A Year of Precious Blessings at Emmanuel Missionary College

HE RATHER arduous but extremely satisfying annual task of signing nearly one hundred diplomas for the students of Emmanuel Missionary College who will be graduated in a few days, has been completed. As I signed each diploma and noticed the name of the student printed thereon, a flood of memories welled up in my mind and I could not prevent a frequent pause to think of the lives of service which doubtless are ahead of these students. Signing these diplomas makes one realize more than ever that another school year is rapidly drawing to a close. In many respects, this has been one of the best years in the history of Emmanuel Missionary College. When the use of the first page of the LAKE UNION HERALD was offered the college, I accepted the opportunity gladly, for it would permit a general report of the year's activities to be made to our constituency through the Lake Union Conference area.

In common with institutions of higher education generally throughout the United States, Emmanuel Missionary College experienced a gradual decline

in student enrollment in recent years. We are glad to report, however, that this downward trend has been halted and that it is possible to report a slight increase. A total of 881 college students registered during the 1953-54 school year, as compared with 858 for the previous year. Even more encouraging is the fact that the freshman class which entered in September, 1953, totaled 298, as compared to 228 the previous year. It is also significant that the retention of students during the present school year has been much greater than in recent years.

The financial operation of Emmanuel Missionary College, has been affected by the drought of last summer, the declining economic situation throughout the nation, and the increased cost of operating a college in harmony with sound educational policies. During the last few months this situation has been reversed, however, and we are glad to report an improvement in the operating statement for the past three months as compared with the same months a year ago.

The curricular offerings have been enriched in several fields during the past year in order to meet more adequately the needs of our young people. The Department of Music has offered for the first time a new curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Music Education, designed for those who are primarily interested in teaching music in elementary and secondary schools. A new program leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing has also been inaugurated, in co-operation with the Hinsdale Sanitarium and Hospital. The Home Economics Department added a new curriculum, for the training of institutional chefs, to its regular under-graduate major and its pre-professional training for dietitians. The Department of Art, which

has previously offered a minor only, has this year been able to offer a major. A minor in Biblical Languages has also been announced.

The instructional program of the College is conducted by a well qualified faculty of 71 (including the academy and elementary school). Of this number, 17 hold the Ph.D. degree and 39 the Master's degree. These teachers are distinguished not only for professional competence, but also for their deep personal interest in the welfare of each individual student.

One of the prime purposes of Emmanuel Missionary College is to provide a haven for our young people during their formative years. In addition to the regular daily and weekly religious services, two most challenging weeks of prayer conducted by Elders C. E. Wittschiebe and F. H. Yost, and the annual studentsponsored "Quest For Christ Week," have done much to help us gain a deeper Christian experience. Students and teachers have participated whole-heartedly in church activities through the year, and in the Annual Ingathering drive brought in a total of over \$12,500 to set a new alltime record for our colleges.

The new music building has been in use for the first time during the past year and is meeting the needs of that important department very adequately. The old music building and the old administration building were razed during the summer. With these changes, the campus took on a new appearance, which more than ever justified the reputation of "The Campus Beautiful."

This is an extremely brief report, but it will serve to let the constituency of Emmanuel Missionary College know that we have much reason to be thankful to God for the measure of success which has attended our efforts this year. We earnestly request the full co-operation and prayers of every Seventh-day Adventist within the Lake Union Conference to the end that we may increasingly find and fill the place which God has in mind for Emmanuel Missionary College.

THE TERRIBLE experience which came to Union College on the night of December 25 because of the fire in the boys' dormitory is now history. No one will know how much labor was expended to complete the task except those who lived in the dormitory, those in charge of the school, and those asked to raise the money necessary to make settlement with students and teachers. As we look back on it all now, we can see many blessings that God has showered upon all who participated in this great program.

The first call was sent out by the home missionary men in the three unions associated with Union College. The response in shipment of clothing, bedding and cash was marvelous. The second call that was sent to the conferences was relayed to the individual churches by the respective conference presidents. Again the response was wonderful.

And beyond all of our expectations and entirely unsolicited, Elder H. K. Halladay, home missionary secretary of the Lake Union, and Elder J. H. Hancock, the M.V. Secretary of the Lake Union, appealed to their departments for help. When these amounts reached our office, we discovered that they had raised the surprising sum of \$1955.89, \$447.49 of which was raised by the missionary volunteers. In addition to this, the students of Emmanuel Missionary College sent us \$140. How can we ever thank our friends of the Lake Union for sharing our burden

with their gifts in this great endeavor. The Northern, Southwestern and Central Unions had many reasons to come forward with large gifts since among those who suffered the loss of everthing were their own boys. We owe a real vote of thanks to the conference presidents, the welfare workers, and all members of our churches for their help and prayers.

The committee in charge of the program agreed to the plan of returning the funds—which were not used in making settlement with the students—to each organization at the close of the drive that participated in it.
