidates for the test find it more convenient to take the test at some other center, he will be assigned to the center which he designates by city and code number. information regarding which he may obtain from his local board.

- 2. NATHAN BANGS, D.D., Introduction to Christianity, (New York: Methodist Publishing House, 1833).
- 3. WILLIAM RAMSAY. D.D., of Philadelphia, Second Coming of Our Lord. . . Before the Millennium (1841).
- 4. [Anonymous]. Notes on Various Scriptures (Boston: 1798).

- 5. DAVID McGrecor (1771-1845) pastor of Presbyterian Church, Bedford, N. H. (Title of book, publisher and exact publishing date unknown; probably between 1830-'40). Very important, because though not a Millerite he held similar views on the 2300 years.
- 6. A. J. KRUPP, "of Philadelphia." (Title, publisher, and date likewise unknown, but probably 1830-'40). Likewise very important because he too advanced a position similar to Miller. These two items are greatly needed.
- 7. NATHANEAL S. FOLSOM, Critical Interpretations of the Prophecy of Daniel (1842).
- 8. CHARLES B. WHEELER, of West Virginia. founder of Rector College, Puntytown. in 1838 incorporated as "Western Virginia Edu-About 1823 wrote important book cation." fixing upon 1843 for close of 2300 years.
- 9. An English writer by the name of MANN, (given name or initials unknown) who holds the 1260 years of the special papal church epoch are from 538 to 1798 A.D. (Title, publisher, and date similarly unknown.)

If you locate any of these items kindly communicate this fact to me, and directions will be given as to how to arrange for photostats, or a microfilm, and just what is needed to complete the arrangement. I shall be most grateful for your aid, and the Cause we love will benefit by your assistance.

# A Wonderful Record

WE wish to pay tribute to our church school teachers and their pupils for the splendid work done in the Ingathering this year. In the campaign just closed the schools raised a total of \$13,778.82. This is an increase of \$5,097.36 over 1950. Ann Arbor and Hillsdale schools raised more than a double Minuteman goal. Benedict Memorial and Bay City passed the Minute-man goal. From the schools we had 123 who raised senior Minute-man or better and 180 who raised the junior Minuteman. Eleven boys and girls raised over \$100 each and one girl passed the \$200 mark.

Forty-two of our forty-six schools participated in the campaign. The per capita for the schools taking part was \$10.50. When we consider the fact that approximately half of the enrollment in our church schools consists of boys and girls in the lower elementary grades, then this per capita of \$10.50 indeed looks very large.

The boys and girls have entered into this missionary program with great enthusiasm. Is it not the purpose of our schools to train our vouth to be missionaries? Surely our Michigan teachers have faithfully performed their duty. The pastors have also co-operated well to make this work a success.

• Elder G. E. Hutches gave the consecration address for the graduation at Emmanuel Missionary College, Friday evening, June 1.





However, we are happy to report that the upright in heart remained. We received a large number of names and as we did not have a Bible instructor, Mrs. Roth and I had to do all the visiting besides all of our other work.

We formed a baptismal class which was very well attended and on April 28 we had nine precious souls ready for baptism. It was indeed a day of great rejoicing for our church in Milwaukee as we saw these fine believers, mostly young people, taking their stand for Jesus Christ. We believe that they will be a great asset to our church in the future. We have another group in the baptismal class who will soon be ready for baptism.

# From City Block to Vast Estate DEDICATED TO PRACTICAL CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

From a small school on a city block in Battle Creek to a \$2,500,000 educational institution dedicated to practical Christian education was the dramatic story of fifty years of progress unfolded to the senior class of 1951 at their commencement by Dr. E. A. Sutherland. The commencement speaker, who was president of Battle Creek College at the time when it was moved to Berrien Springs, sketched for the class not only the history of Emmanuel Missionary College, but the history of the ideal of an education which developed not only the mind, but also body and soul.

Since the time of the Reformation, said Dr. Sutherland, the Protestant leaders have recognized the need of teaching the rising generation to think and labor in harmony with the law of God. From the days of Melanchthon the problem of operating church schools has been one of the great concerns of the church. Even when schools were established in the New World, they followed the pattern of the classical type of education, largely intellectual and lacking in practical training.

The first move in the direction of a democratic and practical system of education in the United States came from Thomas Jefferson, who established the University of Virginia on a large farm, made agriculture a prominent part of the curriculum, and also offered many other practical courses. Oberlin College in Ohio was cited as one school which substituted the Bible for the pagan classics in its curriculum, and was a training school for self-supporting missionaries. The decade from 1834 to 1844 saw the establishment of over one hundred schools to carry out the principles of practical Christian education. Educational reformers in practically all the leading Protestant denominations operated these schools, teaching agriculture, conducting industries, and sending out self-supporting missionaries.

These schools had a powerful influence on the thinking of the founders of the Advent movement. Captain Joseph Bates was one of our denominational leaders who purchased a farm and operated a manual training school for the education of Christian missionaries.

In spite of this early interest, for some years Adventist children had to attend public schools, as there were no church schools until one was established in Battle Creek by Professor G. H. Bell. It was this school which later became Battle Creek College. At the time of its establishment

instruction was given that it should be on a large farm. Various objections to this plan were raised, and the school was located in the city, forcing it to operate on a restricted, dwarfed plan. This hindered not only the education at Battle Creek, but also the educational thinking of those who received their training there.

This pattern was broken by the example of our educational institution at Cooranbong, Australia, for ten years under the immediate supervision of Mrs. White. The example of the co-operation of students and faculty in a work and study program made others realize the shortcomings of the program in Battle Creek. Practical courses were then introduced, and an interest in establishing church schools was aroused. The need for moving the college to a rural location became apparent, and after much searching, the land at Berrien Springs was purchased. A teaching staff to carry out the original educational plan was chosen, and the first summer's work was held in a camp of tents on the banks of the river. The next winter's work was carried on in the county courthouse and the Oronoko Hotel, and by the next summer there were tents, cottages, and a tabernacle for school fa-

The great importance and influence of this move showed in the immediate effect it had on the educational thinking of those who attended the school. They became aware of the importance of practical Christian training. One of those so influenced was Charles Alden, who went from Emmanuel Missionary College

to become one of the outstanding rural school leaders in the South. It was after the move to Berrien Springs that the prophetic words, bespeaking a volume concerning the heritage of E.M.C. were spoken by Mrs. White, "The educational reform has begun."

"As one who had a prominent part in moving Battle Creek College to this place fifty years ago," continued Dr. Sutherland, "I have watched the progress of the institution closely. I am convinced that it has as its objective the carrying out of the plans originally given to Battle Creek College, and that step by step it has advanced toward the fulfillment of the promise that what was once a 'prisoner of hope' would be brought in time to its upright position of distinction before the world."

Students from 37 states and 18 foreign countries now are receiving the benefits of a balanced education and character development. The faculty of more than fifty well-trained and experienced teachers contribute to this program.

In conclusion Dr. Sutherland stated, "As members of the class of 1951 you have been trained to carry the "message of a crucified, risen, and soon-coming Saviour" to the whole world. May you who have received your education at Emmanuel Missionary College and who bear the imprint of its character go forth fired with the ambition and armed with the knowledge to devote your full share of effort to the finishing of the great work for which this institution was brought into being."
