WHOLEHEARTED DEVOTION

THE life of Caleb stands as a rebuke to those who are halfhearted in their service for God. The mere reading of his life's history, as recorded in the Scriptures, puts something into one that makes him want to do something big for God. He inspires courage and devotion.

Caleb was a man who could look back over the years without wringing his hands over misspent years. No one ever looked back with regret, or grieved over wasted years that wholly followed the Lord. He always enjoyed a noble present, and looked forward expectantly upon the tomorrow.

He gives us the secret of his remarkable life in seven short words. "I wholly followed the Lord." Josh. 14:8. These seven words accounted for all that he had been and all that he had done. The fact that he wholly followed God inspired him to face the future courageously. All that wholly follow the Lord in this our day, may be possessed of the same spirit and convictions that came to this great man. He gives us in these seven words the secret of his life.

Caleb was not boasting in what he said, but rather passing on to all generations the secret of a happy, useful life. There is no conceit in his testimony. He is simply reiterating a truth, the results of which have been proven by all who have followed the same path of loyalty and devotion which he trod. Caleb was not halfhearted in his service and devotion to God. He gave undivided allegiance to God. With him God and His cause came first. Like Paul, "This one thing I do."

We do not hold Caleb up as faultless. He was human, and no doubt made some mistakes. But, his heart was right. We are sure that he put God and His business first in all his plans. To be wholehearted in a thing does not mean that one would never make a mistake. For instance, to be wholehearted in business does not mean that one is necessarily a perfect businessman. and His work first. The success that came to Caleb, came because of his wholeheartedness to God. This same devotion will bring success today.



Caleb was one of the men chosen to spy out the land of Canaan. What impresses us most regarding the exploration of Canaan were the reports that were brought back. You will remember there were two reports-a majority and a minority report. Caleb gave this minority report. Ever since I have read the 13th chapter of Numbers, I have had a lot of respect for minority reports. The majority report said, "We be not able to go up against the people; for they are stronger than we." Num. 13:31. Because Caleb had wholly followed the Lord, he had developed a great faith in God. His faith led him to exclaim, "Let us go up at once, and possess it; for we are well able to overcome it." Num. 13:30. Those who "wholly follow the Lord" will have a strong faith in God. Nothing is more important. "Without faith it is impossible to please Him."

God made Caleb a man of great courage. Faith in God gives courage. It gives both physical and moral courage. Men are weak when they are without faith. A courageous faith leads men to stand up and be counted. It leads men to stand for the right, even if they must stand alone.

God made Caleb a man of, not only faith and courage, but great patience. In a crisis hour he was out-voted, and his report rejected. But he did not sulk or pout because his brethren did not see as he did. He did not threaten to leave God's people because they did not see as he did. He believed he was right, and while he surrendered to the majority, he did not surrender his convictions. He did not become angry, and no spirit of resentment entered his heart. He did not withdraw or refuse to have anything further to do with the people because they could not see his way. He was never bigger than when in defeat.

It must have been a disappointing experience for him, after seeing the goodly land with all its blessings, to turn his face toward the barren wilderness for a long march of forty years. He had started with a movement that he believed would succeed. So he stayed with the movement. But he did not whine or rebel. He no doubt helped his generation to pass on to their graves as peaceably as possible. But he never lost faith in God's plan for His people. He set about to train a new generation to finish what their fathers started out to do.

God has prepared a heavenly Canaan for His people. They are now on the march toward that promised land. Those who do not drop out by the way will be those who "wholly followed the Lord." Nothing short of wholehearted devotion will suffice. These will have the faith, courage and patience necessary to endure the hardships and persecutions of the last days. and be in the great procession when the saints go marching in.

A YOUNG Seventh-day Adventist from Muskegon, Michigan, won the second award of \$500 in a national competition extended to the country's 30,000 medical students.

John Holloway, a sophomore in the school of Medicine at the College of Medical Evangelists, won the prize by writing a 12,000 word dissertation on "Steroid Hormones in the Treatment of Rheumatoid Arthritis."

Before attending medical school, Holloway graduated from Emmanuel Missionary College in 1949.

Fruit of Faithfulness

ABOUT ten years ago Ella Kasten was canvassing in Menasha, Wisconsin, and called at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Wettstein and sold them a 5-year subscription to the Life & Health magazine. Mr. Wettstein was a Roman Catholic at the time. Both Mr. and Mrs. Wettstein were taken up with the health message and began to live it. After four years of reading this magazine they decided they should share the message with others and wrote to the publishers asking permission to represent them in the sale of Life & Health.

Their letter was forwarded to the Publishing Secretary of Wisconsin and he wrote the Wettsteins a letter stating the standards required of our representatives such as abstaining from use of tobacco, alcoholic beverages, other drinks such as tea and coffee, unclean meats as listed in Deut. 14 and Lev. 11: also, that they must believe in Jesus Christ and keep the Ten Commandments as the Law of God.

