LET US HOLD TO THE STANDARDS

Every properly constituted civil government must have laws and standards by which to govern. Without these it could not long exist. It must have laws defining the relationship of its citizens to the government and to one another. There must be standards of weights and measures, currency standards, et cetera. All these must be enforced by the government authorities. Failure to do so would result in chaos and ultimate ruin.

The same principle holds true in the Christian church. If it is to live and prosper, it must have well-defined laws. There must be standards governing the conduct of its members. This was recognized by Christ, the founder and invisible head of the church. He gave to the church a code of laws that knows no equal. Its Author declares that it is "perfect," "spiritual," "holy and just and good." It is the standard of righteousness by which we are to order our lives here and by which we are to be judged hereafter.

This standard the carnal man cannot reach. "Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be." (Rom. 8:7). The only way man can ever attain the perfection of this divine standard is through help from above.

Hence, it is evident that to be a real Christian is much more than many take it to be—it is far more than a profession. Christianity is an experience; it is a way of life. A man may become a Democrat, a Republican, a Socialist, or something else by joining the political party of his choice, but he cannot become a true Christian by simply joining a church. The only way he can become a Christian is by being

"born again" (John 3:7). He must be completely transformed in heart and mind by the power of God (Rom. 12:2). In other words, he must be converted (Acts 3:19) and must be changed into a new creature in Christ (2 Cor. 5:17).

Having followed his Lord in baptism, this transformed newborn soul comes forth to "walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:4). He can no longer live as he lived before. He must forsake every practice that is contrary to the will of God as expressed in His Word. "Let him that stole, steal no more" (Eph. 4:28) is the divine admonition. Now that he has accepted Jesus as his Lord and Master he must, through divine grace, follow in His steps.

In the Bible and also in the writings of the Spirit of prophecy, the Lord has laid down principles and set up standards that are to govern the conduct of the members of the church. These high and holy standards found perfect expression in the life and character of Jesus. They cannot be reached in human strength and wisdom, but thank God they can be attained through daily reliance on the mighty power of God. We have been assured that, "living the life of the Life-giver, through faith in Him, everyone can reach the standard held up in His words."—*Testimonies*, vol. 7, p. 270.

Ever since God made known His standards of righteousness to mankind they have been the objects of Satan's constant hatred and bitter attacks. In all ages he has sought to enlist men

and women in his warfare against the laws and precepts of God. He has spared no effort to lead the children of men to disregard and to trample in the dust the very rules and regulations given by their Maker to govern their lives.

When Satan approaches the child of God to entice him away from the path of rectitude, he does not propose that the whole moral code be set aside. He knows that with such a method he would never succeed. Instead, he begins by proposing some slight infraction, some little detour for a moment. Then, step by step, he tries to lead him to lose his regard for the sacredness of the divine precepts.

This was the way he led the children of Adam away from their innocence at the gates of Paradise until the thoughts of their hearts were evil continually. They went so far in giving free rein to their appetites, passions, and lusts that God had to destroy them by a flood. For the same reason also He had to rain fire and brimstone on the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah.

Our own generation is fast sinking to the same depths of corruption and degradation. This is exactly what Jesus foretold. Speaking of the last days, the days in which we are living, He declared that as it was in the days of Noah and in the days of Lot, so also it would be in the days of the coming of the Son of man.

It is hard to believe that the moral picture could have been any darker in the time of the antediluvians or in the time of Sodom than it is today. Alarming, indeed, are the reports that come to us daily through the newspapers and over the air, telling of the tre-

mendous increase in crime and moral pollution. Without shame or restraint old and young are plunging deeper and deeper into the miry pit of sin. Christian standards are being ignored and, with altogether too many, religion is becoming a mere formality, a profession rather than an experience with God. —*The Inter-American Division Messenger*

War in Any Form

One section of the Selective Service Questionnaire which must be filled out by every young man is somewhat confusing. It is Series VII of the Selective Service Classification Questionnaire. It reads as follows:

Series VII.—Conscientious Objection to Participation in war in any form

Instructions.—You should complete this series by signing the statement below, requesting a Special Form for Conscientious Objector (SSS Form No. 150, from the local board, if, by reason of religious training and belief you are conscientiously opposed to participation in war in any form. Do not sign this series until you have read Carefully.

By Reason of religious training and belief I am conscientiously opposed to participation in war in any form and for this reason hereby request that the local board furnish me a special form for conscientious objector (SSS Form No. 150) which I am to complete and return to the local board for its consideration.

Because of the fact that signing this part of the Questionnaire indicates that the individual thus signing is opposed to "war in any form" some of our young men have become confused. We are not opposed to noncombatant participation in war. Ever since we have declared ourselves to be noncombatant we have indicated our willingness to serve in a noncombatant capacity in

capacity. Then they are classified 1-A-O.

All young men who are in harmony with our denominational position on war should sign Series VII. Thus they will take the first step in securing their 1-A-O classification.

H. T. Jones Receives Ph.D. Degree

Harold T. Jones, associate professor of mathematics at E.M.C., received his doctor's degree in applied mathematics June 2, 1958, from Brown University, Providence, R. I.

From 1946 to '48 he was instructor in mathematics at Pacific Union College and, after additional graduate study, joined the E.M.C. staff in 1952.

Born in Allentown, Pa., Dr. Jones attended the public schools there, graduating with honors from high school in 1943. He continued his education at Washington Missionary College, graduating with distinction in 1946. His major was mathematics and his minors were physics and chemistry. In 1949 he received his M.A. degree in mathematics from Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pa.

For several years following that he attended Brown University, first as a fellow in applied mathematics and later as a research assistant.

Support for his thesis research was supplied by the Air Force Office of Scientific Research for one year. The National Science Foundation has sponsored it since August, 1957, and will continue its aid until August, 1959,

while Dr. Jones and the chief investigator for the project, Dr. Edward J. Specht, head of the E.M.C. mathematics department, study further into the problem.

The title of Dr. Jones' doctoral dissertation was, "An Application of the Theory of Linear Operators in Hilbert Space to a Problem in Potential Theory."

While at Brown University, Dr. Jones began his research in the field of ultrasonic radiation. However, he discontinued it after the results of a similar study were published by a Russian mathematician. He then joined Dr. Specht in the study for the Air Force.

Dr. Jones is a member of the American Mathematical Society, the Mathematical Association of America, and the Pi Mu Epsilon Fraternity, an honorary mathematical fraternity, and is an associate member of the Sigma Xi. In 1954 he attended the Summer Conference in Collegiate Mathematics at the University of North Carolina and the Seminar in Applied Mathematics at the University of Colorado in the summer of 1957.
