April is the official date set by the General Conference for promotion of our wonderful missionary magazines— *These Times* and our foreign publications. We are again combining the promotion of *These Times* and the special periodicals that are published by the Brookfield, Ill. branch of Pacific Press Publishing Association.

A special reduced rate is in effect during the months of April and May for our foreign periodicals. The rate is only \$1.25 for a single subscription, or eight to separate addresses for only \$10; overseas subscriptions only \$1.50. In sending orders to our Book and Bible House you are requested to specify the name of the foreign language journal desired.

For our Spanish friends a special journal is available in their own language entitled, *El Centinela*. The foreign *Signs* is also translated in five other languages. *Le Messager*—French; *Zeichen Der Zeit*—German; *Sions Vakitare*—Swedish; and in the Ukrainian language. For twelve monthly issues these five journals cost only \$1.25 each.

The *Israelite* is a Jewish publication published quarterly which is prepared especially for our Jewish friends for only 75c per single subscription.

What Are You Going to Do?

Yes, what are you going to do on April 18? This is the day set aside for the special \$50,000 offering in Wisconsin for the new administration building.

It wouldn't be hard to receive this amount of money by July 1 if all could really feel the need for this project. I' wish I had words to impress you with the need. This is not a luxury that is asked for; this is a necessity. The folk who were here on March 29 were taken on a tour and many asked how we ever got along. Some departments are missing completely, such as the cooking laboratory taught in the dean's kitchen, and the sewing classes taught in a girls' dormitory room. The music building—the old farm house is about ready to fall apart; some of our guests on March 29 hesitated to go upstairs in it.

I wish you might have been here on Thursday evening during our Week of Prayer. If all of you could have seen what those of us who were here saw, we could and would give \$100,000 on Sabbath.

On Wednesday evening Elder Church, our Week of Prayer speaker, made it known that on Thursday evening he would call for a testimony meeting and that the young people would be asked to come to the platform to give their testimonies. I was skeptical of this plan; I wondered whether these young people loved the Lord enough for this type of a testimony. When Elder Church made his appeal for young people to come forward to testify, immediately the sides of the chapel were lined with young people ready to respond. The pastor didn't make another appeal. He simply stood back and all but about 20 of our 260 students came forward and testified.

These are your children; these young people come from your churches. What are we going to do for these that their education might be full and complete?

May God richly bless all of you as you contemplate your gifts. Many should be giving \$100, and some could give \$500 and a \$1,000 if they only would. I am praying that our building program can go on unhampered for lack of funds.

# Academy Needs Studied

A meeting of the Wisconsin workers, church elders and academy promoters was held on the campus of Wisconsin Academy, March 29. The Lake Union Conference was represented by Elders W. A. Nelson and Vernon Flory. Eld. I. H. Ihrig, representing The Southern Publishing Association was also present.

A tour of the buildings and campus of the academy was conducted in the forenoon, with special attention given to the urgent need for the new administration building. Those making the tour saw how classes were conducted in facilities unsuited to such use. They saw the need for worship rooms in the dormitories, the need for an adequate laundry, library, music department facilities, industrial arts department, student chapel, and administrative office space. All these needs can be met either wholly or in part when the new administration building is completed. Those making the tour were convinced that the new building is a vitally needed unit toward the completion of Wisconsin Academy.

Following lunch the entire group met in the present chapel, in the basement of the girls' dormitory. This chapel space is crowded to an almost dangerous extent by the school family, in its routine use.

Speakers during the hour that followed were, Eld. F. W. Bieber, principal of the academy, Eld. W. A. Nelson, Educational Secretary of the Lake Union Conference, Eld. S. F. Pederson, pastor of the Madison church, Eld. J. B. Church, pastor of the Milwaukee Central church, Dr. W. T. Lindsay, member of the Wisconsin Conference executive committee, and R. E. Finney, Jr., president of the Wisconsin Conference.

At the close of the meeting those present were given the opportunity of making pledges toward the new building, payable by July 1. In a few minutes over \$3,600 was pledged by the workers and lay members present. A high level of enthusiasm and dedication was evidenced by the rapidity with which the pledges were made.

April 18 was set as the day on which this project will be given special emphasis in all the Wisconsin churches. On that day it is hoped that a total of \$50,000 in cash and pledges payable by July 1, 1959, will be received. The need is critical and we believe that the people of Wisconsin will gladly follow the example set by the workers of the conference and the local church officers gathered at the academy.