The Wettsteins in turn answered his letter stating they were living up to the above standards, thanks to Life & Health. This re-

quired a visit from the secretary and he found them honest in heart and in search of all truth. They purchased several large religious books, Bible studies were arranged for and they were soon rejoicing in their new found faith.

They love this message and are zealous to see it spread throughout the world so that Jesus can come. They are earnest workers in their community and territory assigned them, bringing the message to the people in the same way they were first contacted, which is the colporteur way.

It was a thrill to Miss Kasten to meet the Wettsteins at the Institute last January. Miss Kasten is still in the work selling magazines and some books. She devoted 700 hours to the work last year and delivered \$1,545.75 worth of truth-filled literature into the hands of the people.

Mrs. Wettstein canvassed 212 hours last year and delivered \$531.63 worth of literature which was an average of over \$2.50 per hour delivered. Brother Wettstein canvassed 1434 hours and delivered \$2,828.25. He didn't get in a full year as they started in the month of March. He has a good goal set to reach this year.

Just a week ago Sister Wettstein wrote of a couple they found in their work and invited them to go to church with them which they did. They were very favorably impressed with the message and promised to go again.

SABBATH, March 29, will be a high day for the churches in the Rhinelander area. This will be the occasion of an all-day Colporteur Rally for the northern area in Wisconsin. To accommodate the large audience that is expected, it is planned that we have the meetings in the city hall at Rhinelander. Elder H. J. Capman will join with Elder W. C. Whitten and Brethren Otis and Taggart in this special rally which will be appreciated by all who put forth the effort to attend. A program of evening entertainment has been arranged.

We are now in our fourth week of the effort, and our courage is strong. In spite of a bad snowstorm last Sunday night we could see God's hand blessing us with a good attendance.

The meetings are held in the English language for the English-speaking people of Italian descent and other Engish-speaking folk. Considering the area to which we are confined, we are indeed grateful for the blessings of God. Out of the 25 regular visitors who come each Sunday night to the lectures, 13 are enrolled in the 20th Century Bible Correspondence Course.

All of the visitors who are attending the lectures are coming as a result of the handbill distribution. God opened a way whereby we could have these meetings announced without cost on an Italian-radio program which reaches most of the Italian folk who listen to it.

The musical program under the direction of Pastor Henry Uhl of the Racine District, has helped to draw the visitors to the meetings. His beautiful musical selections and poetry during the song service have truly praised and honored the name of Jesus. The musical part of the program is indeed just as important as the lecture portion. The church appreciates the services of Pastor Uhl.

I have had the privilege of being pastor of several churches in the East these past three years, but I have never been associated with a finer group of lay workers than the members of the Milwaukee Italian church. Each week ten or twelve members have gathered to distribute over 2,000 handbills to the homes in the vicinity of the church. Their labors have been rewarded as we are seeing the results of their work by the attendance of the visitors who were inspired to come by the weekly handbill distribution. With their splendid help and God's blessing we can look forward to a harvest of souls at the end of this Spring series of lectures.

Plan a Little Extra Lift

TONICHT I am at my desk at a rather late hour. Following a close study of our tithe and missions statement for the first two months of 1952, I had intended to retire. But, the things revealed in this study are so serious that there would be no rest until I share my findings with our people who have a right to. know the facts.

Our tithe income was not phenomenal, but good. In 1951 the tithe income per capita was \$14.10 while for 1952 it was \$15.26. This made us happy and doubly grateful to God for His blessings. But what happened to our missions? For the first two months of 1951 our per capita missions income was \$.388 per week while for 1952 it was \$.335, or a per capita loss of five cents and three mills per week per member. Thirty-four churches and seven districts showed a loss while the other churches and districts showed a gain which kept us from a much larger loss.

It is further enlightening to note that some of these churches and districts show almost phenomenal gains while others show 'corresponding losses. The reasons for some of these contrasts is not known at present, but provokes thought and study. The districts showing the largest per capita gains in their order are Bloomington, Vincennes, Columbus and Huntington.

If there were no way of regaining these losses, it would be disheartening. But, we can make this up, and when our people get these facts, I am sure they will unite in one grand lift to regain the lost ground and possibly again march a little ahead of the parade.

On Sabbath, March 29, all will join in the 13th Sabbath offering. A little extra planning, a little extra lift on the part of all, will put us in our rightful place in mission giving and defeat the plan of the evil one to influence us to do less and finally be discouraged of ever hoping to catch up. Personally, I will lift a little harder and invite every one to join with me. C. M. BUNKER

WE were very happy this week to get a letter from Pfc. Floyd Smoroske of South Bend. Floyd is now in Korea working at an Air Force Base a few miles from Pusan, where the wounded are brought from the battlefield and flown to hospitals in Korea, Japan and some are sent directly to the United States

Floyd writes: "I just received the *Buddies' Exchange* today and decided that it was time for me to write you a little note. I am still over here at the K-9 Air Base and I have a new job of working in the supply room as supply clerk. I really like it.

