Pioneer and Youth Sacrifice for TV Ministry

Needless to say, every letter that comes to Faith for Today is precious, even when the total mail count reaches just under 9,000 as it did last week. But occasionally a letter comes in that we cannot resist sharing with you. Here are a few lines from E. E. Farnsworth, an 86 year old pioneer whose grandmother lived in the era of the Dark Day.

"Enclosed is my gift which I hope will reach you safely. I hope it may be an encouragement to you in your good work.

"We now see prophecy being fulfilled that father taught us 70 or 80 years ago. We are seeing the message go as we never expected it to. We have lived through the ox-wagon days, the horse, the Model T and the Model A. I have even been in a plane, but have no desire to take the vehicle to the moon! Am waiting for our Saviour to take us when He sees fit.

"May God bless you and your work until it is finished in all the earth, is my prayer."

From ox-wagon days to the rocket age seems almost too much to comprehend, but here is a letter from a present day lad who also wants to help the TV ministry. Unable to make a large donation when the TV offering was scheduled, he determined to share half his allowance with Faith for Today each month. He wrote: "I get an allowance of fifty cents a week and I have decided to pledge one dollar per month. Enclosed you will find the first dollar. Please send me the replica of the Widow's Mite. (A replica of the Widow's Mite was the TV gift for the month a few weeks ago.)

So both the 86 year old and the lad with a fifty-cents-a-week allowance will

share in sending the gospel out over the air waves. May the truths of the gospel bear fruit in the lives of viewers as they have in the lives of these consecrated TV supporters.

Medical Students—and Doctors—May be Refused Recognition As Conscientious Objectors

Some months ago one of our students at C.M.E. learned that he could not receive a commission as a military officer unless he waived his rights as a conscientious objector. He wrote to

me, asking for an explanation, because he knew that our medical men do receive commissions as officers in the various services without surrendering their noncombatant rights. I referred the question to the Department of Defense, asking for an explanation.

After some time had elapsed a reply from the Department of Defense stated that those students and medical men who accept military commissions under the pressure of a draft call may be recognized as conscientious objectors, but those who accept commissions without being under such pressure will not be given such recognition. For that reason the medical student at C.M.E. had been refused a commission unless he surrendered his non-combatant rights.

Tips to Pathfinder Leaders bringing their clubs: (1) All clubs must register before 4:00 p.m. Friday, the earlier in the day the better.

Some nearby clubs are planning to set up their equipment Thursday evening. (2) Every unit must be complete with an adult counselor when registering. (3) All campers must be regular

members of a Pathfinder Club within the age limit 10-15. Those having their tenth birthday in May will be eligible. (4) Each club should bring tents, table, stove, food, shelters, wash racks, and personal items. (5) Each unit should bring charcoal stoves, and enough stoves to give ample room for cooking and heating water. The time for cooking and eating will be limited. Cooking equipment should be experimented with before coming. Kerosene-soaked sawdust to ignite charcoal and sufficient charcoal for cooking all meals must be brought by each club. (6) Pathfinders should plan for rain. Each should bring raincoats, rubbers, and umbrellas. The program will go on rain or shine. (7) Boys and girls will tent, cook, and eat in separate areas. (8) A Pathfinder unit will consist of 2, 4, 6, or 8 Pathfinders. A unit may be made up of any combination of boys or girls, e.g. 3 girls and five boys, or 2 girls and 4 boys, or 1 girl and 7 boys, etc. Just so when they fall in line and march together there will be even numbers in each unit, not including staff members. Staff members will march together.

(8) Complete Pathfinder uniforms, including neckerchiefs and sashes should be worn for the religious services and for the parade on Sunday. Casual clothes and aprons to protect clothing should be worn for setting up camp, cooking, and hiking.

(9) Club Directors should be exceed-

Coming to Hinsdale San

Mildred Capron brings her exciting all-color motion picture "Solo Safari to South Africa" to Hinsdale San's Paulson Hall Auditorium on April 12 at 8 p.m.

A native of upstate New York, educated in private schools in Boston, Miss Capron spent fourteen years in China doing administrative missionary work. She has traveled twice around the globe and spent almost ten months in South Africa making a travel film.

Ignoring repeated warnings of danger to a lone woman in the remote section, this fearless adventurer covered 24,000 miles by car and wore out 11 tires. Mildred Capron has a specially built station wagon with sleeping deck which she calls *home*. She says, "I'm like a turtle; I travel with my home on my back."

In South Africa, Miss Capron captured on color film the whole of the Cape Province Durban, the *Miami* of that country; Practoria; the famous game reserves in Krueger Park; gold mining near Johannesburg. She traveled to Rhodesia to get stupendous views of Victoria Falls and to South West Africa to film the closely-guarded diamond fields at Orange Mouth. She believes that she is the only travel-lecturer ever permitted behind the barbed-wire fences, the searchlights and X-ray checks of these highly-guarded diamond diggings.

Filming her way to adventure Miss Capron has carved a career which other women, and many men, may well envy. She is also convinced that travelogue audiences are ready for more intimate coverage within a smaller area, rather than surface-skim over a vast area, which seems for a long time to have been the conception of a travelogue.