"I got a chance to go up to Seoul for 17 days a while back and was I ever surprised to see Don Crabtree of Arcadia up there. We went to church on a truck and one Sabbath morning I was sitting on the

truck and somebody said 'Hi Fuzzy!' I looked around and couldn't see anybody who knew me by that name; but then I looked a little closer and there was Don. We really had a good long talk about the good old days at Indiana Academy. Don is doing very well at being Sabbath-School Leader.

MACEDONIAN CALL REVERSED

SEVERAL weeks ago, a motorist drove into a smart California service-station to refuel. Immediately three smiling, efficientlooking attendants stepped forth and descended upon the car—checking tires and oil, adding water, cleaning the windshields, and performing a half-dozen other automotive niceties to perfection.

Pleased, and very much impressed, the driver paid them his bill and roared off only to return a few minutes later. "You fellows neglected something," he said, to their chagrin. "You forgot to put in the gas."

This situation, according to E. R. Thiele, head of E. M. C.'s religion department, accurately parallels the way many of the country's ministerial interns left school in his day: with the tires of their learning checked and the windshields of their theory clear. But all too often they roared off *without* what is most important of all—practical experience in solving the problems of pastoral work.

"Times have changed, though," the Doctor smiled, as I sat in his office. Today, at E. M. C., when a religion major graduates, he has a keen idea of the kinds of situations that will confront him in his ministry. And for many of these situations, he already has a self-tried and tested solution, garnered from his work in some of the 31 pastor-less churches within an 80-mile radius of the College.

The present system of student-preaching at E. M. C. is stream-lined and ultramodern. Its present form was worked out by University of Chicago graduate Thiele and his associates early in 1949. With financial backing provided by the Michigan, Indiana, and Lake Union Conferences, plus, more recently, the Lake Region Conference, the plan calls for anywhere from 45-60 church services per month to be held in these districts by senior ministerial students from the College.

Averaged over a nine-month period, these services total 481, or more than half the entire student population of the school. Actually, Dr. Thiele points out, when the work done by summer enrollees of the College is counted, the complete figure is much higher.

The nucleus of the project is the Seminar in Religious Education Class at the College—a sort of workshop composed of religion majors who have previously studied methods in evangelism, pastoral

responsibilities, and church organization and administration. The Seminar's express purpose is to provide "assigned and directed practice in sermon presentation and pastoral responsibility in the near-by churches."

In carrying out these objectives, the class's activities weekly carry it as far east as Hammondsport, Ind.,—some 80 miles away, and to such picturesque places in Michigan as Holland, and Allegan. The last named contains the burial spot of Joseph Bates, and is a place where Mrs. Ellen White often spoke.

Although the students are often accompanied by departmental instructors, emphasis is placed upon their planning and accomplishing the work themselves. The class periods are given over to informal discussion of problems met and the principles involved; particularly knotty ones are worked on conjointly.

The result is not only a deep respect for orthodox procedure and practice, but a surprisingly healthy individualism is developed. Most gratifying of all has been the increased initiative among the men who will soon be interning. It has. produced many startling, hoped-for-but-hardly-expected, results.

What are some of them? A glow of pride showed in the face of the short, grey-haired professor. "In many instances," he said, "students have gone out from this school and put life-less, spiritually dead churches back on their feet. Two years ago in particular, an E. M. C. student began to feel sharp responsibility for a small mid-western congregation. They were torn by strife and dissension. Composed largely of a few disagreeing families, the whole church was split into bitter, vindictive factions, with constant wrangling among the groups.

"Quietly, and efficiently, the young man secured the aid of several fellow students to help him put on a revival. They proceeded with much prayer and careful planning, campaigning nightly to heal the schism. Not only was the revival a success, but the now united church-members begged the students to conduct an evangelistic effort. With an almost doubled membership, that church is today one of the strongest, though smallest, in the midwest. The only help college officials lent the project came in the way of pastoral advice on one or two particularly difficult obstacles."

"We're proud of the work these students are doing," Dr. Thiele said. After spending an entire day watching the program in action, it is my opinion that the College staff has a right to be. The student-conducted service I attended in Elkhart, Indiana, three weeks ago was a model of dignity, order, and inspiration.

How is it determined which churches you will serve?" I asked. A student volunteered the answer. "A simple request," he said. "We're ready to work with any church for as many Sabbaths per month as it may wish. We're glad to do it." The look in the faces of the others affirmed that they were. I left with the distinct impression that in a day when "the harvest is ready" and the laborers still fewer, here is a fine example of the Macedonian call accepted.
